Art Department as a whole

introduces students to the expressive world of the fine arts. A wide variety of approaches to art based on both Western and non-Western cultures are integrated into courses that are orientated toward creativity, imagination and critical thinking. Students are able to explore art through courses in art education, art history, ceramics, electronic art, drawing, metalsmithing/jewelry, painting, printmaking, photography, and sculpture. Studio experiences develop the creative and artistic skills necessary for mastery of established styles and for exploration of new ones. Art history classes provide an appreciation for and an understanding of our visual cultural heritage within a historical context. Both studio and art history classes reward students with an introduction to a lifetime appreciation of the arts. Courses in art education provide an understanding of the behavioral aspects of art, with regard to the creator, the viewer, and the developing person. Courses in the Art Department direct and foster creative and intellectual growth. Courses, programs, and exhibitions sponsored by the Art Department serve to engage students in the fine arts within a liberal arts context and to promote appreciation of the fine arts in the general student population. Programs are offered that lead to the Bachelor of Arts degree in Art Studio, the Master of Arts degree in Art Studio, and the Art Minor (three areas: Art Education, Art History, and Art Studio). The department also offers pre-credential preparation for the Single Subject Teaching Credential in Art. CSUS is an accredited institutional member of the National Association of Schools of Art and Design.

Areas of Study

The Art Department is in charge of the following areas of study:

- 2. Art Education
- Provides a subject matter preparation program in art education for students who want to become teachers in the public schools, teachers in after school programs, or art education facilitators in museums and art galleries.
- Students completing the program receive a Bachelor of Arts degree in Art Studio (with course work in art education) and are eligible to apply to the Professional Education Program in the College of Education to complete additional teaching requirements. Upon completion of the Professional Education Program, students will receive a preliminary teaching credential in art.
- Many graduates find teaching positions in elementary, middle and secondary schools within California, while others choose teaching positions in the private sector. Graduates also work in galleries, museums, or special education facilities, while others become entrepreneurs who open

- 1. Art History
- The Art History curriculum provides a full range of courses in Western and non-Western art, criticism, and visual culture from pre-history to the present and from many perspectives, formal and contextual.
- Art History is available as both a minor and, effective Fall 2004, as a concentration in the Art major. Art History courses also are taken by students majoring in entirely different subjects, and can be used towards the majors in Graphic Design, Interior Design, and Photography. Some lower division courses in Art History and Art Appreciation can be used to fulfill General Education requirements.
- The Art History concentration is ideal for students who seek an interdisciplinary liberal arts education that also develops their visual talents and inspires appreciation for human creativity across time and place.
- The Art Department and three student art clubs sponsor numerous exhibitions, lectures and events that bring exciting local, national, and international artists and art professionals to campus.
- 2. Barrio Art
- It is one of the most significant community outreach programs sponsored by the University and has been a model for arts-based service learning programs at other colleges and universities. There are **two established program sites** and five Barrio Art Program components.
- The main site is the Washington Neighborhood Center, a cultural center located in downtown Sacramento. Here the Barrio Art Program offers programs of evening classes in several areas: the Children's Component (serving children from grades K-6); the Anciano Component (serving adults and the elderly); and the Cultural Component with the Danza Azteca (Aztec Dance: indigenous art and culture).
- The second program site, La Raza Galería Posada, is a highly regarded community art center offering shows and educational programs that celebrate Native American, Chicano, and Latino art and culture.
- The last Barrio Art Program component is the Mural Project, in which students are introduced to mural painting in the tradition of the Mexican Mural Movement. This type of collaborative art is also a community service and has a long-standing history in the city of Sacramento and on the University campus, where the most visible product is the mural by artist Ed Rivera on the façade of Lassen Hall.

3. Ceramics

- 1. Drawing/Painting
- Drawing courses introduce various techniques and approaches in drawing using pencil, charcoal and pastel. Courses include direct-observational drawing from the model, still life and landscape. Advanced classes continue the investigation of drawing.
- Painting courses introduce various techniques and approaches in painting using oil, acrylic and watercolor media. Courses include direct-observational painting from the model, still life and landscape. Advanced classes continue the investigation of painting with opportunities for self-directed study.
- 2. Electronic Art
- The courses within this area explore various approaches to digital imaging, time-based, 3D computer modeling and interactive media. Software used includes Photoshop, Corel Painter, Blender 3D, Flash and Final Cut Pro. Each class is taught within the context of new media culture and contemporary art practice.
- 3. Metalsmithing/Jewelry
- Students work with traditional jewelers' tools and equipment. Students also have the option of working in a variety of semi-precious and precious metals. Open studios accommodate students who wish to develop their style and improve their technique.
- 4. Photography
- Photography is a joint major, shared with the Department of Design.

- 5. Printmaking
- Etching and Engraving
 - Both are intaglio techniques meaning that a plate is developed with textures, recessed lines, or embossment that is inked and then wiped clean. Each, edge or change of surface captures ink when the plate is wiped and smooth areas produce white areas. Moist paper is forced into the plate and extracts the image areas from textures or recessed areas. The ink on a printed engraving or etching stands up, embossed, by the printing process.

mined by carving away the white (non-printing areas.) The top surface of the printing element is rolled with ink and the lower portions are left clean. Usually the resulting print has crisp edges and clean whites.

Lithography

- Lithography is a chemical printing process. The image is determined by the inability of water and oil to mix. Originally invented with a limestone-printing base, the process has evolved to include printing from aluminum, mylar, and even silicone. New products enable prints to be made directly from laser printed mylar surfaces.
- In stone lithography the limestone can absorb both oil and water. An artist can draw on limestone with oil-based crayons and, after moistening the surface, grease based ink can be rolled onto the drawing. This ink can then be transferred under pressure to paper.

Silkscreen

- Stencils require a strategy for retaining the "center of a doughnut."
 Shapes within shapes need to be held in place while the artwork is inked. Elegant stencils are created by woven silk mesh and paper or other stencil materials that allow the artist to create complex shapes.
- It allows printing on a variety of surfaces and is an economical way of putting rich layers of color onto paper.

Department Events

The Department of Art sponsors numerous free public events at Sacramento State every year, ranging from exhibitions and installations in the two Kadema Hall galleries (Else and Witt) to lectures, panel discussions, workshops, and symposia at venues throughout the campus. The events are posted on the Sac State Campus Calendar of Events.

Every semester, there is full array of art exhibitions by faculty, students, and visiting artists in the Else and Witt Galleries in Kadema Hall. All of the artistic media taught in the Art Department are represented. Most of the shows are designed and installed by Art students. Speakers, topics, and dates of additional art and art history lectures will be included on the Art Section of the Calendar of Events.

Art faculty, staff, students, and alumni frequently give lectures or exhibit their work in this region.

Art Galleries

There are three art galleries sponsored and supported by the Art Department. The **Else Gallery** and **Witt Gallery** are located in Kadema hall, and the **University Library Gallery** located on the first floor of the Library.

- 1. The (Robert) Else Gallery in Kadema Hall
- The Else Gallery is named after an emeritus member of the Art faculty,
 Professor Robert Else. It serves as a student art gallery, and in particular, is a showcase gallery for the work of Art Department graduate students. Exhibitions hosted in the Else Gallery include the Student Award Show, the Graduate Student Exhibition, and the one-person shows by graduate Art students.
- All of the exhibits are funded by a Sacramento State Associated Students Incorporated (ASI) grant, which is \$500 maximum per each exhibition.
- They have to submit a Proposal Page that meet all of its requirements in order to be of/have their own exhibit. The link below is where you will find said Proposal Page: http://www.al.csus.edu/art/proposals.php>.
- 2. The (Raymond W.) Witt Gallery in Kadema Hall
- The Witt Gallery takes its name from Professor Raymond Witt, an emeritus member of the Art faculty who also endowed the Raymond and Joyce Witt Scholarship. It serves as a student gallery and as a showcase gallery for the work of Art Department undergraduate students. The exhibition schedule includes the Graduating Seniors Show.
- Each year, as many as 20 exhibitions organized by Sacramento State faculty and students, are mounted in the Witt Gallery.
- 3. University Library Gallery
- The University Library Gallery is operated by the School of the Arts (SOTA). It shows the work of nationally and internationally significant artists.
- The Library Gallery is part of the concept of making CSU Sacramento the "campus of the arts." Located on the first floor of the University Library, it occupies a central position on campus where it can be accessed by CSUS students, faculty and staff, and by the people from the larger regional community. The Library Gallery serves the educational mission of the University by introducing nationally and internationally significant art to the campus and to the Sacramento region.
- The Gallery is intended not only for the installation of art exhibitions,

• other arts-related events. It is open to everyone from 10:00 am to 5:00 pm, Tuesdays through Saturdays. Admission is free.

Awards Show

Any undergraduate or graduate student who is enrolled in classes at Sacramento State in the Fall 2011 or Spring 2012 semester may apply for inclusion in the 2012 Awards Show. All participants in the Awards Show also are eligible for consideration for certificate awards. However, eligibility for scholarship awards varies depending on students' academic programs and classifications (described below). Furthermore, no student can earn the same scholarship award twice.

There are four award categories in Studio Art this year:

- 1. Undergraduate
- R. W. Witt Scholarship Award in Studio Art: for any Sacramento State student with a declared minor or major in Art or Photography. All media are eligible.
- Frederick M. Peyser, Sr. Prize in Studio Art: for any Sacramento State undergraduate; only two-dimensional media are eligible (painting, photography, printmaking, mixed media on paper, and new media in two dimensions, such as digital images, animation, video, and interactive works).
- University Art Product Award: for works of art in ANY medium that are submitted by Sacramento State undergraduates with a declared major in Art and an overall GPA of 3.0.
- 2. Graduate
- Increase Robinson Memorial Fellowship Award: for classified graduate students in Studio Art. Entries may be in any medium.

There also is one award category in Art History:

• R. W. Witt Scholarship Award in Art History: ANY undergraduate student with an Art/Photography major or minor, and any classified graduate student in Art (including the Special Major MA), may compete.

Festival of the Arts

Every year the Art Department participates in the Festival of the Arts. The department shares the week long schedule with many other departments within the College of Arts and Letters—Music, Design, Film, English, Theatre and Dance—showcasing works from its varied programs—as listed



Professional—Mondavi Center

There are many professional art organizations in the Sacramento area. One of the biggest companies is the Mondavi Center. The Mondavi Center hosts more than 100 performances each year, with 85,000-100,000 attending. The majority—about 85 percent—come from either the Davis area or Sacramento and its suburbs. Students make up a healthy portion of the Mondavi Center audience, with student-priced tickets accounting for 10.6 percent of all ticket sales in 2011–12.

Mondavi Center explores the full range of the performing arts, from the traditional to the innovative, and from diverse cultures and disciplines through presentation, education, public service, and research. As part of the UC Davis mission as a land grant university, Mondavi Center provides outstanding cultural programming, support for the University's academic departments, and a professional laboratory to train students in the performing arts. Mondavi Center is committed to maintaining state-of-the art, world-class performance facilities and providing the highest quality experience for both artists and audiences. Our mandate is to maintain a balance between our regional responsibility, fiscal responsibility, artistic integrity, and the educational mission of the University of California.

Professional—Crocker Art Museum

One of the other companies is the Crocker Art Museum. The longest continuously operating art museum in the West, the Crocker Art Museum was founded in 1885 and remains the leading art institution for the California Capital Region and Central Valley. The Museum, which is housed in one of the finest examples of Victorian Italianate architecture in the United States, offers a diverse spectrum of special exhibitions, events, and programs to augment its collections of California, European, and Asian artworks, and International Ceramics. Annual attendance of 150,000.

The Crocker serves as the primary regional resource for the study and appreciation of fine art. The Museum offers a diverse spectrum of special exhibitions, events, and programs to augment its collections of Californian, European, Asian, African and Oceanic artworks, and international ceramics. The Crocker Art Museum is the only museum in the Sacramento region accredited by the American Association of Museums, a recognition given to less than 800 of the nation's 17,500 museums. AAM accreditation certifies that a museum operates according to standards set forth by the museum profession, manages its collections responsibly and provides quality service to the public.

Academic—UC Davis

While there are a variety of universities in the Sacramento area, one of the biggest competitors is <u>UC Davis</u>. About 64% of the student population is in an art or design major. Therefore, most of the promotional material is guided towards them, but they also target donors and alumni. One of the biggest donors comes from Margrit Mondavi who donated \$2 million towards their Art Museum Project.

UC Davis' Art department offers programs in Art History, Art Studio, and Tecnhocultural Studies. Within their department is the Richard L. Nelson Gallery. The Richard L. Nelson Gallery was dedicated in 1976 in memory of the first Chairperson of the Department of Art at UCDavis. Established as an exhibition venue and teaching resource for the Art Department, the gallery program also serves the campus population, art communities, and general public of Northern California and the Central Valley.

Academic—Cal Arts

One of the other academic competitors is <u>CalArts</u>. Similar to UC Davis, about 64% of the student population is in an art or design major. Which also means that their promotions are geared toward the current students and potential former students.

CalArts offers programs in fine arts, graphic design, and photography. The mission of their school of art is to actively promote both the creative environment and the intellectual context for artistic experimentation. The School's programs prepare graduates to thoughtfully challenge the prevailing conventions of artistic expression, develop new forms, and become innovators and leaders in their chosen fields.

Academic—American River College

American River College also offers a variety of art majors. In their Fine and Applied Arts Department they offer: Art, Art/New Media, Culinary Arts/ Hospitality Management, Fashion, Interior Design, Music, and Theatre Arts. Within the Art major, ARC offers specialties in Studio Art, Art History, and specialty courses in Gallery management, children's art, artists' materials and techniques, portrait, collage and assemblage, character design, facial expression and anatomy, figure drawing and figure sculpture.

At the ARC Art Department we feel that our main strength is that we are good at our primary job: To teach, and mentor artistic explorations. We create an environment where others can build a sense of personal freedom and develop cutting-edge attitudes. The department maintains an educational environment that respects and accommodates a diversity of individual backgrounds, abilities, interests and opinions. It offers opportunities for lifelong learning and continuing education. It recognizes student achievement through awarding degrees. The department also prepares students to transfer to and succeed at a four-year institution, and beyond.



Hierarchy wise, there is a strong direction where the eye goes. The upside-down uppercase A is a strong point of interest and is utilized to point the direction of information. Although the museum is important and its address, the exhibition takes precedence over them. The design of the piece also has a strong grid that the designer(s) used to organize the piece.

The use of a grid system in a design helps to organize the space in order to create order by helping to establish a starting point for the eyes. In this design, there is a robust grid system utilizing not only vertical and horizontal grid but also a triangular one that also reflect the positions of the people in the photograph used.

We again see here a grid with three sections. Designers shouldn't limit themselves to just one section of the grid but also combine sections to create a dynamic composition. Hierarchy is achieved with the use of colors and type sizes. The largest text are the headlines, then the body text, and finally, the smallest sizes belong to references and side notes.

This more recent version of the page listed above streamlined the organization and combined the two right-hand sections of the grid into one. Careful considerations should be practiced here regarding text. The average line length for text is 66 letters wide, any longer than that would cause readability problems. The body text you see above approaches the 75+ limit due to the body text's small size. Perhaps increasing the size of the body text or breaking apart the columns would fix that problem.



Again, another good example of strong hierarchy. Though the huge round forms and the large title are competing for attention, the focus remains at the top area where the most vital part of the poster resides. Negative space is activated by creating a rectangular closure by the use of the rectangular shapes at the top and bottom together with the half circles on the bottom left.





Print Items

- mostly postcards
- often uses one picture on the front (with little to no type) although sometimes it is just packed full of type
- all type on the back (often in a larger font)
- inconsistent paper—some thicker than others, some glossy, some more semi-gloss, etc.









- small handful of typefaces to be used
- · color palettes
- need standard consistent sizing
- needs grid with smaller columns of text to keep between 45-75 characters
