Writing Enriched Curriculum is two courses. You mention this as both in the narrative justification. Please clarify which you are proposing. If it is a Writing Enriched Curriculum proposal, we will need to know which other course this goes with. • Curriculum Workflow does not include learning outcomes related to GWI. They seem to be on the syllabus only? • The word counts for assignments and other information related to them seem to be in the assignment descriptions that are under numerous separate attachments. Please include in the syllabus and consider adding to Curriculum Workflow. This will ensure that the proposal moves through the committees quickly and efficiently. • Please review the requirements for GWI courses in the policy and in the worksheet provided to graduate coordinators. In particular the committee could not find evidence of these two points: o Assignments that reflect several different types of writing within the discipline o Required peer review
