Justification for course proposal:

We are updating this course and its title to reflect curricular changes in the graduate program in psychology. This course was taught as part of the previous counseling program in psychology which no longer exists. This course proposal reflects changes and updates in the title, course description, learning objectives, assessments, and literatures relevant to culture and diversity in psychology. Updates to this course are intended to make the course current and relevant to general Psychology as opposed to being specific to counseling Psychology. PSYC 235, Psychology of Culture, Race, and Ethnicity, will be the primary course that provides education to graduate students in psychology on culture, race, ethnicity and the human mind and behavior. As such, this course addresses the MA in Psychology (General Psychology) Program's sixth learning goal objective which is to "Demonstrate knowledge of cultural diversity and commitment to diversity." Pre-requisites have also been updated to include graduate standing. The course is also being designated as department approval for enrollment to be consistent with other graduate level courses in the department. This course can serve as an elective for the MA General PSYC program. This course will also address the university graduate learning goal: "Intercultural/Global Perspectives: Demonstrate relevant knowledge and application of intercultural and/or global perspectives."

Presents an overview of contemporary theory and research in the study of culture, race, ethnicity, and the human mind and behavior. Topics may include diversity science, cultural neuroscience, racial and ethnic identities, prejudice, and discrimination. Particular emphasis will be placed on cultural, social, and economic considerations that affect the behavior and adjustment of individuals and groups. We will examine selected lines of research across sub-specializations in psychology to better understand the psychological processes of people in diverse societies.
