Briefly describe the program proposal (new or change) and provide a justification. The Art Department has created a new 48 unit concentration in the Art major, Studio Art Methods, to work in tandem with the professionally oriented 60 unit BA in Art Studio that has been in place since 2007. Creating this lower-unit concentration will meet CSU mandates for unit limits in non-professional degrees. The Art Department has been informed that it will receive no new tenure-track faculty hires until it comes into compliance with the CSU mandate. The Department had more Studio Art faculty when it was a 48 unit program than it does now, and urgently needs to replace retiring positions to maintain stability in the program, supporting advising, committee structures, and curricular innovation. The lower unit BA will be consistent with other CSU Liberal Arts BA in Art programs, and therefore will be competitive in attracting students. The faculty can see the usefulness of a lower unit BA, and some students will benefit from the availability of a 48-unit program. However a non-professional degree does not fit all students. The 48-unit curriculum will focus on breadth of experience and understanding rather than professional specialization, therefore it will not be suitable for students applying for graduate school, for professional practice in the community, or for a career in art. A new program – a 72 unit BFA Studio Art degree that the Studio Art faculty is creating – will address student and regional need for a professional degree in Studio Art, and will eventually replace the existing 60-unit BA.

Fiscal Analysis of Proposed Changes

At present, with the exception of students with catalog rights prior to fall 2008, all studio concentration students follow the 60 unit BA requirements. The 60 unit concentration can be completed within the 120 unit count for the BA degree and it provides sufficient depth for exceptional students to enter MFA professional degree programs. Roadmaps designed by Art Studio faculty demonstrate pathways for completion of the degree within a 4-year period for both transfer and native students.

The department is introducing a new concentration, a 48 unit BA in Art, to comply with the CSU mandate for lower unit non-professional degrees. Working in conjunction with the existing 60 unit BA in Studio Art, the new 48 unit BA will offer students another choice of Studio Art concentration in the Art major: they may do a 48 unit concentration (Studio Art Methods) or a 60 unit concentration (Art Studio). The 60 unit concentration will be phased out contingent upon the implementation of a 72 unit BFA for those seeking to serve the community in a professional capacity.

We do not expect the number of Art majors to change significantly with the addition of the 48 unit concentration. The overall numbers of our majors have dropped (along with those of the College) from approximately 281 students in 2008, to 217 in 2012. This reduction follows in step with the reduction of the faculty and the number of course sections offered. In fall of 2007 there were 60 studio art sections. In the fall of 2013 there were 40 studio art sections. In spite of the loss of 6 Art Studio tenure-track faculty members since the inception of the 60 unit BA in 2008, the remaining eight Art Studio faculty have successfully implemented the concentration and served GE.

The new 48 unit concentration in the Art major (Studio Art Methods) is based on the existing curriculum which has served the 60 unit concentration for several years. No additional space, equipment, operating expenses, library, computer, or media resources, clerical/technical support, or other resources will be needed. The changes will be accommodated within the Department/College's existing fiscal resources.

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION [revised sections are in blue font]

The Department of Art at Sacramento State introduces students to the expressive world of the fine arts. A wide variety of approaches based on both Western and Non-Western cultures are integrated into courses that are oriented toward creativity, imagination, and critical thinking. Students are able to explore art through courses in art education, art history, ceramics, metalsmithing/jewelry, new media, painting, printmaking, photography, and interdisciplinary sculpture.

The Department's undergraduate program offers courses in four general areas, three of which may be taken as concentrations within the Art major (Art History, Studio Art Methods, and Art Studio), while the fourth prepares students to pursue a teaching credential (Art Education, a variation of the Studio Art Methods concentration). Undergraduate students also may earn a Bachelor of Arts in Photography by taking courses in the Departments of Art and Design. The Department of Art's graduate program leads to a Master of Arts degree in Studio Art.

The Art History curriculum provides a range of courses in Western and non-Western art, criticism, and visual culture from pre-history to the present and from many perspectives, both formal and contextual. These courses produce college-level visual literacy, multicultural awareness, art historical skills, and an understanding of art-making practices. Studio Art experiences develop the creative and artistic skills necessary for mastery of established styles and for exploration of new ones. They also reward students with an introduction to a lifetime appreciation of the arts. Courses in Art Education provide an understanding of the behavioral aspects of art, with regard to the creator, the viewer, and the developing person. The Art Education program includes instruction in art history, art studio materials and processes, community-based art education theories and practices, art for special populations, and the California Visual Arts Content standards.

Courses, programs, and exhibitions sponsored by the Art Department serve to engage students in the fine arts within a liberal arts context and to promote appreciation of the fine arts in the general student population. Fieldwork experiences can be arranged with the Crocker Art Museum, California State Archives, Sacramento Metropolitan Arts Commission, and other public and private art institutions and galleries in the Capital region. Opportunities to study art and art history abroad are available through the Office of Global Education at Sacramento State and the California State University International Program. University credit can be obtained for a semester to a year of study at college and international centers in Britain, Europe, Latin America, Asia, Africa, and Australia. California State University, Sacramento is an accredited institutional member of the National Association of Schools of Art and Design (NASAD).
