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## Marching band notes 50th birthday

Strike up the band, there's a birthday celebration coming—and this time, the celebration is for the band.

Sacramento State's marching band turns 50 this year, and to celebrate, the band had a special performance during halftime of the Nov. 15 football game between Sacramento State and Northern Colorado.

"Human beings still respond to human beings performing," says first-year band director Clay Redfield, describing the attraction of marching bands. "There's something about the excitement level of seeing the group and feeling the sound."

"It's the theatrics of it," says band member Jill Sayles. "It's fun, it's loud, it's cool to look at and it's cool to listen to."

But it can be difficult. In addition to their normal school load, students practice three days a week, have uniforms and equipment to take care of and have to develop an uncanny sense of rhythm and balance so they can keep up visually and musically.

"That's why being in a marching band is so challenging," says Sayles. "I can march, and I can play, but it's putting it together."

In a time of portable music players, digital music and guitar heroes, joining a marching band itself might seem a little old fashioned. But the band is thriving with 65 very enthusiastic members.

"It gives me a huge rush and makes me feel really great," says band member Chris Peppers. "Some people might be nervous, but the attention makes me play better."

"Every student has his own motivation for joining the band," says Redfield. "It is an organization that allows them to continue to perform as a musician, gives them an opportunity to be involved on the campus and gives them a social network of students they can meet."

The band has been a fixture here since 1958, but like time, it marches on, staying fresh by bringing in new moves and new tunes.

"Back in the day, there were just flanks, forward march and backward march," says Peppers, describing band formations. "Now, we have obloquies, left slides, right slides, left back slides, right back slides. Marching bands keep evolving and a lot of things have changed."

But, some people are still partial to the old school band performances.

"About half of our music was classical literature, and half was modern literature," says Jim Kenward, a Sacramento State alum from 1959 and a former marching band member. "Now, I don't hear any of the classical stuff and that's too bad, because there is a tremendous history of classical music written for band."

While musical tastes may differ, marching band members past and present can agree; the goal is to go out and have fun and get the crowd fired up.

"It's exciting and a little scary," says Redfield. "You want the performance to go very well, you want the students to have a great experience performing and you want the audience to share in the performance."

## Annual rock auction just a stone's throw away

Not all rocks are created equal, which is evident at the annual rock auction sponsored by the Sacramento State Geology Club. This year's auction will be held at 6 p.m., Nov. 21, in the University Union's Ballroom I, and will feature rocks of all sorts, sizes and importance.

"Like beauty, value is often in the eye of the beholder," says professor Lisa Hammersley, Geology Club faculty advisor. "There will be hundreds of rocks, minerals and fossils for people to bid on, and each person looks for something different that they like. Some look for interesting minerals, while others like the natural designs and patterns in the rocks. Some like rocks that glitter or have a luminescence and others like rocks because they have unusual structures."

The event features a silent auction and a live auction. During the silent action, which goes by fairly quickly, people find a rock or two they like, write down bids for them and wait to see if they stand. "It gets a little frantic as the time limit approaches, and people swoop in at the last second to get in a final bid," says Dave Evans, chair of the department and auctioneer for the event.

Action is even more intense during the live auction as collectors continuously raise the stakes in an effort to outbid each other.

Last year's auction raised more than \$9,000 for the club. Funds are used to help students with fees for field courses. The club will also use some of the proceeds to make rock and mineral sample boxes to distribute to local schools.

Rock and mineral samples for the auction are donated by students, faculty, local firms and mineral collectors. Specimens vary in size from pebbles to big rocks for gardens and include spectacular crystals, geodes, fossils, highly-polished rocks and gems and the occasional precious metal.

## **Professional Performance Increases to be determined mid-November**

The process by which Professional Performance Increases (PPIs) will be determined for full professors hired prior to Aug. 1, 1988 will be set in motion on Nov. 17. PPIs are raises that were negotiated as part of the last contract signed by the CSU and CFA.

Essentially, department level peer review committees will recommend salary increases within set categories tied to performance in all areas of a faculty member's assignment. The committees must be composed of at least three full professors per department who are not eligible to receive a PPI; FERP faculty who are full professors on their assigned semester may serve. If a department does not have the requisite members for the committee, full professors from other departments may serve.

In order to make the process go as smoothly as possible, full professors who are not eligible for PPIs are urged to lend their time generously to their departmental committees and/or to committees from other departments who do not have the personnel needed for a full committee.

## **Sacramento State participates in blood donor challenge**

Sacramento State won the big game against UC Davis Nov. 7 and scored big in the accompanying blood donor competition sponsored by Sacramento BloodSource blood center. During the two-week competition, the campus community donated 970 units of blood. UC Davis donated 1301 units but it was a win-win situation for BloodSource and the schools.

Sacramento State more than tripled the total number of participants from what had been collected previously, according to Sacramento BloodSource. In all, Sacramento State registered 1,217 donors including 628 new donors.

The blood drive competition ran Oct. 20-Nov. 7 with BloodSource setting up mobile units in the University Union and the residence halls. Donors included faculty, staff, students and administration.
