Consider purchasing recycled cartridges from a reputable vendor. Visit www.csus.edu/proc/Small_DVBEpercent20Businesses/toner.htm for Procurement's list of small business toner and ink cartridge vendors. Set the printer preferences to the lightest setting appropriate for your print job.

Some recycling tips: do not throw ink and toner cartridges in the trash. It is bad for the environment, and they can be remanufactured for reuse.

Please do not give or mail your ink and toner cartridges to outside sources. We recycle right here on campus. The University has a contractual agreement with a toner and ink cartridge recycler and receives a recycling stipend which helps fund the recycling program.

Departments can request a collection box (17" square x 2' tall) from Kathleen Reynolds, integrated waste manager, at 278-5801.

Old cell phones can also be collected with the used ink and toner cartridges. Remember to remove the SIM card.

Companies hot for Sac State engineering and computer science students

The economy may be cooling off, but the need for engineers is heating up, especially in Northern California. Sacramento State's College of Engineering and Computer Science is preparing to host the largest hiring event in campus history.

Representatives from 130 engineering or engineering-related companies will be on campus from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m., Monday, March 10 in the University Union Ballroom for the annual College of Engineering and Computer Science career fair. A series of career seminars from various companies such as PG&E, Intel, Caltrans and AT&T will be presented throughout the day in the Union as well.

"The demand for engineers and computer scientists has been largely unaffected by the current economic disruption," says CiCi Mattiuzzi, director of career services for the College of Engineering and Computer Science. "Companies scheduled to attend have more than 3,500 job openings."

The greatest demand is for civil engineering candidates, she says. A total of 90 companies are seeking graduates with a civil engineering major, 55 are hoping to hire construction management majors, 47 companies have openings for mechanical engineers, 44 are seeking electrical and electronic engineering majors and 37 are hiring computer engineering majors. There are 32 openings for computer science majors.

Mattiuzzi says the overall labor market for technical professionals is strong and growing throughout the region and the state because of expanding areas of business, population growth, baby boomer retirements, growing demand for infrastructure, new government regulations and new technology requirements.

"Sacramento is a particularly good market because it has an excellent mix of government and private sector employers," she says.

The fair is open to College of Engineering and Computer Science students and alumni.

Negro League tribute game rousing success

Despite forecasts of a ferocious downpour and blustery winds, the Feb. 23 game organized by Sac State students Donte and Dominic Morris to honor Negro Leaguers was a rousing success.

The approximately 50 spectators at McAuliffe Field were treated to a spirited game between teams representing the recreational league formed by the Morris twins. Their 1930s-style uniforms were purchased by the President's Office.

The game was a tribute to African-American athletes in times past who played with a passion despite the fact that they were denied the opportunity to participate in the national past time.

Frank Williams, one of the honored guests, played with the Kansas City Monarchs and represented his team in the league's final all-star game in 1960. Both Williams and Jethro McIntyre, who played ball in the Montreal Expos farm system, were feted during pregame ceremonies by President Alexander Gonzalez, who presented them with replicas of Negro League uniforms.

After commending the Negro League's storied history, Gonzalez also praised the nearly two dozen Sacramento State students who had worked so hard to organize events for Black History Month, noting that their efforts epitomize what makes the University a special place.

University joins national effort to track sustainability in higher education

Sacramento State has joined 90 other college and university campuses in the pilot phase of a program designed to create national standards for environmental sustainability in higher education. Called STARS (Sustainability Tracking, Assessment, and Rating System), the national program was launched last month.

The campus has long been committed to sustainability efforts, says Mike Christensen, assistant vice president for Risk Management Services and Environmental Health and Safety. But participation in the STARS program will provide Sacramento State and the other campuses with a common yardstick to measure their success.

"Sustainability means operating today in a way that ensures environmental quality for future generations," Christensen says. "We've been doing it a long time."

Sustainability efforts abound on the campus, he says. Examples include building and renovating properly, planning drainage, being energy efficient, taking greatest advantage of natural light, recycling, recapturing waste water, and using alternative fuel vehicles, among many others.

During STARS' 12-month pilot period, Christensen and his counterparts in other universities will gather sustainability data and report their findings to AASHE—the Association for the Advancement of Sustainability in Higher Education—which will devise an "apples to apples" system for comparing the institutions' sustainability success.

"STARS allows universities to work together," Christensen says. "It is designed to help universities develop a uniform standard, and to compare ourselves to one another, and learn from one another."

Library reception celebrates Festival and two art exhibitions

Art aficionados attending the March 14 gathering in the Library Gallery will find three receptions in one. The 5 p.m. soiree is a celebration for the Festival of the Arts, the four-day focus on Sacramento State's fine art, design, performance and literary programs. The reception is expected to pack the galleries and will include remarks by Jeffrey D. Mason, dean of the College of Arts and Letters. Hors d'oeuvres and refreshments will be served.

Participants who want to extend the evening may want to get advance tickets for one of the Festival's other offerings that begin at 8 p.m. *42nd Street* will be on stage at the University Theatre in Shasta Hall. A faculty recital will feature Lorna Peters on the harpsichord in Room 151 of Capistrano Hall. And the Dangerous Lorraines modern dance and performance group will be in Solano Hall 1010.

Tickets for that night's performance of *42nd Street* are \$15 general admission; \$12 for students, seniors and Sacramento State employees; and \$10 for children 11 years old or younger. Peters' recital tickets are \$8 general and \$5 for students and seniors. Tickets for both events are available at the Sacramento State Ticket office, 278-4323 or www.tickets.com. Dangerous Lorraines tickets are \$8 general and \$5 for students and available at 278-6369 or 278-7033.

During the reception, the audience will be treated to works from Sacramento State's own instructors with the Faculty Art Show. The exhibition will feature pieces in various media from about 30 members of the University's Art department. It will run through May 24.

And "La Raza Galeria Posada" will celebrate 30 years of the cultural center in Sacramento with a display of pieces from the center's archives. This exhibition is from the University's Special Collections of a recent acquisition gifted from La Raza Galeria Posada. The display runs through April 19.

“Disaster-vision” in the making

The effects of fire, flood and earthquakes will be on display—and in 3-D—at the next Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) lecture, 7:30 p.m., Tuesday, March 4 in the University Union Ballroom.

Gerald Bawden, with the U.S. Geological Survey, will explain how geologists use high-tech 3-D glasses to visualize imagery that can detect changes in the earth that cause landslides, debris flows, floods, dam failures, mine collapses, beach erosion and glacier retreat.

Using 3-D glasses, audience members will view the development of disasters including how a bridge that crosses the San Andreas Fault slowly began to bend after the 2004 Parkfield, Calif., earthquake; how Southern California fires stripped canyon walls of hill slope-stabilizing vegetation, thereby leaving the area vulnerable to debris flows and how record rainfall in Southern California saturated the ground and led to the catastrophic collapse of a Laguna Beach neighborhood in 2005.

Fred D. Miller Jr., a professor of philosophy and the executive director of the Social Philosophy and Policy Center, Bowling Green State University, Ohio, will discuss whether Plato and Aristotle, who are considered to be the fathers of human rights, really had a conception of the rights of persons, 3 p.m., Thursday, March 6, in the University Union's Hinde Auditorium.

Ben Rich, of the Schools of Medicine and of Law, University of California, Davis, will discuss the ethical implications of medicine's failure to competently and consistently provide pain relief to patients, 3 p.m., Wednesday, March 12, in the University Union's California Suite.

The Center for Practical and Professional Ethics was founded in 2005 by the Philosophy Department as a complement to the department's teaching and scholarly focus on ethics.

Sacramento State's eighth annual Arts Resource Faire on Saturday, March 8, will show educators and others how to incorporate the arts into the classroom teaching of other subjects. It will run from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. at the University Union. Admission is free.

The event, a project of the College of Education's graduate program of Arts in Education, will feature musical, theatrical and visual arts presentations, and 60 “hands-on” workshops on integrating those arts into classroom curriculum. Vendors will also be on hand to discuss materials and services for arts instruction. Some 700 teachers, student-teachers, administrators, artists and parents are expected to attend.

The event opens with songs by Sacramento State literature for children instructor Francie Dillon and the Woodwind Quintet from the Sacramento Philharmonic performing “Carnival of the Animals.” There will also be a Wax Museum of Living History by Creative Connections Academy middle school students, a blues music

history presentation called "Blues in the Schools," and the band Horse Sense performing "Songs of the Western Soil."

"It's to show teachers how to teach arts, not just for the arts' sake, but also to help classroom teachers integrate the arts into other subjects across the curriculum," says College of Education professor Crystal Olson.

"It's a fabulous event," says Julie Giese, a Stockton third-grade teacher. "It teaches that, for example, if a student has a literature assignment, instead of filling out worksheet after worksheet, they may instead make a painting or write a play about it. Hornets Nest floor to be re-named Colberg Court

Debby Colberg won't be on the sidelines of the Hornets Nest coaching the Sacramento State volleyball squad this fall, but every Hornet team that plays there will compete on a floor bearing her name at the beginning of the new school year.

Beginning in the fall, Sacramento State volleyball and basketball teams will play their home games on Colberg Court, named in honor of the 32-year veteran coach who retired at the conclusion of the 2007 season.

Joseph Sheley, Sacramento State provost and vice president for Academic Affairs, made the announcement to a crowd of nearly 300 guests in attendance at Colberg's retirement banquet Feb. 24.

In addition, Colberg was named as an immediate inductee into the Sacramento State Athletics Hall of Fame and was presented with a plaque and lifetime athletic pass at the Sunday evening event.

The winningest coach in any sport at Sacramento State, Colberg posted an 828-292 record, garnered two national titles and posted winning volleyball seasons in 30 of her 32 years as head coach.

Colberg, who guided her squads to 20 NCAA Tournament appearances, was also inducted into the American Volleyball Coaches Association (AVCA) Hall of Fame in December.

Students build on reputation for excellence at construction competition

Sacramento State students went to Sparks, Nevada Feb. 14-16 and came back with something extra—three first-place finishes at the annual Associated Schools of Construction Student Competition.

The three six-person teams from the College of Engineering and Computer Science's Construction Management Department took first in the design-build mock construction competition, the mechanical competition and the commercial competition, beating out schools in the Western region.

Teams were not required to build facilities or mockups, but had to develop design solutions, estimates, schedules, site logistics plans, design development and construction management plans for proposed multi-million dollar projects.

"We were given a request for proposal for a \$20 million, 150,000-square foot office building," says Isaac Dye, a senior construction management student. "We met all deadlines, handed in six copies of a 75-page proposal and gave a 45-minute oral presentation to a panel of judges and a room full of construction industry representatives."

"The completion represents exactly what happens in the real world," says professor Mikael Anderson, faculty advisor for the team. "In fact, all the projects students worked on came from drawings and specifications of projects the construction company sponsors had actually built."

Two of the teams will continue on to the Associated School of Construction-Associated General Contractors of America National Student Competition in Las Vegas March 9-12. The third team, mechanical division, was the national competition's first-place winner.

Of the more than 30 schools participating in the competition, Sacramento State had the most first-place finishes in the various events. Anderson credited the partnership between the Construction Management Program and private industry for the teams' success. The teams were sponsored by the Sacramento Construction Management Education Foundation and coached by faculty in the Construction Management Department and members of local construction companies.

What do people think you do?

"They know we issue the OneCard but there's a lot of confusion about what the OneCard is. We get a lot of people, students particularly, who come into the office and they've been told they need a card but they're not sure why or what it is."

What does the card really do?

"It does many, many things. It's the official ID for the University. It's a library card. You can deposit money on it and use it on and off campus to make purchases at different vendors. Students receive 100 free pages every semester to use the printers in the computer labs. It's a discount copy card. You can link your OneCard to a Wells Fargo checking account and it can be your ATM card."

Describe your office.

"We're located in the Brighton Hall Annex and although we're in the middle of campus people often walk right by our office and don't even know we're here. We're also a pretty small operation; it's just me and a student assistant most of the time with extra help when we're especially busy. The beginning of the semester is always extremely busy."

What surprises people?

"How many uses the OneCard has."

What is your biggest challenge?

"Having to reissue cards to the entire campus last semester was a big challenge. Getting information to everyone is another one. One example is the 100 pages students receive every semester to use with the printers. It's equal in value to \$5 but it's not like having cash on your card. But students think they receive money and try to purchase things or use the photocopy machines. It's taken a long time to educate everyone on how that works and what it is and isn't. It can also be quite a challenge to get people to us. You'll notice in Brighton Hall there are lots of signs directing people to go outside the building to find our office."

What do you get asked the most?

"How to find other buildings. Questions about what the card does. People often mistake us for the SacLink office so they want us to reset the password on their e-mail accounts. We get asked all kinds of questions."
