Economics 180 URBAN ECONOMICS

The course will provide students with a conceptual framework to understand the forces shaping the Sacramento region economic base, its growth and land use. In particular, the course will provide students with an understanding of the various analytical economic tools used by urban economist and planners, e.g., economic base model, input-output analysis, fiscal impact analysis, market analysis and economic impact analysis. In addition, the course will examine various regional urban problems, e.g., growth controls, crime, transportation, etc.

Grading

Three or four essay examinations will be given during the semester. Your grade will be determined by your performance on the examinations and on the exercises and assignments you turn in.
