Program Description

The Bachelor of Science in Therapeutic Health prepares students for careers in healthcare, human services, and rehabilitation with a focus on improving quality of life through therapeutic practices. The program is designed to build foundational knowledge in health sciences, and develop critical skills in assessment, documentation, leadership, and evidence-based practices that promote the physical, cognitive, social, emotional, and spiritual well-being of individuals.

The concentration in **Therapeutic Recreation** prepares students to design, implement, and evaluate evidence-based recreation and leisure interventions that enhance the health and well-being of individuals across diverse populations. Students gain specialized knowledge in the science of disability, therapeutic interventions, and program management while developing the competencies required for professional certification through the National Council for Therapeutic Recreation Certification (NCTRC).

Through coursework and applied learning experiences, students learn to assess client needs, document progress, and facilitate interventions that promote physical activity, social connection, emotional resilience, and community integration. The concentration emphasizes ethical practice, cultural competence, and leadership in therapeutic health settings such as hospitals, rehabilitation centers, behavioral health facilities, long-term care, schools, and community organizations.

Graduates are well-prepared for careers as Certified Therapeutic Recreation Specialists (CTRS) and for advanced studies in allied health and human services fields.

Note:

 Students graduating with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Recreation Therapy will not be subject to the University's Foreign Language Graduation Requirement. Students who change their major may be subject to the University's Foreign Language Graduation Requirement.

Admission Requirements: Course prerequisites and other criteria for admission of students to the degree major program, and for their continuation in it.

Minimum Grade Requirement

Grade of "C-" or better is required in all courses applied to the major.

Additional Information

Credit by Examination: A student who seeks course credit by examination is to enroll in the course to be challenged. No course may be challenged after the first two weeks of the semester. The instructor of the course will conduct an assessment of the student's readiness to challenge the course for credit examination. For more information, refer to the "Credit by Examination" section of the Sacramento State Catalog.

Advising: It is necessary for students to work closely with an advisor to complete the BS in Therapeutic Health with a concentration in Therapeutic Recreation in a timely manner. It is strongly recommended that all students consult with an advisor prior to enrolling in courses, and this should occur at least once per semester.
