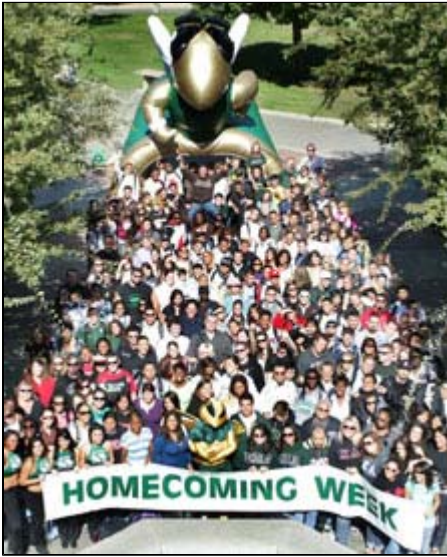

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Groundbreaking set for Recreation and Wellness Center

Groundbreaking ceremonies for one of the most anticipated buildings on campus are set for 10 a.m., Wednesday, Oct. 1. The event is free and open to the campus community.

The groundbreaking is for the new 153,000-square-foot, recreation and wellness facility to be built on the north end of the Hornet Stadium.

It is part of the Alex G. Spanos Sports Complex, which includes the stadium and the newly completed 26,235-square-foot Eli and Edythe L. Broad Fieldhouse located at the south end of the stadium. That facility houses the football and track and field programs.

The Wellness and Recreation Center is being built on the site of the old 1950s-era fieldhouse that was demolished over the summer. The new facility will feature a fitness center, an indoor track, gym courts, racquetball courts, a rock climbing wall and the student health center. There will also be a massage therapy spa, a baby-sitting center and space for Peak Adventures.

Groundbreaking ceremonies will include free lunch, a rock climbing wall, live music by "The Pets," and the Taiko Dan Japanese Drumming Ensemble, a BMX show and give-aways.

"This is exciting because students and the campus community have waited a long time for this center," says Mirjana Gavric, Recreation and Wellness Center director. "Recreation centers have become a major social area on many campuses because they are a positive place to have fun, to let off some steam, or just get in a workout."

Construction begins in October and should be completed by September 2010. When completed, the center will be available to students, staff, faculty and alumni.

Army ROTC cadets honored for heroism

Five Sacramento State Army ROTC students received honors Thursday, Sept. 11, for their attempts to rescue two people on the Feather River near Nicolas, Calif., over the Labor Day weekend.

Richard Casavecchia, Sean Peloquin, Jeremiah Jones, Emmanuel Batara and Leon Adams received unit coins from Col. Scott Donaldson, brigade commander for the Army ROTC Western Region. Coins are a military tradition and are given by commanders and senior enlisted members at their discretion for notable actions.

The students were on an outing with family and friends Saturday, Aug. 30, when they noticed a teen struggling in the water. The teen's older brother tried to reach her but was apparently caught in an undercurrent.

Cadets Casavecchia and Peloquin were able to save the teen, but Cadets Jones and Batara, who swam towards her brother, were unable to reach him in time.

"I did my best to swim out to him, but by the time I got to him he was completely submerged," Jones says. "I went back to the beach for my snorkel gear and went to the bottom of the river to see if I could find him, but no luck."

The students continued to search for the swimmer for 45 minutes until rescue crews arrived and relieved them.

"This gave us all a lesson and left us with something to think about," says Jones. "Even something casual can get ugly in just a few minutes."

The cadets are seniors and will be commissioned as officers in the Army after graduation. Each has been submitted for a National ROTC Medal for Heroism.

"I'm excited about the Serna Center bringing Assembly Member Garcia to campus, continuing a tradition of having elected officials from varying political backgrounds discuss the importance of public service," says Serna Center director Ted Lascher. "I'm also most pleased that exceptionally well respected scholars such as Gary Segura and Sam Quinones will join us this year."

The Serna Center is also co-sponsoring the new Educational Leadership Seminar Series on behalf of the educational doctorate program. University professors Susan O'Hara and Robert Pritchard will present, "Hypermedia authoring and vocabulary development with English learners," from 1 to 3 p.m., Thursday, Oct. 23 in the Summit Room of the University Union.

The Serna Center Scholarship Fall 2008 Awards Ceremony introduces and celebrates three scholarship recipients: Lyudmila Fanina, Angel Garcia, and Kathleen Gonzalez-Waldteufel. The ceremony will take place from 10 to 11:30 a.m., Thursday, Oct. 23 in the Summit Room of the University Union.

The Serna Center is named after the late Sacramento mayor and government professor Joe Serna and the late university administrator and Ethnic Studies professor Isabel Hernandez Serna who, like the Center itself, were dedicated to political activism and engagement, academic access and excellence, and service to the community.

Clean energy technology on display at Sacramento State

Clean energy technologies will take center stage as Sacramento State and the Sacramento Area Regional Technology Alliance (SARTA) host the annual Clean Energy Showcase-Venture Expo at 8 a.m., Friday, Sept. 26, in the University Union Ballroom.

The expo will connect businesses looking to incorporate green practices with start-up companies producing new green technologies.

SARTA is a non-profit corporation established to help develop the Sacramento region into a nationally recognized technology center. It has held the expo twice before, alternating each time between Sacramento State and UC Davis. Both schools have programs that focus on clean energy technologies.

The expo is expected to draw about 500 people. Fifty companies will have booths to showcase their products. One will be selected as Best in Show and one as runner up, both for cash prizes. In addition, 15 companies will give presentations on their future plans.

Outreach survey

In response to a request from the President, the Office of Institutional Research conducted a Community Outreach Survey between July and August this year. The survey was administered to

gauge whether changes had occurred in Sacramento State's impact to the region since the previous survey in 2000. The survey helped determine what ways the University is being successful at fulfilling its role as a regional partner and leader in the community.

During the process, 753 online survey questionnaires were distributed to local leaders involved in the region's business, education, community and cultural organizations. Of the total, 303 surveys were returned for an overall response rate of 40.2 percent. The respondents gave Sacramento State high ratings in the areas of interaction, visibility, contribution and impact.

On the Job with the Community Engagement Center

What do people think you do?

Our previous name didn't define what we did. However, with the new name of Community Engagement Center, and the work we have accomplished over the last couple of years, I believe people have begun to understand our work.

What do you really do?

We're responsible for providing resources, referrals and connections for faculty, students and communities of the Sacramento region to participate in a variety of community engagement activities on and off campus. The programs we offer are: community service through our Alternative Break program, service learning, Writing Partners, the new One Book program and Students in Service. In addition, we provide support to other department programs such as Constitution Week, Campus Student Investigation, student/faculty orientations, etc.

Describe your office.

I have a staff of two and they're the best. We have a very respectful environment and have fun by remembering to celebrate our accomplishments. Also, I think we all care about the quality and success of our programs. This includes our student assistants. We couldn't accomplish the work we do without them. I don't think most people on campus know where we're at. We're located in the Library, Room 4028, but there's no signage outside of the library, so that contributes to our lack of visibility.

What surprises people about the Center?

Once faculty discover our programs, I think they're very surprised at the depth and breadth of the resources we provide, such as risk management, especially in implementing a service learning course, and how we can assist them in being engaged in the community. Students, in general, are surprised at how rewarding experiences such as service learning and Alternative Break can be both academically and personally. And community members are surprised at the scope of work we do to build strong, sustainable relationships between faculty, students and the community partners.

What is your biggest challenge?

People knowing who we are and what we do, although that is beginning to change. For example, projects such as the Nobel Peace Prize winner Wangari Maathai was an event co-hosted by the Community Engagement Center and the English Department. This year the new Wells Fargo One Book Program, also co-hosted by the Community Engagement Center and the English Department, will be launched. Both are examples of campus-wide events that will provide opportunities for staff, students, faculty and communities to become engaged in and off the campus, increasing the visibility and work of the center.

What do you get asked the most?

Faculty want to know what time and resources are required to integrate the pedagogy of service

learning into their course, what resources or connections are needed to become engaged in the community, the possibilities of scholarship, and how to integrate this work into their RTP file. Community partners ask "how many students can you send us?" and students often want to know whether their engagement activities, such as service learning, are going on their transcripts.
