Philosophy 89 is a new course required of all majors under a concurrently submitted program revision. This course and the program revision have been developed in response to suggestions made in the most recent Program Review. Philosophy 89 has two main goals: (1) to provide majors with a grasp of fundamental methods and concepts prior to taking required upper-division courses in the major. (2) To provide data on the academic preparation of students entering the Philosophy program so that we can better ascertain the value the program has added by the time they take Philosophy 189. 189 is our current Senior Seminar which serves the purpose of ascertaining the proficiency of students the semester prior to graduation.
