5. Combine numerical analysis and computer programs in overall substation designs.
6. Compare different engineering design solutions from their economic sides.

The assessments is done very effectively by examining the overall number of points accumulated on quizzes and tests.

1. A short written quiz is administered in class after each chapter is covered in lectures.
Each quiz is valued 30 - 50 points. There are altogether twelve quizzes.
2. One homework is assigned per chapter of text material presented in the class.
Each homework is valued 100 points. There are altogether ten homework assignments.
3. Two midterm exams are given in the class approximately covering first two thirds of the text material.
Each midterm exam is valued 100 points.
4. A final exam (a take-home-type) covers the last third of the text material but contains all theoretical elements presented over the entire semester. Final exam is valued 100 points.



