President's sister to speak on campus

Maya Soetoro-Ng, sister of President Barack Obama, will give a speech on leadership and service at 2 p.m., Tuesday, March 17, in the University Union Ballroom.

The lecture is sponsored by Sacramento State's Cooper-Woodson College Enhancement Program, UNIQUE Programs and the Departments of Pan African Studies, Asian American Studies and Ethnic Studies.

Ng was invited to speak by Boatamo Mosupyoe, director of CWC. She and Ng are board members of Global Majority, a non-profit organization promoting non-violent conflict resolution.

Ng, who was born in Jakarta, Indonesia, is a high school teacher at a school for girls in Hawaii. She teaches world cultures, U.S. history and the Constitution and Peacemakers, a course she designed on the power of nonviolence. She is also a lecturer at the University of Hawaii's College of Education where she teaches multi-cultural education and the history of education.

She holds a master's degree in secondary education and a doctorate in international comparative education. She and her husband Konrad have a 4-year-old daughter, Suhaila.

Summit provides opportunity to discuss assessment

Sacramento State Provost Joseph Sheley, in collaboration with the Provost's Advisory Committee on Assessment and the Office of Academic Program Assessment, will hold the second Assessment Summit 1-4 p.m., Monday, March 9, in the University Union Forest Suite.

The theme this year is "Showcasing our Assessment, Celebrating our Success." The summit is designed to give the campus community an opportunity to learn about the status of assessment and to preview campus submissions that were competitively reviewed and accepted for presentation at the annual Western Association of Schools and Colleges meeting in April.

In addition to remarks by Sheley, other speakers will include a PACA panel and presentations by Otis Scott, Dean of the College of Social Sciences and Interdisciplinary Studies and sociology Professor Amy Liu; art professor Daniel Frye and Music Department chair Ernie Hills; and professor Roberta Ching, Learning Skills.

The summit is also an opportunity to showcase the University's progress with assessment, to elicit comments that could help refine and enhance campus presentation at the WASC conference, and to demonstrate to WASC the University's commitment to improve student learning says Don Taylor, director of Academic Planning and Quality.

The Sacramento State debate team was named the Policy Debate State champion in the Novice Division during a tournament at Cal Poly, San Luis Obispo, Feb. 27-March 1.

The two-student team of junior Katie Rupp and senior Gerald Clift won its division after a 5-1 run in the preliminaries. They went on to win unanimous decisions in the quarter, semi-quarter and final rounds, defeating top seeded USC.

The Novice Division is for students in their first year of debate. This is the first state championship in that division for Sacramento State, says debate coach and communication studies professor Kristen Tudor.

Sacramento State will host the Western Novice and Junior Varsity tournament Friday and Saturday, March 6 and 7, in Sacramento State's Mendocino Hall.

Doctorate in Educational Leadership program seeks applicants

Applications are being accepted for the third cohort of Sacramento State's doctoral program in Educational Leadership. Students interested in assuming key executive leadership positions in California's P-12 schools and community colleges are encouraged to apply.

The program provides students an opportunity to complete a doctoral degree in three years.

"The program equips leaders with the skills to improve the educational attainment of students," says program director Carlos Nevarez. "We're recruiting men and women who want to solve problems in education. That's essential," he says. "Then we sharpen their analytical skills. We want them to be reformers and leaders."

The Ed.D is an independent educational doctoral degree, and is designed for working professionals and practitioners in the field of education, with class meetings held on weekends and evenings. The three-year advanced study plan is data driven and emphasizes hands-on practice, policy analysis, leadership skills and individual initiative. Classes follow the cohort learning model and students progress and develop their skills as a team.

Judy Montgomery has seen technology come and go on campus. She graduated from Sacramento State in 1982 with a degree in computer science and has worked here since as a computer software specialist.

She is a software developer/analyst in Student Information Systems with Information Resources and Technology and is responsible for modifications and problem solving for the records area and system maintenance of the PeopleSoft computer system on campus.

With more than 25 years of campus history, Montgomery has helped the University go through two major software conversions, each taking two or more years and commanding the attention of 50-plus people every day. "Millions of records had to be transferred and made accessible, but first we had to 'learn to make it fit,'" she says.

Montgomery was also part of a team that changed the way registration is handled on campus. "When I first started here, there was no online registration, there wasn't even telephone registration," she says. "People came to campus and stood in line to register for classes. Now, we are fully on the web for everything that students need to do. That's a huge improvement."

Although Judy and the administrative computing staff have an important role to play in supporting the campus function, they are fairly anonymous to the campus. "Few people understand the teamwork required, the constant updating, the problem solving and the troubleshooting that keeps our system running," she says.

The recognition may not always be there, but as technology continues to come and go, her efforts will help keep the University going forward.
