Typically, students take survey courses in subfields of Psychology. This class provides a flexible opportunity for students to learn advanced material about a specialty topic. It allows for students to delve deeper into a specific area of interest. Students will benefit from the opportunity to learn with a professor in their area of expertise. Topics will rotate across semesters and faculty allowing students to take the course up to two times for credit (capstone and elective). Special topic classes may include courses such as: Advanced Study in Community Psychology; Critical Community Psychology, Advanced Study in Cognitive Psych: Mind Wandering and Memory, Advanced Study in Applied Behavior Analysis: Animal Training, as well as classes from other areas of the discipline. Fulfills the Capstone requirement for the major. Restricted to majors.

Examines a special topic of interest in psychology. Offered by rotating instructors, the capstone explores selected topics in psychology, and contemporary developments in theories, methodologies, and/or methods in the selected sub-discipline or topical area. Topics can include subject matter from all areas of psychology, including, but not limited to: applied behavior analysis, clinical, cognitive, community, cultural, developmental, experimental, feminist, health, industrial-organizational, neuroscience, perception, quantitative, social, etc., as well as related methodologies.
