We are responding to impending budgetary concerns and this is our first response to limit its impact on our majors. Minors not only take elective classes but also can sign into our required classes, which could slow progress to degree. Students outside of the major will still be able to enroll in many of our courses but will not be given access to our core classes and will not have as much need to complete all of the classes in the minor, which will free up possible classes for majors.

There should be no impact on any other programs, as our minor is not required for any other program, and it does not change the access to courses for other majors.

The department of Sociology discussed and voted on the program to limit impact on student progress to degree in our major. We informed the Dean's office, and programs (Women's Studies, Ethnic Studies, Criminal Justice, Social Work) who often have students who minor in Sociology, just so they are aware of our decision.

All present minors will still be given access to the courses they need to complete their minors. It is about suspending for future minors to be added to the program.

We will be freeing up seats for our majors to be able to progress in their degree.
