Provide reasons for the program suspension.

In 2021, we created a new inclusive, general Asian Studies major and decided to first suspend and then ultimately discontinue our existing 4 concentrations. In place of the concentration in Chinese Studies, we have proposed a Chinese Studies minor. We are now suspending the Chinese Studies concentration, as students can attain the same credential and interest by pairing the new general major with the proposed minor, or simply taking the courses in the major and earn a degree in Asian Studies with a focus on China.

Describe the consultation that has occurred with affected units.

This was a collective decision of the interdisciplinary faculty of Asian Studies and thus all parties that have courses in our major have approved. The ongoing major maintains credit for all of the same classes as the concentration so it does not alter the units that have courses in our program.

Explain provisions to ensure currently enrollment students have a reasonable opportunity to complete the program.

As above, the courses available to complete the degree concentrations remain in place. We will see them through before discontinuing. Once all students have completed their BA in Asian Studies with the Chinese concentration, we will discontinue. Students have been advised of this contingency for the past two years at orientation and new student advising. Existing students have been encouraged to switch to the new major, I think only 1-2 remain. They will have no trouble to complete what is essentially the same curriculum.

Indicate what resources will be freed up or shifted to other programs as the result of the program suspension.

We can focus on one single major in the long run and streamline assessment and ensure students can graduate on time without the challenges of getting language credit. For this concentration, the 4 semester language requirement is difficult due to transfer students not always choosing to begin the CHIN 1A/B, 2A/B sequence their first semester on campus. Now, they have more options and less requirements.

Program Description

Pacific Asia, including the nation states on the Asian shores of the Pacific Rim, the Koreas, Japan, China, Taiwan, the Philippines, Vietnam, Cambodia, Thailand, Myanmar, Laos, Malaysia, Singapore, Brunei Darussalam, and Indonesia, is a region of great economic, political and strategic importance, possessing immense natural and human resources.

The major is designed to provide students with a coherent introduction to the language, history, and culture of Asian societies on the western rim of the Pacific Basin. While focusing on Pacific Asia, the program also supports the study of cultures from the Indian subcontinent and other regions of Asia. Each concentration provides an interdisciplinary understanding of the major social and historical forces at work in the region, supported by appropriate language training.

Graduates of the program either continue their studies at graduate institutions or utilize their knowledge and training through employment in government, business or education relating to this increasingly important region of the world.

In other words, Japanese Studies Concentration Majors cannot take courses from group 1, Chinese Studies Concentration Majors cannot take courses from group 2, and Southeast Asia Concentration Majors cannot take courses from group 3.

Students must demonstrate proficiency at a level equivalent to four semesters of an Asian language appropriate to their concentration by coursework or a language proficiency examination provided by the Department of Foreign Languages. Students concentrating in South or Southeast Asia can demonstrate proficiency in any South or Southeast Asian Language.
