Justification for course proposal:

This course offers our students a culminating experience that helps prepare them for graduating from Sacramento State and their next steps, whether career path or graduate school. This course draws on the High Impact Practice of offering students a culminating experience. This class and the ideas also connects with the new Intro class to the major, in relation to practices, ideas, topic areas and the course material, which will help students to better understand the structure of the department and our goals.

This class will also be a place to support students as they submit their course work from their courses throughout the major that represent their success in each of the department learning outcomes. A sense, the two courses will help guide the students in developing an eportfolio. The work will be taken from coursework completed in Sociology classes. The department is designing a complete course map that will clarify in which courses students are introduced to, educated about and evaluated on their success in each learning outcome. As well, key assignments from those classes will be identified so students can choose which assignments they can include in their portfolio to reflect each of the outcomes. From this portfolio, the department will be able to regularly evaluate our program.

While we do not have a plan to administratively oversee student enrollment one semester before they graduate, we will include it in our advising material, it is in the course description and in the catalog. We have included a requirement of 85 units completed to be enrolled in the course

Why we are offering the course online:

• The department does not see that it needs to be held in person as we feel the course material can be shared virtually, but have students engage with students, the department, campus resources in person. Utilizing the virtual environment will also allow students to get comfortable and familiar with online learning and the tools that are commonly used. It will also help students to better understand if online learning is a possibility for them, rather than learning in the middle of a content-focused class.

• The requirements are about sharing ideas with one another, connecting with some campus material, but ultimately it is not necessary to be in person to share the material. Students will attend some in person events, meet with other students, faculty and advisors, but the class requirements do not necessitate meeting in person, especially since meeting in person would require all of them to have that specified time available, and the material does not demand this of them.

• The number of graduating students each semester would make it impossible to secure a room for the number of students, especially for a 1 unit course.

They will be meeting occasionally in small groups to discuss ideas, to connect with one another, but those are chosen by them when they are able to participate. This is where community is expected to occur. As does attending department events.
To clarify for students, a statement has been added following the course description on the syllabus.

The course offers Sociology students a culminating experience that has students reflect on their experience as a student in the sociology major, their success in the learning goals and outcomes of the Sociology program, and ultimately engage with their future career goals and their preparation to reach them. You will engage in communication with them around these issues as you reflect on how it relates to your career as a sociology student and how it relates to your experiences after graduation. Worth 20% of total grade. (LO 1, 4, 5) Reflection and Planning:

You will reflect on your ability in each of the learning outcomes as you consider how you have developed in each of the areas during your time at Sacramento State. You will access your reflection from Soc 100a/b when you first joined the major/Sacramento State. Reflect on how these will relate to your future career plan. Worth 20% of total grade. (LO 1, 2, 3, 4) Synchronous Meetings:

Periodically throughout the class we will meet in small groups to discuss your experiences as a Sociology major and plans/ opportunities for after you graduate, discuss possible opportunities and review the topic area of that given week. You will need to make an appointment with an advisor to discuss your plans. Some of these will include being introduced to job talks through alumni and faculty. Worth 20% of total grade. (LO 1, 2, 3, 4)
