### Briefly describe the program proposal (new or change) and provide a justification:

Moving two units of Upper Division Elective Units to two 1 unit required courses that will be offered to students at the beginning and end of their time as Sociology majors. This will decrease Soc Upper Division elective units from 17 to 15, which means the total units for the major will remain at 43 units, and the Upper Division units will be at 36 units.

One of the 1 unit courses (SOC 2) is an introduction to the major course, which students will take as soon as they declare the major. The course is presently being added, and it would reflect ideas that are considered High Impact Practices for students, connecting them to other students, the department and the university in general. It would introduce students to expectations in the department, key concepts and practices they will need to understand, how and where to locate information and resources about the university and the department, common technology that is used in both the university and the department, key concepts in the discipline, as well as prepare them to think about their learning pathways while at the university and beyond. Many of the assignments within the course will be about connecting them to the university, the department and the resources that will help them to be successful. They will also engage key ideas that many of our students struggle with that would help them to be successful in the discipline, such as the importance of social research and where it exists in the society. One assignment would include reflecting on their own present abilities and knowledge in relation the department learning outcomes, with the intention of introducing them to the goals at the beginning, and more important, to give them an understanding of what we are hoping for them to develop while in the program.

The second 1 unit class (SOC 191) will be a culminating course offered to students 1 semester prior to graduating, so as to allow them at least a semester to add any elements or resources to their course load prior to graduating. This course would also draw on key elements of the High Impact Practice of a culminating course, including having students reflect on and display their success in

the department learning outcomes by creating an e-portfolio. Students will evaluate the learning pathways they have undertaken and evaluate their career trajectory, engaging the tools to prepare them for after graduation.

This class has been created to help lead students through the program and give them access to information and resources to help them be successful. The creation of this course is intended to better prepare students to be successful while at CSUS, with the intention to help them develop a learning pathway that will connect to their future career goals.

The structure of this course will also allow us, by creating e-portfolios for students, to regularly assess our program. To accomplish this, we are presently evaluating our department curriculum map to clarify where students are introduced to each of the learning outcomes, and which assignments in courses assess those outcomes.

There are also a couple of small changes that will be made to the program to update the program. Added Soc 129 to elective list. Class is almost completed going through the process of being added to the curriculum.

Note about general independent study type courses changed as Soc 198 does not show up in our list of general classes, so it needed to be added. Note at bottom needs to be changed so it is included (note about Soc 195 and 199). This will allow the information in our program description to be in alignment with the information that already exists in the course description for Soc 198.

Updated our catalog description about our advanced studies requirement. It still identified them as an "institutions" requirement, which was changed and renamed Advanced Studies several years ago.
