Briefly describe the program proposal (new or change) and provide a justification:

1) We are adding PSYC 118: Cognitive Neuroscience to the Cognitive and Learning Processes Category

Justification: Cognitive neuroscience is one of the most rapidly growing sub disciplines within the field of psychology, bringing together elements of cognition and perception, and examining the underlying biological foundations. This course covers fundamental Cognitive processes, and therefore fits well in the Cognitive/Learning category. Adding this course to the Cognitive/Learning category will also benefit our majors by providing further options for fulfilling their graduation requirements while at the same time exposing them to a rapidly growing sub discipline in psychology.

2) We are moving PSYC 142: Community Psychology from the Capstone Category to the Individual and Social Processes Category Justification: Community psychology focuses on humans in context, and is therefore specifically about the interaction between individual and social processes. Community psychology a newer and growing field in the discipline in the US draws on psychological science to address some of the most complex and intractable social issues we face today. This is the first course in Community Psychology that students can access, and therefore it is more appropriate for the course to be offered along with other survey-level courses, rather than as a capstone. It will provide an opportunity for students to take other courses within our Community Psychology offerings after being introduced to the field.

3) We are adding PSYC 143: Practicum in Community Psychology to the Capstone Category

Justification: The Practicum in Community Psychology course requires students to complete 90 hours of fieldwork in a community agency. Students apply both content from PSYC 142, Community Psychology, as well as courses across the major including, for example, Clinical, Developmental, Social, and Cognitive Psychology. Students also learn and practice professional skills, such as time management, teamwork, communication, workplace ethics, etc. Because students bring together and apply content from across the major, this course fits more logically in the capstone/professional category. This is the second course in Community Psychology that students can access, thus it is also more appropriate to be offered as a capstone.

4) We are adding PSYC 177: Special Topics Capstone: Advanced Study in Psychology to the Capstone Category Justification: The special topic course offers students the opportunity to go in-depth into a particular sub-discipline within psychology, which is currently lacking in our curriculum. This seminar is a high-impact learning opportunity because it affords student the opportunity to work closely with the professor and a small group of their peers. The course will extend what they have learned in their prior coursework, and allow for more connections to other fields and careers. This course therefore fits with the goals of the capstone/professional category.

Program Description

With a Bachelor of Arts in Psychology, graduates can qualify for positions requiring an understanding of human behavior in public service, education, or business. The undergraduate Behavior Analysis Certificate qualifies students for positions requiring the application of behavior analysis in educational settings and health and human service agencies.

The Psychology program at Sacramento State is highly sought after and the undergraduate major is officially impacted. Students wishing to become Psychology majors must meet eligibility requirements before applying for admission to the program. It is highly recommended that interested students speak with a Psychology advisor as soon as possible.

Admission Requirements: Course prerequisites and other criteria for admission of students to the degree major program, and for their continuation in it.

Minimum Grade Requirement

Once admitted to the program, PSYC 2, PSYC 8, ANDPSYC 121 must each be completed with a minimum grade of "C-" or better.
