<u>LOCUS</u>*— I will use LOCUS (<u>http://locus.csus.edu/locus2005/index.php</u>), an electronic resource created and maintained by the Sacramento State Library, to help manage this course. For instance, I will use it to deliver essay assignments to you, to post announcements, and to make reserve readings available as PDF files that may either be read on-line or downloaded and printed at your own convenience. You will need to <u>login</u> using your saclink username and password. After this, you will need to <u>enroll in the class</u> using (again) your saclink account and the password for our course ______.

<u>Course Description</u>:* Anthropology 101 offers a critical examination of social diversity and cultural conflict in the contemporary United States. Ethnographic readings, lectures, and films analyze the politics of race, ethnicity, class, gender and sexuality as configured through the dynamic interplay of history, culture and power. *Catalog Description. Focuses on the phenomena of cultural and ethnic variation in complex societies; the nature of diversity; the nature of cultural conflicts; and how cultural differences are managed in other complex societies. The case study approach of anthropology is used to develop constructive perspectives on cultural diversity in the U.S. 3 units.

<u>Course Objectives</u>: This course meets the university's GE Requirement for Area D2: *Major* Social Issues of the Contemporary Era.

• Demonstrate an understanding of the anthropological approach to the study of cultural diversity.

- Demonstrate an understanding of race, ethnicity, class, gender and sexual orientation as indices of diversity in human society.
- Demonstrate an understanding of the contributions to human society of at least two of the following groups: women, ethnic, religious, socio-economic, gays and lesbians, and persons with disabilities.
- Demonstrate a critical understanding of their own roles as social actors in a culturally diverse society.

Course Requirements and Evaluation:

Attendance—there is a clear correlation between your attendance and your ability to do well on exams and essay assignments. I will record attendance, but you are responsible for your own success. **Readings**—please complete the reading assignments before the day they are scheduled for discussion. This will give you an edge in understanding lectures and enhance your participation score. **Evaluation**—your course grade is based upon the average of 4 scores, each worth 25% of the overall grade: Two examinations (a mid-term and a non-comprehensive final) and two 750-word essay assignments. Exams will be comprised of objective questions. Please remember that your <u>meaningful</u> participation in class discussions will give me every reason to give you benefit of the doubt on essay questions or to resolve borderline grade point averages by rounding to the higher letter grade. By the same token, students who have missed more than 3 classes (whether excused or not) significantly reduce these chances.

<u>Grading Scale</u>—A=90-100%; B=80-89%; C=70-79%; D=60-69%; F=59% or below. Note: a grade of 69.5 will receive a C-.

<u>Make-up Policy</u>—an <u>excused</u> absence on examination days will require you to take your makeup exam in the Testing Center (no more than one exam per semester may be taken as a makeup). It is your responsibility to **request permission** to makeup an exam. Please note: the Testing Center has its own hours and fee requirements; be sure to go prepared.
