The pre-major will include a total of four lower division courses that could be completed at local community colleges as part of our transfer model. We are requiring a "C-" or better in the completion of these four courses. During impaction we required an eligibility of a 2.3 or above in all college level courses to be eligible for the program. The intention here is to assure the student is prepared for success in their required upper division coursework. In particular, this requirement increases the likelihood of success in the core research methods and statistics curriculum that is one facet of our major.

Finally, we also added on PSYC 3 to be cross-listed with CHAD 30, which is currently under review at the University level.

PSYC 8 and PSYC 9 use to be in semester 4 after acceptance into the major. However, with pre-major, students should take earlier, during semester 3. There were no changes to the 2-year roadmap, and therefore that was not uploaded here.

Program Description

Psychology is the scientific study of human and animal behavior, cognition, and emotion. It is a broad discipline that includes both basic research and the application of research findings to everyday life. With a Bachelor of Science in Psychology, graduates can qualify for positions requiring an understanding of human behavior in public service, education, or business. The undergraduate Behavior Analysis Certificate qualifies students for positions requiring the application of behavior analysis in educational settings and health and human service agencies.

The Psychology program at Sacramento State is highly sought after and the undergraduate major is officially impacted. Students wishing to become Psychology majors must meet eligibility requirements before applying for admission to the program. It is highly recommended that interested students speak with a Psychology advisor as soon as possible.

Admission Requirements: Course prerequisites and other criteria for admission of students to the degree major program, and for their continuation in it.

Pre-Requisite Requirements

To become a Psychology major, the student must first have successfully completed the following courses or their equivalent with a grade of "C-" or better:
