### Briefly describe the program proposal (new or change) and provide a justification:

We are proposing to make a non-substantive change to the BS in Nutrition and Food (NUFD) program by:

1) replacing FACS 100 and FACS 168 with newly proposed courses NUFD 100 and NUFD 168

2) add NUFD 112 as an elective.

No unit change or additional resources will be needed to implement this change.

#### Rationale:

- 1) In September 2017, we were informed that our current degree program (BS in Family and Consumer Sciences (FACS), Nutrition and Food (NUFD) concentration) was non-compliant with EO 1071. In order to comply with EO 1071, our previously existing NUFD concentration was proposed as a stand-alone degree program, "B.S. in Nutrition and Food." This was approved and became effective in fall 2019. As a result of this change, two new courses were proposed: NUFD 100 and NUFD 168 to replace FACS 100 and FACS 168. These new courses, Senior Seminar (NUFD 168) and Research Methods and Application in Nutrition and Food (NUFD 100) were revised to better meet the career and discipline specific needs of the NUFD majors.
- 2) Current Topics in Nutritional Science (NUFD 112) was re-evaluated and determined that it would be appropriate for Nutrition and Food or Dietetic majors, to use as their writing intensive requirement and/or for an elective. This course covers nutrition controversies as they relate to current issues in nutrition and provide students additional critical thinking and writing opportunities to identify fads and fraud in nutrition.

#### Objectives of the degree program:

- 1. Demonstrate scientific knowledge of fundamental skills, values, resources, current trends, theories, and issues relating to the utilization of food for human growth and metabolism from the interdisciplinary perspective in Dietetics, Food Administration and Nutrition.
- 2. Demonstrate effective communication skills: a) as individuals and collaborators, b) in written and verbal forms, c) in delivery and receipt directions, d) including the use of current technology in the field of Dietetics, Food Administration and Nutrition.
- 3. Analyze and critique information for effective problem solving and scientific evidence in the field of Dietetics, Food Administration and Nutrition.
- 4. Apply and evaluate key values as individuals and describe how ethics and values are applied in the field of Dietetics, Food Administration and Nutrition.
- 5. Examine how multiple perspectives from other disciplines, societies, individuals, groups and cultures influence issues relating to the utilization of food for human growth and metabolism, as well as interdisciplinary science in the field of Dietetics, Food Administration and Nutrition.
