We propose that a revised ENGL 275--currently an elective--become a required course in our revised English MA (with concentrations in Literature and Creative Writing). This change is the result of internal assessment of our English MA; our assessment results show that English MA students did not have a sufficient understanding of the place of literary periods and historical contexts in literary studies.

The course will now form part of the core for the English MA and, with the other courses in the core, will bring our program into line with CSU E01071.

In addition, a significant portfolio project that becomes part of a student's e-portfolio is being added to the course and the number of units changed appropriately (4-unit course).
