## **Forum to focus on budget cuts**

An all-campus meeting on the state budget will take place at noon, Tuesday, March 18 in the University Theatre in Shasta Hall. Students, faculty, staff, alumni, parents and members of the administration will develop strategies designed to move state elected officials to reduce or eliminate proposed cuts to the California State University system. For the hearing impaired, an interpreter will be provided on stage.

Sacramento State President Alexander Gonzalez will be joined by Associated Students president Christina Romero, Faculty Senate chair Bruce Bikle, Sacramento State Alumni Association president Sam Starks, California Faculty Association chapter president Lila Jacobs, and representatives from unions representing campus employees and others who are part of an Alliance for the CSU.

The University-wide Assembly is part of a larger system-wide effort to address the impact of a proposed \$386 million budget reduction to the 23-campus system. Participants will be encouraged to mobilize the public and contact their state representatives and Gov. Schwarzenegger, urging them to consider alternative solutions to the state's fiscal challenges.

Concerns for the campus include potential restrictions on student access in the form of limits on enrollment, larger class sizes, reduced student support and potentially higher student fees. System-wide, the proposed cuts are estimated to force campuses to turn away 10,000 students, particularly those from underserved communities, and limit enrollment to 2007-08 levels.

The impact could also be significant in the Capital Region, where Sacramento State graduates the majority of the area's teachers, nurses and engineers, as well as many of the employees who keep state government functioning. One of 26 area residents is a Sacramento State alumnus.

In addition to providing the region's workforce, the campus generates a total impact of more than \$930 million on the regional economy. This sustains more than 16,000 jobs in the region, and generates nearly \$52 million per year in tax revenue.

## **New digital landmark dots Sacramento State's skyline**

A digital communication sign being built at Sacramento State near Highway 50 will inform the public about campus events, boost the University's visibility and raise revenue while also providing a means to alert motorists about highway conditions and law-enforcement emergencies.

The sleek, modern structure will prominently feature the Sacramento State name and logo and will become a landmark for the campus. Near the top of the sign will be a state-of-the-art 48-foot wide message board for commercial advertisements and University messages.

The sign will be owned, operated and maintained by Clear Channel Outdoors, a subsidiary of Clear Channel Communications, through a 25-year lease agreement negotiated through the University's non-profit business operations function, University Enterprises, Inc. The sign will display up to eight messages every 64 seconds, and Sacramento State will program one of those messages.

"This is a major avenue for the University to promote its educational, social and community programs at no cost to the school," says Matt Altier, executive director of UEI. "It would cost thousands, if not hundreds of thousands of dollars to have these messages in a high-traffic location like Highway 50."

In addition to free advertising, the University will receive \$750,000 from Clear Channel when the sign is completed and will receive a portion of the revenue from advertisements over the course of the contract. University President Alexander Gonzalez has earmarked \$300,000 of the initial payment for grants for faculty to travel to academic conferences and to conduct research.

The sign, which will be built on a small stretch of University land on the south side of campus near the recycling center, will stand about 55 feet above the elevated portion of the highway where it crosses Folsom Boulevard. The sign will also be used as part of the California Amber Alert Program and will be accessible to the California Highway Patrol, Caltrans and the FBI during major accidents and law-enforcement emergencies.

"I think this is a great idea," says CHP public affairs officer Steve Merchant. "Anytime we have an avenue to publicize current events, whether it's tragedies or safety reminders, is definitely a great thing."

Construction of the sign is expected to begin by late April and be completed by early fall. The message board uses the latest in LED technology to eliminate glare and light leakage sometimes associated with older types of electronic signs. "This sign features automatic brightness controls that continuously adjust for varying ambient day, night and weather conditions so that it is visible but not overbearing," says Altier.

## **Big things ahead for Sac State's big band**

Sacramento State's big band will swing into Monterey next month where the Jazz Ensemble I will compete with groups from across the nation for a spot in the prestigious Monterey Jazz Festival.

The 18-member ensemble will take part in the annual Next Generation Festival, April 3-6. Sac State's jazz men and women will face-off against competitors from five other schools in the College Big Band Division. If they're victorious, the musicians will be invited to perform at the Monterey Jazz Festival, Sept. 19-21.

What was it like getting selected as one of the six best big bands in the nation?

"It was awesome," says saxophonist Joe Berry. "The competition and caliber of players are pretty high. It shows that hard work pays off."

Sacramento State won its spot in the competition after submitting a CD for review to faculty at the Berklee College of Music in Boston, says music professor Steve Roach, director of the University's Jazz Studies program.

The other competitors are CSU Long Beach, CSU Northridge, Central Washington University, Florida International University and the University of Michigan. Many of their jazz programs have much longer histories than Sacramento State, Roach says. "It's an honor just to get there. I'm thrilled to be a part of that line-up."

The bands perform one after another before a panel of judges, and the winner is announced about 20 minutes after the last group performs, Roach says.

One of the Jazz Ensemble players already has some experience in this arena. Trombone player Sam Griffith competed at the festival in the high school division all four years he attended Monterey High School. He's also worked on the festival's production crew and had some of the judges as teachers.

Both students are optimistic about their chances.

The band already sounds good and there's still a month to prepare, Griffith says. "I definitely like our odds."

Berry notes that the group has played one of their competition pieces, "You Must Believe in Spring," in public several times. And the ensemble will get even more experience before the public when it performs with saxophonist Dave Pietro on March 13.

The invitation demonstrates how far Sac State's jazz program has come since the concentration in that field was established in 2001, Roach says.

Griffith is completing his graduate work at the University after attending New School University in Manhattan. "When I met professor Roach, I realized the master's program would be a good fit for me," Griffith says.

"I just figured, study with the best," Berry adds.

And jazz itself continues to attract the kind of musicians who like to take chances. "It's like the only music in the western world where the highest risk yields the greatest results," Berry says.

## **Sacramento State seniors, your government wants you**

Students looking for employment with city, state, federal and other government agencies will have a chance to meet with recruiters at a job fair, 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., Wednesday, March 19, in the University Union Ballroom.

"Government agencies are not always as affected by the economy as private industry, so there continues to be a strong need for qualified graduates to go into these positions," said Analia Mendez, associate director of the Career Center. "Government jobs pay well and offer great benefits and long-term job security."

The fair received a boost recently when the Center was awarded a \$3,000 Call to Serve Grant from the Partnership for Public Service and the federal Office of Personnel Management. The funds were used to help bring in more agencies and promote federal positions, Mendez said.

More than 40 government agencies will have representatives at the fair. A snapshot includes the California Franchise Tax Board, the governor's office, the California Highway Patrol, area law enforcement, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration, the Department of Defense, and the Department of Energy.

"Companies will be looking for all majors," Mendez said. "A lot of people think they are looking for students in political science or public administration, but the interest is across the board."

## **University director receives Accessible Technology award**

Sacramento State's director of Academic Technology and Creative Services, Jean-Pierre Bayard, received the Accessible Technology Initiative (ATI) Champion Award for his efforts at implementing ATI on campus.

Bayard received the award from the California State University Office of the Chancellor at the annual CSU Northridge Conference on Technology and Persons with Disabilities ceremony March 12.

"We have been a leading campus in ATI in the state," Bayard says. "ATI is an unfunded mandate, but Sacramento State has chosen to take leadership and fund it as part of our broader core mission to provide accessibility to everyone."

The term accessible technologies generally refers to electronic technologies that allow people with disabilities to access content from electronic communication applications such as televisions, computer hardware and software, e-mail and the internet. Examples include closed captioning and screen readers.

In 2006, the California State University system developed the ATI and directed its 23 campuses to begin ensuring information, technology and resources were accessible to all people by 2012. Instructional materials and technology purchases, including web applications, hardware, software, telecommunications and multimedia products, must conform to accessibility standards or provide equally effective alternative forms of access.

"In the fall we held a campus wide forum that really sensitized the campus community as to the need to have accessibility in instructional materials," Bayard said.

Sacramento State has about 600 students who have self-identified to the Services to Students with Disabilities office. The number could be higher since students are not required to self-identify.

## **On the Job with the Research Administration and Contract Administration**

The *Bulletin* spoke with David Earwicker, assistant vice president of Research Administration and Contract Administration.

### **What do people think you do?**

People typically think we submit their proposals and manage their grants and contracts. They also see us as the place to go for the internal awards programs and human subjects committee protocols. We are often seen as a place to go directly for resources. In fact, we help shorten the time and distance between concept development and funding.

### **What do you really do?**

Our great fortune is that we get to work with a dynamite group of faculty and staff collaborators who are actively engaged in research, scholarship and student support. Our enviable task is to celebrate the efforts of our faculty to a broader external audience interested in supporting our faculty's work. With internal funds for scholarly activity limited, we realize the importance of obtaining external support for the numerous activities underway on this campus.

### **Describe your office.**

We're a partnership between Academic Affairs and University Enterprises, Inc. (UEI), and our approach brings a new energy to this aspect of campus. As a hybrid unit, we have many constituencies deserving attention and support. We bridge the intellectual inquiry of the campus with the entrepreneurial spirit of UEI in order to help our internal clients and their ideas compete in a very difficult funding environment.

For UEI we coordinate the Student Employment Services program, which supports more than 1,500 student employment positions across the region, and we also manage the accounts functions for the University Foundation at Sacramento State.

**What surprises people?**

How enthusiastic we are about their research and project ideas and the ways in which we can work with them to translate ideas into reality with sponsor funding. We're helpful, we're motivated, we're professional and we're focused on our faculty, staff and students and their success.

**What's your biggest challenge?**

I would say that getting people to recognize the ways in which we can help them. Our recent changes allow us to be even more responsive and creative, and we are moving this summer to the third floor of the new Hornet Bookstore, so our new location will be even more convenient for people to come by, investigate funding opportunities and talk with us about their project ideas.

We also help funded projects spend their resources within the rules -- and often there are quite a few rules -- so our efforts can at times seem constraining. We are sincere and flexible always, but at times need to be firm. Meeting people's expectations while staying within guidelines can be a challenge sometimes. But we enjoy a good challenge.

**What do you get asked the most?**

First, "Do you have any money for our project?" The answer is "no" but we can help people and organizations in their pursuit of external funds for that exciting project. The second is, "Why are you making me go through this paperwork?" Well, it is actually a federal/state/California State University system requirement, but we work to try and make it easier and faster for our customers.
