### Provide reasons for the program suspension.

We're proposing a program change that takes the Liberal Studies BA concentrations and turns them into areas of emphasis within a single Liberal Studies BA program instead; this renders the current concentrations obsolete. 1. Currently, the Liberal Studies major is listed in the catalog as separate majors with different concentrations. 2. Currently, concentrations do NOT appear on student transcripts. This will continue to be the case with Areas of Emphasis. 3. An Area of Emphasis (previously called a "Concentration") typically requires 9-12 courses to complete. The Liberal Studies core major requirements consist of 82 units. 4. The curriculum

requirements for each Area of Emphasis will be identical to the current curriculum requirements for a Concentration. 5. Students may still complete a minor in lieu of an area of emphasis as is currently allowed in the catalog. 6. Changes to the Liberal Studies core major requirements are being revised to reflect changes in course offerings. Rationale: The Liberal Studies Council believes this will help students get more effective advising and alleviate some confusion regarding "concentrations", subject matter programs, and supplementary teaching authorizations. These concentrations are not listed on the student's transcript. Also, these concentrations do not comply with the university and systemwide definitions of concentrations. The term "concentrations" was borrowed from the California Commission on Teacher Credentialing when the major was originally created. Currently, there are 12 distinct Liberal Studies programs listed in the catalog because there are 12 concentrations. Some students are misled to think this means they are completing a subject matter program in a single subject or a supplementary authorization in an area because of how these distinct majors are listed in the catalog.

## Program Description

The Liberal Studies program is an interdisciplinary major, which encompasses a wide variety of areas of knowledge in a multidisciplinary curriculum. The program provides a broad academic program that encourages academic excellence, diversity, community, and collaboration. There are two tracks in the Liberal Studies Program: Pre-Credential and General.

•The Pre-Credential program is a multidisciplinary major designed for students who intend to become K-8 or special education teachers in California, and it has been approved by the California Commission on Teacher Credentialing. Its purpose is to provide beginning teachers with a strong grounding in the wide ranging subject matter that will be needed to be effective teachers. The core section is comprised of courses in reading, language and literature, mathematics, natural science, history and social sciences, visual and performing arts, physical education, human development, and health. The Pre-Credential program requires a 12-unit area concentration.

•The General program is designed for students who are interested in a multidisciplinary major, but who do not necessarily plan to become teachers. The Liberal Studies major is an excellent preparation for careers in government service, public administration, business, management, community service, counseling, law, librarianship, public health, as well as professional or graduate school. This major requires students to include a minor.

The Liberal Studies major is a complex program requiring early and continuing contact with an adviser. Students meet with an adviser at least once each semester to provide a hands-on approach to learning. Students must complete 120 units and meet the University foreign language requirement in order to earn a Bachelor of Arts degree. Students are urged to obtain advice as early as possible to avoid delays in the completion of these requirements. The Liberal Studies program director and faculty and staff advisers are located in Lassen Hall 2008, (916) 278-6342.

**Admission Requirements: Course prerequisites and other criteria for admission of students to the degree major program, and for their continuation in it.**

## Minimum Grade Requirement

A minimum grade of "C-" is required in all courses applied to the Liberal Studies major.

## Requirements for Concentrations (Pre-Credential Program)

All concentrations require a minimum of 12 units, 3 of which may overlap with the core course requirements (except for concentration in multicultural studies). Students who wish to complete requirements for a supplementary authorization in any CCTC-approved discipline, which allows them to teach the subject matter typically taught in grades K-9, should see an adviser for important information.
