Behind the Scenes - Student Financial Services Supports the President's Graduation Initiatives

In this edition of Behind the Scenes, we take a look at President Nelsen's renewed focus on the graduation rates and the graduation initiative at Sacramento State.

President Nelsen emphasized the amount of work that is needed to progress: "We have important work to do

as we increase freshman and transfer graduation rates, decrease the time to degree, provide the classes that our students need, and close the achievement gaps."

Currently, the obstacles appear difficult to overcome. Only eight percent of Sacramento State's incoming freshman graduate in four years. Additional pressure has come from the CSU, who have set a goal of 24 percent by May of 2025. [Read more.](#)

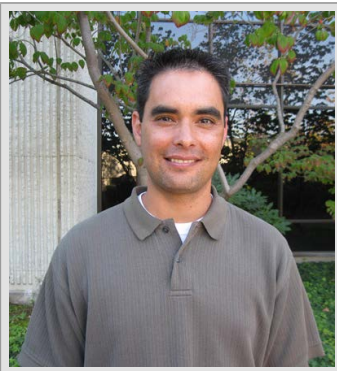

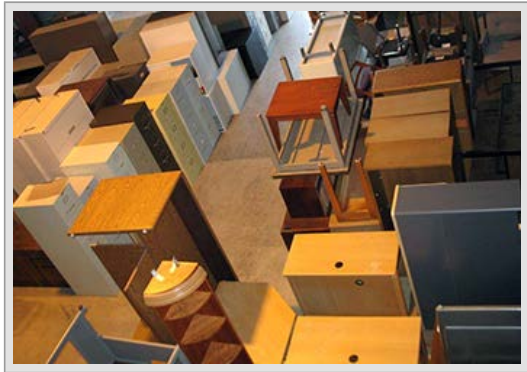
ABA Offices on the Move

Several of ABA's offices are soon planning a change of scenery. Beginning the week of March 21st, Procurement & Contract Services, Accounting Services, and Accounts Payable/Travel are moving their offices from their current location, in Sequoia Hall, to their new offices in Modoc Hall.

The move is important as space currently occupied by all three offices in Sequoia Hall will be converted into much needed labs for students.

Employees of AP, Accounting, and Procurement are ready for the challenges and adjustments due to the move. Relocating eight years of paperwork is quite a task, and employees are looking at how best to serve their customers once the move has been completed. "We have been reviewing all of the contact points we have with the campus community and looking at ways to maintain our customer service from a more remote location," said Kendal Chaney-Buttleman, university controller.

However, benefits for the offices are expected to materialize: "Procurement and Accounts Payable & Travel will be working side by side in the same office space. Many of their processes are interrelated, so working closely together may result in some efficiencies," said Chaney-Buttleman. "We will also have a dedicated conference room for meetings that we don't currently have. This will be more convenient to hold training and other events for the departments."



Surplus Furniture Available

In need of office furniture? The Property Management office has many surplus items currently in their warehouse. Some of these items include: desks, filing cabinets, wall shelves, tables, as well as office/task chairs.

Considering surplus furniture first helps divert waste as well. In 2015, 26 tons of materials were auctioned off or reused, which prevented those 26 tons from being sent to a landfill.

Many items do not get posted to the furniture surplus website immediately, and may be available to offices in need. To view the furniture available, visit the property surplus warehouse by

Auditing Services Expands Reach



Recently, Auditing Services has been working with Financial Services to provide advisory services to departments on campus. "We really want colleges and departments to know that we are here to help," said Gina Curry, interim associate vice president of financial services. These additional services aren't new to auditing, but their collaboration with Financial Services and outreach are.

Auditing Services has begun working with both academic and non-academic departments to review their financial processes in a greater advisory role. This helps ensure a process or procedure would stand up to an external audit, and improvements, controls, or training are

suggested to help ensure an office is in compliance with all Federal, State, and University rules and practices, according to Kaye Milburn, director of Auditing Services.

"Any college or department can benefit from a review," said Curry. "Sometimes processes and procedures are best reviewed by someone who does not do them every day. An auditor's 'eye' is going to be looking for specific adherence with rules and best practices." In addition, according to Milburn, the University benefits by having departments that are less likely to have an audit finding.

The end result is focused on efficiency, explains Curry: "If we can help departments be more efficient doing the business of the University, the better chance that they won't need to call or have work sent back to them. It helps us be more efficient by having departments be more efficient." If you are interested in having a financial process evaluated, contact Auditing Services at 916-278-3561.

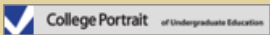
Student of the Quarter, 1st Quarter 2016 - Trevor Arendt

Behind the Scenes - Student Financial Services Supports the President's Graduation Initiatives

In this edition of Behind the Scenes, we take a look at President Nelsen's renewed focus on the graduation rates and the graduation initiative at Sacramento State.

graduation rates, decrease the time to degree, provide the classes that our students need, and close the achievement gaps."

Currently, the obstacles appear difficult to overcome. Only eight percent of Sacramento State's incoming freshman graduate in four years. Additional pressure has come from the CSU, who have set a goal of 24 percent by May of 2025.

The Student Financial Services Center (SFSC) is a key player in the initiative. With goals planned in enhanced communication, data collection and advisories, progress meters and the new One-Stop student center, the SFSC is taking their role seriously.

"When a new president arrived, we knew changes were expected, including the appointment of a graduation czar," said Curry. With the daunting task at hand, many committees and groups are working to try to meet the president's call. (Interim) Associate Vice President of Financial Services Gina Curry is a part of the Graduation Initiative Business Process Team (GIBP), composed of members from across multiple offices. In addition to Gina Curry, Elena Larson and Nicole Rogers join the committee, along with former ABA employee, Julie Carrol.

The first order of business for the team is communication. "Communication is the key to get students to see be aware of their requirements, and determine if they need advising. Students were ignoring messages through email," said Curry. As a result, the team has begun looking at new and alternative ways to reach students to communicate important deadlines, advising requirements, and other roadblocks that slow graduation. One proposed idea is via text message. Using a system similar to the Emergency Notification System (ENS), students could receive text messages alerting them if they are falling behind on financial or academic requirements.

The new One-Stop Center, targeted for full implementation in fall 2016, is another big enterprise that is hoped to support graduation. At the One-Stop Center, students can get basic questions answered on a multitude of issues

ranging from tuition payment options, financial aid and admissions information to advising. Each employee at the One-Stop Center will be trained to gain the experience to help one another. The goal is for employees to be able to help each other, and work together to serve more students.

Communication is important to the graduation initiative, but it isn't all that the team is considering. A new tool being developed is the SmartPlanner Tool. This tool would be incorporated into a student's MySacState Student Center, and would allow a student to "plan" their graduation path, with requirements built in. The significance of this tool is that it creates a feedback loop. When students begin filling in their planned classes, years ahead, the University will be able to take that data and compare it to the number of classes offered in a given subject. This will help reduce waitlists and other potential bottlenecks by offering more classes to meet expected demand, before classes fill up.

Data has been an important part of the Graduation Initiative Business Process Team, and it allows them to look at the potential causes of delayed graduation, and retention issues. For many students, they are finding they aren't progressing far enough toward a degree to keep receiving financial aid. Of the 2,363 students who had their enrollment cancelled in fall 2015, 1,545 re-enrolled, while 818 did not.



Significantly, of that 818, 723 were financial aid applicants. And of those 723 financial aid applicants, only 74 had aid offered or accepted. Students are simply not graduating in time, and are dropping out when financial aid is no longer available, which is why progressing towards a degree is so important.

Appropriately named, the Progress to Degree (P2D) project is another tool available to students. In its current form, it displays important requirements in a student's progress

towards completing their degree, including unit requirements, undergraduate requirements, and deadlines for applying for graduation. The P2D includes a "progress meter" that gives points as a student progresses through their completed items, while also listing any incomplete items needed before graduation.

The P2D tool also helps remind students of the progress needed in order to keep receiving financial aid, and alerts them to reach out to advising if they are falling behind. Seventy-five percent of students receive financial aid or loans to help pay for tuition and other expenses, so staying on track is essential.

Between P2D, the Smart Planner Tool, the One-Stop Center, and new communication methods, the GIBP Team is working hard to meet the challenge set forth by the president. "It gets me fired up," explains Curry. "When you can help a student, it can be so rewarding. Helping them is exciting, and it should be the goal for each of us."

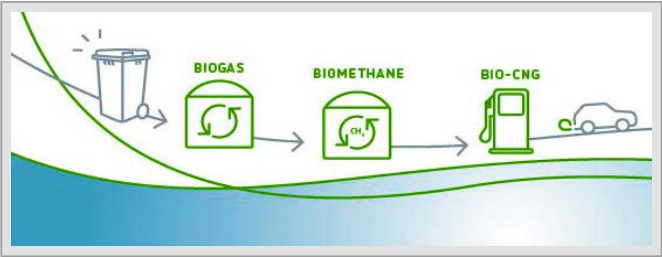

Bio-Compressed Natural Gas - Not Just Hot Air

Recycling Coordinator Joey Martinez

commented on why this is a big step forward: "Food waste is generally considered to be one of the heavier waste streams. Now that we can remove this stream from the rest of the trash, it should help to reduce the tonnage from the trash stream overall.

Yet another example of Sac State Sustainability "closing the loop," these efforts have a direct impact on our campus, and our students. "Consider the fact that this food is turned to fuel and that fuel is used by UTAPS to power Hornet Express shuttles," added Martinez. "Number don't lie. Those same shuttles now help to offset 301.5 metric tons of greenhouse gas emissions annually!"

Sac State Sustainability continues to find more ways to make our campus more sustainable, and their efforts should be applauded. Keep it up!



Teaming Up to Reduce Waste

Facilities Management has been working with ASI and the Department of Environmental Studies to create a compost yard in Lot 10. The compost lot is comprised of grass trimmings and leaves that fell naturally during fall months, and provides students with the raw materials to better understand the process of bio-conversion.

"The University generates between 400 and 450 tons of green waste each year," said Recycling Coordinator Joey Martinez. "The mulch allows students the opportunity to advance their understanding of bio-conversion, before being used on campus to help conserve water in the summer months ahead."

Dining Services is also working with students to provide food waste to add to the compost yard. Previously, this material would require haulers to remove it from campus, incurring transportation costs for the University. The new compost lot reduces costs for the University, while finding an application for what was once simply considered waste.

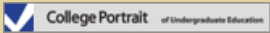

MESSAGE FROM THE VICE PRESIDENT & CFO



Message from the Vice President & CFO

In early January, President Nelsen appointed Vice President and CFO Mike Lee as interim provost and vice president for Academic Affairs, naming Ali Izadian as interim vice president for Administration and Stacy Hayano as interim chief financial officer (CFO).

This is a change for all of us, and we understand that adaptation to change is often difficult. With change, come new challenges, but we are moving forward, focusing on the goals of the university and ABA. The plans are to return all appointees to their posts once a search for the provost position is

filled.

New challenges are not only internal to ABA. President Nelsen made clear his renewed focus on graduation rates when he announced his graduation initiative – “finish in four” during his spring 2016 Presidential Address. As of May 2015, only eight percent of incoming freshman graduate in four years. By 2025, the CSU has set a standard for all CSU campuses to reach 24 percent. To accomplish this, President Nelsen has tasked all faculty and staff to evaluate their work and department budgets, and reassess them to ensure the most number of students benefit. His graduation initiative supports delivery of a great education, more quickly, and with less debt.

We welcome these challenges in ABA, as we have a fully competent group of staff professionals, committed to our students. That is why, in this edition of The FOCUS, we take a look [Behind the Scenes](#), and see the efforts our Financial Services department has made to increase student retention, and expedite graduation.

Representatives from Financial Services, collaborating with other departments on campus, have introduced new tools and applications intended to help guide students through their academic career, including the Path2Degree program, Financial Aid Progress Meter, and the SmartPlanner tool. These applications will help students meet their registration and financial deadlines, and track the courses they need to graduate. These are necessary steps to keep students on track to graduate in four years and accumulate less debt.

Other ABA departments sponsor initiatives that directly or indirectly impact students on campus. In this issue, the Staff Spotlight focuses in on Freddy Orozco, who shares how UTAPS is working to support student success.

Answering the president's call will not be easy. It will require us to re-examine how we do things in ABA. More than ever, we will need to be flexible, innovative, and focused on the tasks that lie before us. To support student success, we must continue to find cost-savings through process improvements, and strategies that serve student success. Future issues of The FOCUS will inform readers of our progress, and we look forward to updating you in the near future.

What are your biggest, yet most rewarding challenges in the workplace?
Every semester start-up is a unique challenge. There's a lot of preparation leading up to the first few days of school. It's satisfying, at the end of the first week of the semester, to know that our collective preparation got us through the busiest time of the year.

When the President announced his commitment to focus on student success, diversity in the workplace/classroom, and graduation rates, how do you feel those initiatives apply to your position and/or office?
UTAPS supervisors and management, myself included, repeatedly get called upon by faculty and students to provide real-world parking issues and/or information related to parking conditions specific to our campus and surrounding neighborhoods.

We work with students on their assignments and projects. They in turn submit their finished product for a letter grade. Our audience varies from entire classrooms to small work groups to individual students, depending on the topic at hand. Students in Journalism, for example, are given an assignment to write an article about current parking conditions. Their assignment starts with my mock press interview. Then they go off and interview faculty, staff and other students. This is just one example. We will continue to look for new ways to work with academic departments.

One of my responsibilities is the management of the student commuter pass program. We, the University, offer one of the best alternative transportation programs that I know of in the student commuter pass program. Many students don't necessarily have to drive to campus and purchase a parking permit if they don't want to. Instead, students may pick up a commuter sleeve, which they've already paid for through tuition fees. The Sac State student commuter pass allows students to ride Sacramento Regional Transit (RT) anywhere and anytime it is in service, as well as neighboring transit agencies with which RT has transfer agreements. Students can come to campus, go downtown, shopping or to the movies on the RT bus and light rail systems at no extra cost. This seems like a great way for students to save some money.

Speaking of money, Hornet Shuttle drivers are all Sac State students. We hire them. We train them, and at the end of their training they have a Class B license to drive our shuttle buses with passenger and air brake endorsements. We accept applications year-round.

What is your favorite aspect of working on campus?

I enjoy the variety of my daily schedule. The nature of my duties requires that I spend time in my office, but it also offers the luxury of allowing me to roam the campus, often, at my convenience. It's a beautiful campus and having a job that allows me the opportunity to enjoy the outdoors while conducting business with UTAPS and other campus employees and students is pretty sweet.
