Justification for course proposal:

The Master of Science in Counseling in the College of Education is dedicated to providing students with the knowledge and skills necessary to address the needs and concerns of a diverse society. Our program is devoted to social justice and advocacy, working within both our classes and communities, to actively oppose discrimination and celebrate diversity. Throughout the program, emphasis is placed on both personal and professional development with experiential learning infused within the curriculum. Our goal for study abroad is twofold: 1) aid in student counselor identity development 2) develop international counseling relationships

Several courses involve participation, such as service learning in community agencies and schools, prior to the required supervised field placements. The opportunity to study abroad in Vienna Austria would greatly benefit our students by providing a new cultural environment with a deep history in psychotherapy and counseling. It would provide another opportunity for cultural immersion and internal connection. We have designed EDC 205- Advanced Counseling Theory & Multicultural Systems to provide students with a foundation in the philosophy and practice of contemporary theories of counseling and psychotherapy. The material in the course is aimed at helping students develop the basic skills necessary for effective counseling and communicating with clients. The course requirements support three components of multiple measures of learning and outcomes: (1) personal growth in counselor identity development, (2) counseling skills development utilizing multiple approaches, and (3) theory integration and multicultural systems. Students are expected to be actively involved in their learning and are invited to share their knowledge and personal experiences with the class.

The course is designed to not only engage in advanced counseling theory and multicultural immersion but also mentorship. We have developed the course to allow undergraduates, graduates, and alumni of the program to create functional process groups where our students can try theory and counseling skills to receive feedback. Alumni would operate as TA's for working groups of counseling graduates and undergraduate students interested in pursuing counseling. These groups would work with theories to explore counselor identity and theory integration in their practice.

By connecting with Webster University in Vienna, we are strengthening our counseling career opportunities for both our students and for European counselors. The Counseling profession has deep roots in Vienna in theory, but counseling practice is still in its adolescence in Europe. The continued connection between U.S. counselor training institutions and international opportunities helps establish the professional counselor identity across nations and promotes multicultural counseling practice. I appreciate your time and consideration.
