Justification for course proposal:

We are proposing to update the prerequisite course codes from FACS to NUFD. The changes are due to the NUFD degree/ concentration elevation from FACS that took place in 2019 due to EO 1071. This is merely an administrative update as all nutrition course codes were changed to NUFD but the prerequisites were not and this has led to student confusion.

In addition, the Service Learning (SL) Designation approval form has been attached. This course is and has been a service learning course for more than two decades. Recently service learning courses needed to be reviewed and given approval for SL designation. This course was reviewed and approved with appropriate documentation added to the Form A.

Lastly, the k-factor classification is being updated from CS#04 to CS#02. This appears to be a long standing misclassification as this course is not conducted as a lecture/recitation (CS#04) but rather lecture/discussion (CS#02) with significant discussion about application of course content to the service learning experience. Both classification have the same k-factor.
