**Shooting to Edit** 

#### Take a Moment

Don't go for the easiest shot
Think about it
Look around—go up on your toes, squat lean from side to side
Find your best angle for framing, background, color and balance
Use the camera if you need to
This could take less than one minute

# Locations can be altered

Rearrange furniture
Remove distracting elements
Add interesting ones



#### **BASIC SEQUENCE**

**Master shot** 

Most of the time a conversation like this (about a minute) will consist of multiple shots to create interest

Wide or Establishing


Shows your subject within context

#### A BASIC SEQUENCE

- EACH NEW SHOT SHOULD IF AT ALL POSSIBLE INVOLVE A CHANGE IN IMAGE SIZE
   MAKES THE MOVIE MORE INTERESTING AND MAKES IT EASIER TO CUT BACK AND FORTH BETWEEN CUTS





#### **CUTTING ON ACTION**

The viewers eye naturally follows movement on screen Start movement on one shot and complete it on the next

## Situations When editing on action is possible

- **\* Opening doors**
- **\* Getting out of cars**
- **\* Sitting down**
- **\* Standing up**
- **\* Reaching for objects**
- **\* Walking**
- \* Running

# **Overlapping Action**

- The important thing to remember is that the last action of the first shot has to be repeated at the beginning of the second shot
- You have to shoot the same movement twice

# Clean entrance and Clean Exit

**\*\* If you show an action from beginning to end you don't have to match anything**
