Briefly describe the program proposal (new or change) and provide a justification:

The proposed changes to the BFA in Studio Art Degree integrate new and updated courses in the New Media Art area, and a new upper division GE Art History course. The existing courses ART 143 and ART 197 are being split into two new courses each (ART 143 A and B, and ART 197 A and B). Additionally, the New Media Art area is proposing an area name-change to "New Media Art and Animation." The area name change reflects the expanded content addressing student demand and curricular need. The animation courses are being split into two because too much information is being covered in one class in both 2D and 3D animation. Also, students are having to repeat these classes to complete the emphasis. With the new courses, they will have more variety of animation courses available to them. These courses will be taught on a rotating basis (they will not be added as additional schedule sections). The course name changes will make progress to graduation and course offering/content information clearer for BA in Art majors and their advisors. The new courses will offer more options for all BA in Art majors to fulfill their graduation requirements. Since multiple areas of the department include hybrid and fully-online classes, and the department has adopted policies regarding instructor training for online teaching, the Delivery Format is being changed to Hybrid, although most of the New Media Art courses are taught face-to-face. All proposed courses will be taught by existing faculty on a rotating basis and using existing classrooms and facilities.

In addition, some adjustments were made to the Upper-Division Art History elective section to reflect new courses that have been recently added (ART 102, ART 190, and ART 172); ART 117C is an older course that was accidentally left off of the Form B and has now been added. We have deleted ART 118A from the list of courses because it has not been offered in many years and we will likely be deactivating that course due to a lack of faculty with this expertise.

Finally, a new course that was approved last year, ART 122C (Advanced Drawing and Painting, Experimental Studies) is being added as a possibility to the Drawing Group and the Painting Group, since it was not added at the time it was proposed. This will give students an additional choice in those groups.

Program Description

The Bachelor of Fine Arts in Studio Art is a four-year program that prepares students for successful careers as artists. It is the professional degree for an artist and provides the foundation for the master's program in studio art. While the B.F.A. program provides students with a broad overview of the fine art areas of ceramics, drawing, painting, printmaking, sculpture, interdisciplinary and new media art, it is designed to develop in-depth skills in one of these areas of the visual arts. The studio curriculum in the program emphasizes technical mastery, individuality, creative experimentation and prepares students for a variety of post-graduate pursuits. The curriculum also provides a thorough grounding in visual art thinking, contemporary art history and critical theory. The degree is designed for undergraduate students who want to combine intensive and innovative studio art practice with an outstanding education in the liberal arts.

Admission Requirements: Course prerequisites and other criteria for admission of students to the degree major program, and for their continuation in it.

Minimum Grade Requirements

A minimum grade of "C" is required in all lower division courses and upper division non-studio courses applied to the Studio Art program.

A minimum grade of "B" is required in all upper division studio courses.

Additional Requirements

Participation in an exhibition of BFA candidates is required for completion of the degree.

Note: Whenever possible, classes should be selected in consultation with a faculty advisor. It is recommended that students complete all of the lower division requirements before enrolling in upper division courses. Prerequisites for some courses may be waived on the advisement of an Art instructor and a portfolio review. ART 192A Senior Seminar in Studio Art (3 units) is a required course, taken in the final semester of the Senior year and concurrently with ART 194, BFA Senior Project.
