## Provide reasons for the program suspension.

In 2021, we created a new inclusive, general Asian Studies major and decided to first suspend and then ultimately discontinue our existing 4 concentrations. We have 4 BA degrees by concentration: Chinese, Japanese, Korean, South and Southeast Asian (36 units). To clarify the variety of changes in the Asian Studies Program, I am summarizing below what we are doing. We are now commencing Step \#4, and using the South and Southeast Asian concentration as the first test case before doing the others. 1. We are creating a new general Asian Studies BA (39 units). 2. We are creating new Asian Studies (ASIA) coded courses to fulfill the requirements and create new electives. 3. New courses include: ASIA 1 (required for major and minor), ASIA 111 (elective, required for minor). Revised courses: ASIA 198 (required for major and minor) 4. We will discontinue the 4 concentrations as soon as possible. 5 . We are revising our current Minor in Asian Studies from 24 to 18 units. Now, two ASIA coded pan-Asia courses will be required, many optional electives remain. 6 . We are migrating the curriculum of the concentrations to proposed 18 -unit minors. 7. The concentrations in Korean Studies and South/Southeast Asian Studies will become minors. 8. The concentrations in Chinese and Japanese Studies may become minors; currently discussions with interested faculty are taking place.

Describe the consultation that has occurred with affected units.

This was a collective decision of the interdisciplinary faculty of Asian Studies and thus all parties that have courses in our major have approved. The ongoing major maintains credit for all of the same classes as the concentration so it does not alter the units that have courses in our program.

Explain provisions to ensure currently enrollment students have a reasonable opportunity to complete the program.

As above, the courses available to complete the degree concentrations remain in place. We will see them through before discontinuing. We have less than 5 students in this concentration so we anticipate a smooth transition.

Indicate what resources will be freed up or shifted to other programs as the result of the program suspension.

We can focus on one single major in the long run and streamline assessment and ensure students can graduate on time without the challenges of getting language credit. For this concentration, the 4 semester language requirement is impossible due to the nonexistence of such courses in World Languages and Literature.

## Program Description

Pacific Asia, including the nation states on the Asian shores of the Pacific Rim, the Koreas, Japan, China, Taiwan, the Philippines, Vietnam, Cambodia, Thailand, Myanmar, Laos, Malaysia, Singapore, Brunei Darussalam, and Indonesia, is a region of great economic, political and strategic importance, possessing immense natural and human resources.
The major is designed to provide students with a coherent introduction to the language, history, and culture of Asian societies on the western rim of the Pacific Basin. While focusing on Pacific Asia, the program also supports the study of cultures from the Indian subcontinent and other regions of Asia. Each concentration provides an interdisciplinary understanding of the major social and historical forces at work in the region, supported by appropriate language training.
Graduates of the program either continue their studies at graduate institutions or utilize their knowledge and training through employment in government, business or education relating to this increasingly important region of the world.
