

Donation Drive Yields Big Returns for California Wildfire Victims



In early August, employees of the Bursar's Office came together to help wildfire victims from the Carr Fire in Redding, CA.

Donations included non-perishable goods, including canned and boxed foods, as well as household family items like diapers, toothbrushes, and basic medicines.

Administrator 1, Nicole Rogers of the Bursar's Office explained how she started the drive: "I saw a Facebook posting from

the Wilton Firefighters Association. I knew that this was something our office could pull together in a short period of time," said Rogers. "I sent out a text to our staff on Saturday night and collected the donations through Thursday."

The recent Carr Fire near Redding, CA, has destroyed over 1000 homes spanning over 180 square miles, as of August 1, 2018. The severity of the fires makes the efforts from the Bursar's office that much more deserving of praise.

"These goods are meant for the victims of the Carr fire. The donations will be collected and delivered by the End of Watch Fund in partnership with the Wilton Firefighters Association," explained Rogers. "There are so many fires going on in our state. We felt we needed to do our part to help those that have been affected. This donation drive was easy and a fast way to get the victims what they need."

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Parking Structure Five is Completed and Now Open!

Earlier this spring, the long awaited PS5 was finally completed. This new structure will help alleviate parking concerns on campus for faculty, staff, and students. The six-story structure boasts over 1200 spaces and includes parking for electric vehicles.

Accounting Technician II, Candace Ensley, described a simple benefit during this hot summer season "I love parking in the new structure because my vehicle is cool when I get in at the end of the day! No more burning my hands on a sunbaked steering wheel!"

The new parking structure did see several delays. However, students, faculty, and staff are now enjoying additional parking in one of the highest in-demand locations: the north end of campus. The new structure also utilizes technology to help notify commuters of parking space allocations. "I greatly appreciate the notification of how many parking slots are open as soon as you enter the garage and the color coding for different personnel," said Administrative Analyst/Specialist, France Palu.

Despite all of the positives the parking structure brings us, there have been some slight headaches to get used to. During a recent Business Partner's Round Table meeting, several attendees mentioned that some drivers do not appear to know how to use the roundabout, located near the main entrance of the structure. Director of University Transportation & Parking Services (UTAPS), Tony Lucas, replied that the roundabout contains all of the necessary and legal signage, but acknowledged that some drivers may still be getting used to the feature. He emphasized one key point: "cars in the roundabout have the right-of-way." Hopefully with time, drivers will remember this rule.

"All the feedback from employees has been positive so far," said Assisant to the Director, Freddy Orozco. "I haven't received any complaints." Freddy did, however, address that we haven't yet seen how the Parking Structure will operate under full load once the semester begins. "We still don't know how the campus community is going to handle the roundabout on Arboretum Way at peak times." To help address this, UTAPS is planning to man the roundabout with traffic officers during the first week of the fall semester. Drive safe everyone!

To publicize their name change, University Print & Mail hosted a presentation at the Business Partners Round Table meeting in August. Their new contact information is as follows:



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GREEN NEWS - BAC YARD



What is the BAC Yard?

The Bioconversion and Agricultural Collaborative (BAC) Yard, located in lot 10 near where Folsom Blvd. and the train tracks intersect, is a sustainability facility maintained by a myriad of Sac State students, faculty, and staff. What began as a way for the University to begin composting its fallen leaf material every fall has blossomed into a full-fledged learning facility bringing together a number of different needs and finding a common answer for all.

The BAC Yard was birthed from a Campus as a Living Lab (CALL) grant from the Chancellor's Office. What is unique about the CALL grant is that it specifically marries the efforts of Facilities Management with those of academia; a class is designed to work on an operational problem the University is facing.

What does the BAC Yard do?

Each fall, Sac State accrues over a hundred tons of leaves from all of the trees across our esteemed Tree Campus USA. Those leaves were previously hauled away, but now our Grounds department piles them into a windrow right in the BAC Yard. The leaves are then rolled with large machinery by our grounds team until it is processed into high quality compost to be used right here on the campus.

Additionally, food waste was collected at numerous campus eateries and picked up by Family and Consumer Science (FACS) students and taken to the BAC Yard to be composted using more hands-on methods. Students began hot-composting and vermicomposting to process the food waste. Hot composting is simple composting akin to the type someone might do at home. Vermicomposting employs special worms called red-wigglers who eat the food scraps and add their own special fertilizer to the compost to produce a higher quality product. Students turn and water the piles and collect the compost once the process is completed.



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What's Next for the BAC Yard?

Though the BAC Yard has its roots in composting, it has since expanded to include the ASI Garden, four beehives, a solar-powered aquaponics system and numerous other student projects. All produce from the garden is donated to the Pop-Up Pantry to help students facing food security issues and the bees help to pollinate the garden and other plants. All are tended to by the Sac State Sustainability Team and a small army of student volunteers.

The BAC Yard itself is also helping the campus to sequester carbon, thus decreasing its carbon footprint. Campus trees that must be felled for safety or health issues are chipped and used as ground cover at the BAC Yard keeping that carbon offset right here on the campus too.

Perhaps the biggest success of the BAC Yard is just how much it has benefitted not just the Sac State community, but the Sacramento region as well. Compost from the yard is donated to local schools, churches, mosques, organic farms, and other institutions to help increase green programs throughout Sacramento.



What's Abuzz in the BAC Yard?

Earlier this year, Facilities Management's Sustainability Team began a new project in their esteemed BAC Yard project: beekeeping.

European honeybees to be exact. Some might wonder, what do honeybees have to do with Sac State, hornet puns aside. "Since the BAC Yard is a living laboratory for students to learn about composting, urban agriculture, and aquaponics, the bees were the perfect next addition to our sustainable system," explained Sustainability Analyst, Kristina Cullen. "The bees help to pollinate the food being grown in student gardens for the ASI Pop-Up Pantry."

Fellow Sustainability Team member, Joey Martinez, helped start the program earlier this year, after receiving help from several members of the campus community. "The first one was City Councilman Jeff Harris, who operates the beehives over at Capital Public Radio," explained Martinez. "As well as Serg Bochilo, who is a local beekeeper who has stopped by on several occasions to lend his expertise. And finally, a member of our own ABA team

from Space Management, Camellia Sahn, who has lent her guidance to us as well. In fact, I believe she'll be joining us for our bee check-up. All three of these individuals have helped me and the team learn more about beekeeping."

Bees are essential to our ecosystem "without bees, we wouldn't have much of our food," said Cullen. "When you see a bee in your yard, appreciate it. Respect it." Cullen and the rest of the Sustainability Team hope to bottle the honey extracted from the hives for eventual human consumption, either through the student pop up pantry, or sold to help sustain BAC Yard projects.

To help educate people on both the project, and the importance of honeybees, the Sustainability Team has conducted more than 20 tours, including to staff, students, and children from youth groups or the Children's Center.

So far, there are four hives on campus, located within the BAC Yard, near Highway 50. Each hive contains a queen that can lay up to 1200 eggs a day. Only females are capable of gathering pollen and nectar, and have a life span of just 30 to 45 days. 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MADE AT SAC STATE



Made at Sac State - Deneilia Pappas

In this summer edition, we feature Deneilia Pappas, scheduling coordinator within Space Management. Below, she shares her remarkable story, and history, of how she was Made at Sac State.

When did you start your academic/professional career at Sac State?

I first arrived at Sac State in the fall of 1982 as a freshman to study Computer Science. All computer labs had terminals (yikes) which connected to the mainframe housed in the old computer center in Sequoia Hall. I was active in Greek life, student council and loved attending football, baseball and softball games as well as track meets.

I have fond memories of attending speeches made by Jesse Jackson and Vice Presidential candidate Geraldine Ferraro. I was a terrible computer science student and eventually changed my major and earned a B.S. degree in Business Administration concentrating in MIS.

When did you get your first job on campus?

A few years before graduation I began working as a student assistant in the Alumni Office which was then housed in Sacramento Hall. Plans were in the works for the Alumni Center as we know it today. I helped coordinate Alumni events and endlessly tied balloons around the football stadium on game day. My primary responsibility in the Alumni Center was helping assist a newly hired computer technician implement the first software for the office. Goodbye paper records.

My next endeavor was landing an entry level staff position in the Academic Senate Office which is known today as the Faculty Senate. It was here that I was exposed to faculty governance and learned how policies and procedures are moved along the various faculty committees, to the Executive committee and then the full Senate. Senate meetings were always interesting and I enjoyed watching the interaction amongst the faculty. Many staff members don't realize that Senate meetings are open to the campus community to observe. I would recommend to anyone to attend at least one.

What was next for you?

After leaving the Senate Office I accepted a promotion in the General Education Office in Academic Affairs. The General Education Program was undergoing a major overhaul at the time. Every course under the program had to be reviewed to determine if it would meet the requirements of the new area criteria as mandated by the Chancellor's Office. This is where I would also get my first experience at organizing a large scale event. I worked with ASI, Inc. in a joint effort to bring Dr. Maya Angelou to campus.

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The year was 1995 and the Ballroom in the University Union didn't exist. Hornet Stadium wasn't anything like it is today and it was too cold to hold the event outside at night. The main gym was what we had. Protecting the floor, bringing in the stage, and the chairs in addition to the bleachers and sound system - all needed to be facilitated with outside vendors. Facilities Management provided much needed help as faculty, staff and students enjoyed the readings of the great American poet, author, and civil rights activist.

How did you stay connected to the University?

I also worked in the Community Engagement Center while working for Academic Affairs. This was a new office at the time which focused on encouraging faculty to work with the greater community and introduce a service learning component into their course curriculum. I

assisted with the implementation of an Access database which tracked faculty and community partners and their programs. During this time I also served as Vice President and President of the University Staff Assembly.

Do you have examples of working with the local community?

My next position was in the Office of Space Management. It was here when I first learned about scheduling campus and community events such as the Thanksgiving Day Run to Feed the Hungry, the Pig Bowl football game now known as Guns and Hoses, and Earth Day. I worked with long time KCRA news anchor Stan Atkinson on a station celebratory event and former Mayor Kevin Johnson for a discussion with students promoting St. Hope (Helping Others Pursue Excellence), an after school program for kids in the Oak Park neighborhood. I also worked closely with an aide in the Governor's Office when then Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger spoke to a small group of students. In addition to working on events, it was here when I first began scheduling facilities for classes and final exams. I worked on faculty office audits and was responsible for classroom furniture.

From Space Management I accepted a promotion back to Academic Affairs when the campus began to implement CMS. I was the catalog and class schedule module lead. I worked with consultants to learn PeoplesSoft on class schedule building and trained the academic departments. I was responsible for updating course and program materials both in CMS and online. During this time, Dr. Mike Lee asked if I could explore moving away from a paper university catalog. All CSU campuses were moving in this direction. A year after the implementation of CMS, the project began. With the assistance of academic departments, IRT and support staff, the first online university catalog was born.

Now I am back in the Space Management Office where I have worked for the last five years. There have been many changes; new faces and a new scheduling software but the primary function of facilities scheduling for academic classes, final exams, and campus and community events remains the same. Lecture classroom inventory, faculty office and space audits are still conducted as well as yearly lecture and instructional laboratory furniture purchases.


Final thoughts?

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

FOODIES IN ABA

In this entry of The FOCUS, we sought out some of the most skilled bakers in ABA to share their most desired dishes. Below you will find multiple recipes destined to satisfy anyone, several of which were featured in the ABA Summer Social bake-off!



Fuji Apple Delights - Don Nahhas (Cupcake Winner)

Ingredients - Cake batter

2 cups sugar
1/2 cup oil
2 eggs
4 cups diced Fuji apples
2 cups flour
2 teaspoons baking soda
1 teaspoon nutmeg
2 teaspoons cinnamon
1 tablespoon vanilla extract
1 teaspoon salt

Instructions - Cake Batter

Combine sugar, oil, vanilla, and eggs in a large bowl, stirring until well mixed.
Sift together flour, baking soda, nutmeg, cinnamon and salt, then add to bowl.
Stir in diced apples.
Stir all ingredients together to form a batter (this is a very thick batter).
Generously spray/grease two cupcake pans (makes 2-dozen)

Bake 25 minute in a 325 degree oven. Keep an eye on them around the 20 minute mark.
Poke with toothpick until it comes out clean.

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Immediately remove cupcakes from pan onto wire rack to cool.

Ingredients - Drizzle

- 2 cups confection (powdered) sugar
- 1/2 stick melted butter
- 1 tablespoon vanilla extract
- 2 to 6 tablespoons milk (add a little at a time to keep drizzle from being too thin or thick)
- pinch of salt

Instructions - Drizzle

Combine melted butter, vanilla, salt, and sugar. Mixture will be thick. Add enough milk to have a consistency that is not runny. Pour/drizzle/spread on warm cupcakes.



Carrot Cake Cupcakes with Pecan Cream Cheese Frosting

Ingredients - Cake batter

- 2 cups sifted flour
- 1 ¼ cups sugar (or less to taste)
- 2 teaspoons baking soda
- 1 ½ teaspoons cinnamon (or less to taste)
- 1 teaspoon kosher salt
- 1½ cups Wesson Oil (vegetable oil)
- 4 beaten eggs (I used organic extra-large eggs)
- 2 ½ cups grated carrots
- ½ cup of crushed pineapple (drain juice first)

Instructions - Cake Batter

Mix dry ingredients together well. Add Wesson Oil and beaten eggs. Fold in the grated carrots and pineapple. Divide batter into 24 individually lined muffin tins. Bake at 325° for 35-40 minutes or until toothpick comes out clean.

Ingredients - Frosting

- ½ cup softened butter
- 8 ounce package softened cream cheese
- 1 cup chopped pecans (toasted first to bring out flavor)
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 vanilla bean (scrape out seeds from bean)
- 1-2 cups of powdered sugar, sifted (to taste)
- Pinch of salt

Instructions - Frosting

Beat butter and cream cheese together. Add other ingredients and mix. If too thick, soften with a little half and half or milk so the frosting does not tear the cupcakes. Make sure the cupcakes are completely cooled otherwise you will have a cream cheese milkshake on your hands!

Lemon Cream Cheese Cookies

Ingredients

- ½ cup (1 stick) unsalted butter, at room temperature
- 3 ounces plain cream cheese, softened
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- zest from 1 lemon
- 1 cup all-purpose flour
- ½ teaspoon salt

Instructions

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F. In the bowl of a standing mixer fitted with the paddle attachment, cream together the butter, cream cheese and sugar until the mixture is light and fluffy, about 3 to 5 minutes. Add the lemon zest and vanilla, and mix to combine. Slowly add the flour and salt until just incorporated, then give the bowl a good scrape and the mixture a quick stir to make sure everything is mixed in.

Drop the dough into rounded tablespoons (I used a 1-inch cookie scoop) about 1 ½ inches apart on parchment-lined baking sheets. Bake for 12-14 minutes, until the edges turn a nice golden brown (Be careful not to over-bake!). Cool the cookies for a minute or so on the cookie sheet, then transfer them to a wire rack to cool completely.

Margarita Cake by Sarah David

Ingredients - Cake batter

- 1 (18.25 ounce) package yellow, white or orange cake mix
- 1 (3.4 ounce) package instant vanilla pudding mix
- 4 eggs
- ½ cup vegetable oil
- ⅔ cup water
- ¼ cup lime juice
- ¼ cup tequila
- 2 tablespoons Grand Marnier or triple sec liqueur

Ingredients - Glaze

- 1 cup confectioners' sugar
- 1 tablespoon tequila
- 2 tablespoons Grand Marnier or triple sec liqueur
- 2 tablespoons lime juice

Instructions

Preheat oven to 325 degrees F (175 degrees C). Spray Non-sticking cooking spray in pan. In a large bowl combine cake mix, pudding mix, eggs, oil, water, lime juice, ¼ cup tequila and 2 tablespoons Grand Marnier. Beat for 2 minutes. Pour batter into prepared pan. Bake in the preheated oven for 35 to 50 minutes, or until a toothpick inserted into the center of the cake comes out clean. Immediately when the cake comes out poke several holes and pour ½ a batch of glaze over cake. Cool in pan for 15 minutes; remove to plate and pour the rest of the 1st batch of glaze over cake while still warm. Once cool pour the second batch of glaze over top of cake. To make the glaze: In a small bowl, combine confectioners' sugar with 1 tablespoon tequila, 2 tablespoons Grand Marnier and 2 tablespoons lime juice. Mix until smooth.

Bakers Note: For an extra punch add a shot of tequila and 2 tbsp of Grand Marnier when cake comes out with the ½ batch of glaze.
