Program Description

The Minor in Park Management is designed for non-RPTA majors interested in learning about career areas and concepts related natural resource and park law enforcement. Park Management can lead to careers in several land management agencies including California State Parks, National Parks (US Department of Interior), National Forests (US Department of Agriculture), Army Corps of

Engineers, and the Bureau of Land Management. Concepts related to recreation ecology, visitor management, cultural and heritage resources, and environmental interpretation are included.

The minor requires 15 units, all of which must be taken in Recreation, Parks, and Tourism Administration. At least 9 units must be upper division, with at least 9 upper division units taken in residence at Sacramento State.

Admission Requirements: Course prerequisites and other criteria for admission of students to the degree major program, and for their continuation in it.

Minimum Grade Requirement

A grade of "C-" or better is required in all upper division courses applied to the minor.
