Abstract of the proposal:

The Psychology department currently offers a BA in Psychology. We are changing from a BA in Psychology to a BS in Psychology given the number of required units in the major are consistent with the number of units required for a BS (Title 5 CCR § 40501; Bachelor of Science Degree: Required Curriculum). We are also changing to a BS given it is more consistent with the number of required methods and statistics courses as well as the emphasis on empirical research across our curriculum. We are also proposing some curricular changes, including moving courses previously offered as electives into designated categories that will count as a major requirement and changing the minimum grade requirement of our Introductory Statistics course (PSYC 9). Finally, we are making changes to the application review process for the degree completion program in CCE.

Briefly describe the program proposal (new or change) and provide a justification:

The following changes are being proposed to the Psychology program:

1. PSYC 9 Introductory Statistics for Psychology is being changed to a C- or better in order to fulfill requirements of the major. This change is being made given additional upper division coursework in methods and statistics is required and we want to ensure students have the necessary skillset to perform well in those courses. Changing the grade requirement to a C- will also be consistent with the grade requirement we have in place for PSYC 2 and PSYC 8.

2. PSYC 123 Program Evaluation is being added to the Methods category. This course is a survey of psychological research methods applied to evaluate community programs and interventions. This is a course that was initially offered as an elective and is now being moved into the appropriate category.

3. The capstone category is being renamed to "specialized topics" to better reflect the courses we are currently offering. Also, we are stating that students should select 3 units versus one course given some of the courses within this category can vary in terms of the number of units students take.

4. PSYC 144 Psychology of Happiness is being added to the specialized topics category (previously the capstone category). This course was created as part of the Rekhi Singh endowed faculty position and is now being incorporated as one option to fulfill the specialized topics requirement for the major.

5. PSYC 197A Advanced Research I, PSYC 197B Advanced Research II, and PSYC 199 Special Problems are being added to the specialized topics courses (previously the capstone category). These courses can be taken in succession following PSYC 194 Cooperative Research and students can take varying units.

6. PSYC 183 Teaching of Psychology is being removed from the curriculum. This course is not currently being offered and we do not feel it is needed to support students who have an interest in learning how to teach given existing mentorship opportunities students have for paid ISA and TA positions within the department.

7. PSYC 190 is being moved out of the specialized topics category (previously the capstone category) given we do not currently have faculty members who specialize in this area. PSYC 190 will continue to be offered as an elective.

PSYC 165 Evolutionary Psychology is being moved into the Biological Processes category to count for a major requirement.
 Evolutionary psychology focuses on the biological bases of affect, cognition, and behavior within specific environmental contexts. It has fulfilled the B5 GE requirement because the University considers PSYC 165 to be in the Life Sciences category.
 BIO 115 is being removed as a cross listed course with PSYC 115 given this course is not currently being offered in the Biology

department (see Form A). 10. We are making changes for application review for the degree completion program in CCE. The changes to the CCE Psychology degree completion program are marked in the description section "Application Requirements for the CCE Psychology degree completion program". These changes will require that all lower division major coursework is completed prior to application submission in order to be considered for the program. 11. We are changing from a BA in Psychology to a BS in Psychology given the number of required units in the major are consistent with the number of units required for a BS (Title 5 CCR § 40501; Bachelor of Science Degree: Required Curriculum). Our major has a heavy emphasis on scientific and quantitative methods. Additionally, the content of many upper division courses has research embedded in the curriculum; thus, a BS would more accurately reflect the nature of our program.

Program Description

With a Bachelor of Science in Psychology, graduates can qualify for positions requiring an understanding of human behavior in public service, education, or business. The undergraduate Behavior Analysis Certificate qualifies students for positions requiring the application of behavior analysis in educational settings and health and human service agencies.

The Psychology program at Sacramento State is highly sought after and the undergraduate major is officially impacted. Students wishing to become Psychology majors must meet eligibility requirements before applying for admission to the program. It is highly recommended that interested students speak with a Psychology advisor as soon as possible.

Admission Requirements: Course prerequisites and other criteria for admission of students to the degree major program, and for their continuation in it.

Students interested in a Psychology major or minor should contact the Psychology Department in Amador Hall room 350; prospective majors should also consult the Psychology Department website for information on the supplemental application process.

Minimum Grade Requirement

PSYC 2, PSYC 8, PSYC 9, AND PSYC 121 must each be completed with a minimum grade of "C-" or better.
