Justification for course proposal:

Undergraduate degree programs in Vocal Performance and Music Education prepare students for graduate study and career readiness in fields related to classical singing and vocal pedagogy. A focused study on classical solo song (art song) based on its stylistic components, historical background and cultural significance is integral to the basic knowledge that students in this discipline should develop before they complete their degree.

We propose to add this course primarily as an elective for voice students majoring in Performance and Music Education, as well as students from other degree plans who may pursue graduate studies in Music History, Vocal Pedagogy or Speech Pathology. This course is intended for undergraduate music majors who have completed at least two semesters of applied study where they have acquired basic familiarity with the structural form and harmonic progressions in a song score. Familiarity with the International Phonetic Alphabet, taught in MUSC 136A Diction for Singers, is recommended in order to assess poetic texts in foreign languages such as French, German, Spanish, and Italian.

We are confident that this course will provide students with necessary analysis and research skills to explore vocal literature commonly used by teachers of singing at all levels and performers in concert. While our current degree curriculum provides ample exposure to ensemble singing and a course about literature for choral teachers, there is no course offered at this time addressing literature for solo singing.

Course Description: (Not to exceed 80 words and language should conform to catalog copy.)

A broad survey of classical song literature for solo voice and piano from the Baroque era to the present day. Topics will include the joining of music and poetry in the art song; identifying stylistic elements of classical song and poetry; cultural influences on its development; compositional techniques used by selected European, South American, and North American composers; and the use of art song in teaching. Designed for music majors; others admitted with instructor permission.
