Course Requirements:

- 1. Regular attendance, punctuality and participation.
- 2. Preparation of homework assignments, including written work, lab work, and practice of dialogues.
- 3. Six quizzes: first makeup for compelling reasons only and within a week; additional makeups by petition only; missed quizzes will receive a grade of 0. The quiz with the lowest grade will be dropped.

4. Midterm and final examination.

Grades:

30% each for quiz average, midterm, and final; 5% for attendance (calculated as percentage of days present; 3 lates or leaving early = 1 absence);

5% for homework (calculated as percentage of homework submitted; $3\sqrt{-}=1$ missed homework; $\sqrt{-}$ given for incomplete assignment).

Student Learning Outcomes: Mastery of Chapters 6-12 in text. Familiarity with basic grammatical structures and vocabulary of German, practice in speaking, aural comprehension, reading and writing.

- 1. Students demonstrate that they are able to communicate in culturally appropriate ways using more complex structures while relying heavily on acquired formulaic language.
- 2. Students demonstrate that they are able to understand and respond to simple statements and questions and participate in informal conversation within the cultural context.
- 3. Students demonstrate that they are able to exchange personal information, fulfill routine needs in the four language skills within the cultural context.
- 4. Students demonstrate reading and writing skills that reflect their emerging oral language within the cultural context.
- 5. Students continue to demonstrate a better understanding of the culture of the language they are studying through the cultural context of the language that forms the basis of their study, internet searches in the language, and exploration of the perspectives, products, and practices of the culture.

Method of Instruction: This course is conducted partly in German, partly in English, drawing on the following activities: readings, lecture/presentation, demonstration, class and small group discussion, visual media.
