Michelle Felten (mfelten) (Thu, 07 Oct 2021 00:21:32 GMT): Hi Alyson, The Committee approves the proposal for HRS 190P pending the completion of the following suggested edits, adjustments and clarifications. Justification needs to be more clearly defined in language. The mention of HRS 190 replacing HRS 217 is vague. Remove language which includes pre-req.s. in Course Description, as well as language regarding taking it only 1x for credit. Note course is listed as "cross-listed" and should be a "paired course" on both the proposal form and syllabus. Number of times the course can be taken is unclear as 2x, not including original first time passed, which would total 9 units, not 6. Attach notification information proving other affected departments have been notified. Syllabus course description still references "Ordinary America". Need a separate syllabus for 190 and 290 respectively. Thank you, Michelle Felten
