Aplia and required online account: We will be using Aplia, an interactive learning tool in this class. All students are required to register for an Aplia account at <u>http://econ.aplia.com</u> using the course key: **QMXU-AB3F-JAG4**. Please select your section (based on section number or class time) All course material, including textbook, lecture slides, announcements, homework assignments, practice problems and exams, etc. will be posted through this website. Either use the Aplia access card or pay directly to Aplia. I have attached an instruction sheet for the Aplia registration process. Please register even if you are not ready to pay as you need this site to have access to class material including homework assignments. There is a grace period (until 09.19.10) during which you can use the site without paying.

Clickers: In order to support an interactive and active learning environment in lectures, we will also be using clickers to take quizzes and deliver immediate feedback on covered material. You will need to purchase an eInstruction CPS_{RF} response pad and register online via <u>www.einstruction.com</u> using the class key: **G62114L234**. There is a \$13 fee paid to eInstructions in order to use this tool (per semester, not per course). Response pads are available at the bookstore (\$26.25 new, \$19.75 used, or \$11.81 for rent), or can be ordered online (e.g. Amazon). I have attached instructions on how to register and use the device.

Course overview and objectives:

Microeconomics *should* be intuitive, compelling, and fun! We will study human behavior and decision making under consideration of scarce resources, analyzing the workings of supply and demand. We will emphasize the invisible hand or price system, the importance of incentives, and discuss resource allocations. We will also discuss economic efficiency and how it relates to distributional considerations, such as inequality in income distributions.

By the end of the semester, you will be equipped with a set of tools and concepts that will allow you to approach and analyze a wide variety of common economic questions. The examples used in class, readings and homework assignments will demonstrate that Microeconomics relates to real-world experiences, from personal decisions to national and international negotiations. 3 units.

Grades and exam policies:

Your final numerical average will be calculated based on your performance on **homework** assignments (30%), two midterms (20% each), a final exam (30%), and quizzes and optional writing assignments (extra credit). Specific letter grades will not be assigned to individual homework assignments or exams and numerical scores will not be converted to letter grades until the very end of the semester. I will provide feedback on your performance over the course of the semester.

There will be **two midterm exams** during class, on **Thursday, October 7th**, and on **Thursday, November 18th**. The **final exam** will be on **Thursday, December 16th from 12.45-2.45pm**. Please bring a scantron form (#882-E or similar), a #2 pencil and a non-programmable calculator on the day of exams. Exams will be closed book and given in the regular classroom. Please check your schedule to ensure that you can attend these exams. **There will be no makeup exams, and no early or late sittings for exams**. If, due to a serious illness or family emergency, you are unable to take the midterm or final exam, your final grade will be based solely on the remaining assignments and exams. You must contact me immediately with appropriate documentation in order to receive this accommodation.

If you decide to withdraw from this class, make sure you do so with the registrar. If you withdraw without permission, you will be assigned a failing grade. Once a student submits work for a grade, he/she will not be assigned a grade of "WU" under any circumstances.

Homework assignments and quizzes:

In order to complete your **homework assignments**, you will be required to access Aplia. They **will be assigned approximately every week and you will have to complete them in an online interactive format**. I encourage you to use the on-campus computer labs or other source with a high-speed internet connection. Computer problems **are not** an excuse for missing assignments.

Please register during the first week. There are already multiple assignments posted, the first of which is **due Tuesday, September 7th**. **No late assignments will be accepted**. I will drop your lowest homework score in calculating your final grade.

In addition, we will have **weekly quizzes every Thursday** in lecture that test whether you are keeping up with the material.

How to do well in this class:

1) Come to class! The easiest way to raise your grade is attendance in lectures.

(Romer found that the difference in performance between a student who attends regularly and one who attends sporadically is about a full letter grade¹)

2) Work on homework assignments. There are also tutorials and practice problems at the Aplia website and in the book.

3) Read along in the textbook.

4) Do not fall behind. This class is cumulative!

Academic Honesty:

III. DEFINITIONS OF ACADEMIC DISHONESTY

A. Cheating. At CSUS, cheating is the act of obtaining or attempting to obtain credit for academic work through the use of any dishonest, deceptive, or fraudulent means. Cheating at CSUS includes but is not limited to:

1. Copying, in part or in whole, from another's test or other evaluation instrument;

2. Using crib notes, "cheat sheets," or any other device, including electronic devices, in aid of writing the exam not permitted by the instructor;

3. Submitting work previously graded in another course unless doing so has been approved by the course instructor or by department policy.

4. Submitting work simultaneously presented in more than one course, unless doing so has been approved by the respective course instructors or by the department policies of the respective departments.

5. Altering or interfering with grading or grading instructions;

6. Sitting for an examination by a surrogate, or as a surrogate;

7. Any other act committed by a student in the course of his or her academic work that defrauds or misrepresents, including aiding or abetting in any of the actions defined above.

B. Plagiarism: Plagiarism is a form of cheating. At CSUS plagiarism is the use of distinctive ideas or works belonging to another person without providing adequate acknowledgement of that person's contribution. Regardless of the means of appropriation, incorporation of another's work into one's own requires adequate identification and

acknowledgement. Plagiarism is doubly unethical because it deprives the author of rightful credit and gives credit to someone who has not earned it. Acknowledgement is not necessary when the material used is common knowledge. Plagiarism at CSUS includes but is not limited to:

1. The act of incorporating into one's own work the ideas, words, sentences, paragraphs, or parts thereof, or the specific substance of another's work without giving appropriate credit thereby representing the product as entirely one's own. Examples include not only word-for-word copying, but also the "mosaic" (i.e., interspersing a few of one's own words while, in essence, copying another's work), the paraphrase (i.e., rewriting another's work while still using the other's fundamental idea or theory); fabrication (i.e., inventing or counterfeiting sources), ghost-writing (i.e., submitting another's work as one's own) and failure to include quotation marks on material that is otherwise acknowledged; and

2. Representing as one's own another's artistic or scholarly works such as musical compositions, computer programs, photographs, paintings, drawing, sculptures, or similar works.

Registration

Enrolling through CPSOnline

If you enroll through CPSOnline, you will first need to setup a CPSOnline account.

Create an Account

- 1. Go to <u>www.einstruction.com</u>.
- 2. Click on the **Students** link at the top left of the window.
- 3. Select your school or university from the drop-down menu.
- 4. Click Choose Site.
- 5. Enter your serial number in the space provided. You can find your serial number on your LCD screen when you turn on your pad: if your pad does not have an LCD screen, your serial number is on the back of the pad, under the battery cover.
- 6. Click Create Your Account.
- 7. Create a CPSOnline Username and Password and fill in your contact information. Click **Submit** to create your account.

You've now created a CPSOnline account. You can use your CPSOnline username and password to login anytime to CPSOnline. Now you can enroll your pad in your class.

Enroll in a Class

- 1. Click **Yes** to enroll immediately in your class.
- 2. Enter your **Class Key** in the space provided. If you have a Code, enter it in the **Code** box. Note that a Code is not required.
- 3. Click **Submit** and choose your payment options. Click **Continue**.
- 4. Fill in your billing information and click **Continue**.
- 5. To join an additional CPSOnline class, click the **Enroll in a class** button from the main menu.
- 6. Once you have finished enrolling in all of your classes, click **Log Out**. So that *CPSOnline properly records your information, log out of CPSOnline.*


NOTE: If you enroll in more than one class using CPS, your response pad may have a different assigned number for each class. Note your assigned response pad number after you enroll for each class, and use the reminder emails from eInstruction to keep track of your information.



Using CPS_{RF} in your class

The eInstruction response pad is easy to use with CPS. Use the information below to learn how to use the buttons on the pad. If you have any questions, log onto <u>www.einstruction.com</u> and use the **Customer Support** menu option. Type in your name and enter the live chat room for immediate help. You can also reach Technical Support at 888.333.7532.

- + **Power** turn the response pad on or off by pressing the **PWR/JOIN** button.
- - Initiate Join to have the response pad begin searching for a class roster to join, turn on the response pad and press the **PWR/JOIN** button.
 - Manually Join to manually join a class, turn on the response pad and press the PWR/JOIN button twice. *Join:* appears on the LCD screen. Type in the channel number for the class roster you would like to join, and press Send.
- Use Negative Numbers make a numeric response positive or negative by pressing the +- button.
- Enter Equations create equations by entering symbols into your response with the Sym button. You can include the following symbols: X, Y, =, (), . (decimal), + (plus operator), (minus operator), / (division operator), * (multiplication operator), (space)
- View Response Pad Information to view the response pad channel, roster number, and firmware version, turn the pad on and press the < button.</p>



- View Serial Number to view the serial number for your response pad, simply press the PWR/Join button to turn on the response pad. The serial number displays in the LCD screen as your response pad searches for a class roster to join. Your serial number will begin with "r1...".
- Adjust LCD Screen Contrast to adjust the LCD screen contrast, press the > button.
 Use the A1 button to decrease the contrast and the C3 button to increase contrast.
