## Justification for course proposal:

NUFD 222, Advanced Community Nutrition and Nutrition Education, is currently a 1-unit course developed in 2003 as part of the post-baccalaureate Dietetic Internship (DI). The DI is a full-time supervised practice program with emphasis on disease prevention and public policy. The DI must adhere to accreditation requirements from the Accreditation Council for Education in Nutrition and Dietetics (ACEND).

Community nutrition programming and nutrition education are crucial to address complex issues like food insecurity, obesity and chronic disease prevention and treatment. The existing 1-unit NUFD 222 requires updating and expansion to better align with contemporary and evidence-based approaches in diverse populations. This is also reflected in recent changes to ACEND competencies in diversity, equity, inclusion, and nutrition education.

Specific course content added and expanded include developing interventions with evidence-based techniques of behavior change and applying the Systems Science approach. Scaling-up research will be explored to take effective small-scale interventions and expand reach into larger real world settings. All major concepts of the course will also be updated to maximize application of diversity, equity, and inclusion promotion.

The proposed changes to NUFD 222 will ensure students receive necessary content and depth for advance study and competency in community nutrition and nutrition education for diverse populations. Changing the NUFD 222 units from 1-3 will not impact DI completion time as it will be offset by decreasing the required NUFD 295 DI Field Study by 2 units.

The course will examine the implementation of nutrition care for population groups across the lifespan. Explore assessment and evaluation methodologies of community based food and nutrition programs. Nutrition policy development and evaluation based on community needs and resources to address health disparities.
