FINAL EXAM: IRISH LITERATURE

Choose One and be sure to discuss at least four separate works (by *four separate writers*) and *two of the following genres* in any of your responses: fiction, poetry, and drama. Submit this topic sheet along with your response.

1.) In his essay of introduction Seamus Deane argues that "colonialism is a process of radical dispossession." Indeed, possessions and land of the colonized are lost, but more subtle losses involve personal and cultural issues. Using <u>four</u> works analyze the latter forms of dispossession.

2.) In Irish life and literature there is a constant tension between the impulse to stay and to leave. The departure can take many forms, though the most common is, of course, emigration. Choosing <u>four</u> works, analyze various responses to this impulse; who wants to stay and why and on what terms; who wants to go and why, etc.?

3.) In an influential book entitled *The Empire Writes Back*, the editors collect essays that reveal the ways in which colonized people reject, undermine, or manipulate their colonizers. Choosing <u>four</u> works, analyze the ways in which these postcolonial texts "write back," by resisting, undermining, or manipulating the stereotypes of their colonizers. Be sure to define terms clearly and specifically.

4.) The Irish writer John Montague has said, "One explores an inheritance to free oneself and others." Analyze and discuss the significance of this statement in relation to four works we have read this semester. What must one be freed of, how, and who is doing the freeing?
