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## Digital sign spreads the Sacramento State word

Sacramento State's new digital communication sign is generating a lot of interest and enthusiasm, and has already helped law enforcement spread the word about a missing child.

The new era of communications began Aug. 5 as the sign went into operation, touting Sacramento State's "Great Professors" for its first message. Motorists passing by on Highway 50 have also been told about shopping opportunities at the Hornet bookstore, and the University's upcoming home football opener on Saturday, Aug. 30 against Humboldt State.

Three days after its inauguration, the sign got its first test as a law-enforcement tool, displaying an Amber Alert Aug. 8 in connection with the abduction of a 16-year-old girl and her 1-year-old daughter in Yolo County. The two were eventually found unharmed and a suspect was arrested.

Up to eight messages will be displayed every 64 seconds, and Sacramento State will have one of those eight-second messages in each lineup to promote the University and its events. The University is using its time to promote events and programs and acknowledge the achievements of students, faculty and staff.

Faculty members will benefit from the sign, too. Clear Channel is paying the University \$750,000 in an initial payment. University President Alexander Gonzalez has set aside \$300,000 of that for grants to cover costs of faculty research and travel to academic conferences.

### Fine Art

First up is "Traces: Contemporary Romanian Art," a collection of more than 50 pieces from artists who have shaped their talents in the years following the 1989 fall of the dictator Nicolae Ceausescu. The exhibition will be in the Else Gallery of Kadema Hall, Sept. 2 through Oct. 3 and will include a reception, artists' panel and

screening of Romanian director Cristian Nemescu's *California Dreaming*. Gallery hours are noon - 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday.

Two exhibitions begin the new school year at Sacramento State's Library galleries.

"The Storyteller's Art" features a 40-year retrospective of Kit Hinrichs' work. A graphic principal of the San Francisco office of Pentagram, Hinrichs' work can be viewed in diverse places such as catalogs, exhibits and books. The show runs Sept. 5 through Nov. 15 in the Library's main gallery, open 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., Tuesday through Saturday and includes a lecture by Hinrichs.

At the same time, the Library's annex gallery will show *Children of the Wind*, Kent Lacin's collection of color and black-and-white photographs documenting homeless teenagers in the Sacramento area. The show runs Sept. 5 through Oct. 4 and includes a panel discussion on teen homelessness, an artist's reception and a benefit concert.

The Library gallery offerings continue with the annual "Heart Gallery" Oct. 14 through Nov. 21, featuring photos of young people seeking a permanent home through adoption. A reception will be held 5-8 p.m., Friday, Sept. 5. And the Dauer Ceramics Collection will run Dec. 5 through Feb. 28.

Library galleries are open 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., Tuesday through Saturday.

The Else Gallery will follow the Romanian art exhibit with a display of wood-fired ceramics, Oct. 6-31, featuring about 60 pieces by 16 artists.

And both the Else and Witt galleries in Kadema Hall will host exhibitions by instructors, students and guest artists through Dec. 19.

All World Music Series concerts are held at 8 p.m. in the Music Recital Hall of Capistrano Hall.

Guest artists this season include flutist Kathryn Peisart, who will perform at 7:30 p.m., Tuesday, Sept. 30. The prestigious Piano Series features Faina Lushtak at 7:30 p.m., Saturday, Oct. 4. Both concerts are in the Music Recital Hall.

The annual Festival of New American Music returns Nov. 6-16. This year's edition of FeNAM features performances by the Cygnus Ensemble, sound and video artist Betsey Biggs, the Seattle Chamber Players, and "Bang-on-a-Bass" by Robert Black. All performances are free.

Sacramento State's student ensembles also have a full schedule, including concerts by the Symphonic Wind Ensemble, the Concert Band, Symphony Orchestra, Jazz Ensembles, vocal jazz groups, baroque ensemble Camerata Capistrano, the University's choral groups and the Opera Theatre.

## **University kicks off football season**

Sacramento State opens its football season against Humboldt State, 6:05 p.m., Saturday, Aug. 30, at Hornet Stadium.

The Hornets begin the year with four home games in five weeks. The squad returns five defensive starters from a unit which led the Big Sky Conference in rushing yards allowed.

Sacramento State students are admitted free to all regular season home games. Tickets can be redeemed by showing a valid OneCard at Gate 3 of Hornet Stadium. Gate 3 is located on the east side of the stadium and opens one hour prior to game time.

Faculty and staff members may receive up to four free tickets for the Humboldt State game. Tickets are available through the Sacramento State Ticket Office, and faculty and staff must present their OneCard. Ticket office hours are 10 a.m.-5 p.m., Monday through Friday. Additional tickets can be purchased from the Sacramento State Ticket Office or at the game.

A "Salute to Spirit" tailgate party begins at 4 p.m. in the parking lot north of the Alumni Center.

In addition to Humboldt State, the Hornets will play home games against Southern Oregon, Weber State, Portland State, Montana State and Northern Colorado. The Portland State game features second-year Hornets coach Marshall Sperbeck against former NFL coach Jerry Glanville.

## **University convenes first statewide learning community conference in Northern California**

Sacramento State's First Year Programs Office, in collaboration with the California Learning Communities Consortium (CLCC) and the First-Year Experience Committee at Sacramento State, is set to convene "Partnerships and Practices: the 2008 First-Year Experience Regional Conference" Tuesday, Aug. 26, 8 a.m.-4 p.m. in the University Union.

The hallmark event will bring together faculty, staff, students, and administrators statewide to share strategies and showcase best practices in the effort to ensure student success. That effort has particular importance to students of color, says David Leon, chair of the Ethnic Studies Department.

"Research shows that many students of color have a higher attrition rate, but it appears that students involved in an intensive first-year program are more likely to be successful in their second year," Leon says. "Ethnic Studies is participating to share our success with our freshman seminar course—Ethnic Studies 21—and to learn from experts around the state.

"If we can replicate positive, progressive and effective first-year programs statewide we may be able to amplify student success at our college and throughout the state," Leon says.

Selected in 1997 as one of the first campuses in the state to be included in the Washington Center on Improving the Quality of Undergraduate Education learning communities' pilot project, Sacramento State has emerged as a leader in the implementation and study of first-year initiatives and collaborative learning practice. Student Academic Success director Marcellene Watson says it is the University's time to showcase the hard work of students, staff, faculty, administrators and researchers.

"This event represents an opportunity to showcase the best practices of programs developed at Sacramento State in conjunction with other colleges and universities," Watson says. "Sacramento State has played an

important leadership role in launching new and innovative initiatives and has one of the largest First-Year Experience programs in the California State University."

Highlighting the conference proceedings are more than 31 workshops, many presented by University faculty. Topics include technology, assessment, student engagement, diversity, freshman seminar pedagogy, and student excellence. The keynote address will be given by Betsy Barefoot, the co-director for the Policy Center on the First Year of College.

#### New comprehensive regulatory signs

New signs placed at five locations around Sacramento State are combining several safety warnings that were

previously located on individual signs. The signs have information for bicycle riders, noting that bikes are restricted to designated operating and parking areas and not permitted in buildings or allowed to be parked in any manner that blocks access for disabled persons or creates a safety hazard.

The signs also warn those on campus that the use of some methods of transportation is prohibited. Skateboard, roller-blades, in-line skates, scooters and similar devices are prohibited because of concerns for pedestrian safety and property damage, and the signs have been installed to get the word out to the public and comply with sections of the California Vehicle and Education codes.

Signs have been placed southeast of Capital Public Radio on State University Drive East, north of College Town Drive; on State University Drive West, east of the exit to the Hornet Crossing; and on the west side of the Esplanade entrance to the campus south of J Street. Another is planned for the west side of the Guy West Bridge. The signs also reinforce regulations prohibiting firearms and soliciting.

### Outstanding Teaching Award: Reza Peigahi

Reza Peigahi exemplifies that librarians no longer fit the stereotype of people who sit at a desk among dusty book shelves answering questions about the Dewey Decimal System.

An instruction librarian, Peigahi was recognized for his classroom expertise with one of Sacramento State's Outstanding Teaching Awards. He works with students to teach them research skills and information literacy skills. "That's sort of a jargon term we use in teaching students how to find, evaluate and assess information," Peigahi says. "And to think critically about that information."

His instruction usually consists of one-time sessions of about an hour requested by another teacher. Much of the material is general information, covering catalogue systems and basic databases, but Peigahi also gets into specifics, explaining where information can be found for that teacher's particular course.

Because students are now raised with access to plenty of information on the Internet, they may think they already know how to get around computer databases, but there's more to doing actual research than typing three words in Google, Peigahi says. "I don't think they understand the nature of scholarship."

Students need to be critical consumers of what they find, evaluate the information and determine the author's expertise in the subject.

Peigahi also guides the students through Sacramento State's own databases, where students will find some of the best sources of scholarly, verified information. And perusing the library's data banks is convenient. "They don't even have to walk into the building," Peigahi says. "Probably 85 percent of what they need to do they can do from home, in their pajamas." All it takes is the student's SacLink account.

Despite the world's embrace of the computer and rush to the Internet, Peigahi believes there will always be room for university libraries, but they need to more aggressively position themselves as teachers and information educators. Once libraries become more actively involved in the students' development, they become more important to the university. "They do directly affect retention, student learning and can potentially affect recruitment of both students and faculty members," Peigahi says.

The award shows that Peigahi is doing his part to increase the role of libraries in delivering a college education. "It was such a privilege," he says of the award. "It was great to be up on the stage with the other recipients."
