Briefly describe the program proposal (new or change) and provide a justification:

The Social Science Faculty Council has approved the following changes to program learning outcomes and major curriculum requirements for BA Social Science:

1. Revised Program Learning Outcomes

The proposed revisions below were sent back to the Social Science Faculty Council due to outdated Program Learning Outcomes for the BA Social Science. The Social Science Faculty Council spent the academic term revising these program learning outcomes to combine the existing California Commission of Teaching Credentials (CTC) Subject Matter Program (SMP) Waiver curriculum with legislative changes that requires coverage of additional social science content in public instruction (K-12). To that end, the council decided unanimously to include both the CTC-required SMP curriculum and new content from ethnic studies. BA Social Science remains a CTC-approved subject matter waiver program.

2. Integration of Ethnic Studies curriculum into core requirements.

Previously, students had the option to take Ethnic Studies coursework in electives, but were not required to do so in the core. Also, since the last program change, students are now required to complete Area 6 (formerly Area F). Through consultation with Ethnic Studies and inclusion of an Ethnic Studies faculty into the council, the council is proposing requiring a specific Area 6 course (ETHN 11) which covers content for each of the four areas of Ethnic Studies: Asian American, Chicano/a, Native-American, and Pan African Studies. In addition, the Social Science Faculty Council is proposing the integration of an upper division ETHN course that focuses on one of the four areas of Ethnic Studies. While these changes are not required for subject matter competency, there have been legislative changes that require knowledge of Ethnic Studies for future teachers. The Teaching Credentials program moved forward with additional Ethnic Studies curriculum without consultation with the Social Science Faculty Council

3. Elimination of the State Perspectives requirement

This requirement was not necessary to meet subject matter program requirements, and there are relatively few options for students to satisfy this requirement. The courses that previously appeared in the list of State Perspective electives have been re-allocated to other elective areas, so they remain options for students. This decision reflects programmatic changes made by social science faculty in their home departments.

4. Additional option to satisfy world politics/international policy

There is also a change that allows students to take one of two courses (POLS 35 or POLS 130) to satisfy knowledge of world politics/international politics that was approved by the Social Science Faculty Council. Previously, only POLS 35 was counted toward the core requirements in world politics, but offering students an upper division option allows students more flexibility in their course schedules. This course is routinely substituted for POLS 35 with approval by the Department Chairperson for Political Science, and the Director of the Social Science Program.

5. Deletion and addition of elective offerings

Based on course availability and offerings, courses have been added and deleted from the list of electives. This was done in consultation with department chairs from the programs that offer these courses.

Additional comments

Consultation with each department was sought out at various stages of the proposed program changes. In addition, the Social Science Faculty Council includes representation from several of the departments that offer curriculum in the BA Social Science program.

The removal of State Perspectives electives area and inclusion of upper division Ethnic Studies core is neutral in terms of total units in the major.

Even though the degree program has increased from 63 to 66 units total, the 3 additional units are attributed to requiring a specific Area 6 course (formerly Area F) to meet degree requirements. This change requires that students must complete a specific Area 6 course ETHN 11 (e.g., units in degree increased by 3 units, but GE units outside of the major decreased by 3 units).

There are changes to the core requirements, and the elimination of an elective area. Students are required to take an upper division Ethnic Studies Course (ETHN 110, ETHN 130, ETHN 131, ETHN 140, or ETHN 170). We have eliminated the area of State Perspectives. The total units to degree have increased by 3 units because of the requirement that students complete a specific Area 6 course (ETHN 11).
