Justification for course proposal:

The purpose of this interdisciplinary course is to encourage and support students to explore how their major is related to various careers that draw upon multiple disciplines and provide opportunities for positive impact on society (social impact). A multi-disciplinary mindset is increasingly needed in today's workforce, yet many students are not exposed to career options that are more broadly aligned across disciplines.

Theories of cultural and social capital, theories of social change, and theories of career development are explored in relation to students' past and current experiences, major, and intended career aspirations. Students are expected to apply these theories, and engage across majors, in a way that expands their thinking about potential career paths, civic engagement, and other pursuits, including entrepreneurship.

This course has been developed through collaboration with Sacramento State's Career Center, Community Engagement Center, Department of Sociology, and College of Social Sciences and Interdisciplinary Studies, each contributing to the course structure, content and identification of resources afforded to students. ID 126 (proposed number) was initially introduced as an experimental course, ID96I, to serve students who are participating in the Californian's For All / College Corps, which aims to engage students throughout the state in working toward solving problems in their local communities. This is the seminar that accompanies their community engagement, but can also be taken by those who are not involved in College Corps or in community-engaged learning. [Note: College Corps students are engaged with organizations working in three priority areas: K-12 education, climate action, and food insecurity, and can earn up to \$10,000.00 and an AmeriCorps Segal Education Award.]

ID 126 reflects the primary goals of the College Corps program: Goal 1: Create a generation of civic-minded leaders with the ability to bridge divides and solve problems; Goal 2: Provide all students with high impact learning experiences which will support student retention and degree completion; Goal 3: Address societal challenges and help build more equitable communities across California. This course will continue to support these important goals beyond the scope, and potentially beyond the term, of the College Corps program. Other programs for which ID 126 would be of service include, the Student Volunteer Leaders program offered through the Community Engagement Center, as well as other programs on campus. In particular this course may serve smaller programs which do not have an existing capstone course.

- If enrolled in ID 126 as a 1-credit course, the expectation is that students will spend approximately 3 hours each week relative to course requirements and expectations.
- If enrolled in ID 126 as a 2-credit course, the expectation is that students will spend approximately 6 hours each week relative to course requirements and expectations.
- If enrolled in ID 126 as a 3-credit course, the expectation is that students will spend approximately 9 hours each week relative to course requirements and expectations.

Designed for students of all majors, this course will guide students on ways to maximize their positive social impact via cultural and social capital. Students will survey their leadership skills and gain an understanding of how to connect knowledge from multiple disciplines to career-ready soft skills. This course teaches students how to position themselves for a social impact career by building upon their service, leadership, community engagement, education, and experiences as related to diverse career opportunities in and across disciplines.
