#### Abstract of the proposal:

We are proposing to create a Minor in Chinese Studies as an interdisciplinary minor housed in Asian Studies that includes all Chinaspecific courses offered across the university. The minor will introduce students to the general area of Asian Studies through one introductory required course (ASIA 1), and to China through 15 units on Chinese Studies, including language courses. The Minor de facto replaces the existing major in Chinese Studies that is currently a concentration in the Asian Studies major.

### Briefly describe the program proposal (new or change) and provide a justification:

Asian Studies currently offers a BA in Asian Studies with a Concentration in Chinese Studies. We are discontinuing the regional concentration in Chinese Studies as a major but are reformulating it as a minor. There is strong interest in China on our campus and in the community. We have typically had a small cohort of students majoring in the Chinese concentration and anticipate such students will instead choose to adopt the minor, perhaps paired with an Asian Studies major or a separate major. We also think students with interest in China but who did not wish to pursue a 44 unit major in Asian Studies may choose to take a basically 18 unit minor instead. We believe this minor will help maintain enrollment in Chinese language courses and facilitate interest in our courses and our major. It will fortify the study of China on campus, support the value of language study, and promote student intellectual growth and success. All tenure track faculty teaching these courses participated in the deliberations as a Chinese Working Group committee to formulate this minor and ensure it is distinct from the current Chinese language minor housed in the College of Arts and Letters' World Languages and Literatures Department.

Five elective courses are required, and they must total a minimum of 13 units, but course units vary from 1 unit Kinesiology courses to 5 unit Chinese language classes, thus reflecting the variance from a minimum of 13 units to a maximum of 21 units.
