


About Campus



The Campus

Founded as Sacramento State College in 1947 with 235 students and five full-time faculty members, Sacramento State has been serving the region for 75 years. Now over 30,000 students strong, It is the sixth largest of the 23 campuses in the California State University (CSU) system. It is an accessible and inclusive place of learning and achievement, a hub of diverse thought and intellectual challenge, and is intertwined with the community it serves. From the research that results in impactful legislation to entrepreneurial ideas that blossom into robust businesses, Sacramento State continues to provide immersive learning experiences that benefit students, the region, and beyond. The beautiful campus is sheltered by more than 3,000 trees and dotted with flower gardens. Next to campus are more than 25 miles of trails along the American River that run from Old Sacramento to the recreation facilities at Folsom Lake. Sacramento State is the 4th most diverse campus in the Western U.S. (*U.S News & World Report*). Rich with a diversity of people and cultures, the Sacramento region is home to the hardworking, innovative, and passionate. Sacramento State is no different. It is a place where faculty, staff, and students from all backgrounds come together to teach, learn, work, and make an impact on the world.

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Distribution of Units (varies by major)

Total Units to Graduate: 120 units

Baccalaureate Degree

All baccalaureate degrees at Sacramento State requires completion of the requirements listed below. Degree requirements fall into three categories: General Education requirements; major/minor requirements; and other Graduation requirements, which are subject to catalog rights policy. These requirements are derived from Title 5 of the California Code of Regulations, action of the California State University system, and University policy.

General Education (GE)

48 units of General Education courses are required. At least nine units of General Education must be upper division.

NOTE: Students are eligible to enroll in upper division General Education when they have completed at least 45 units.

Major

Major units required vary on the major and concentration. Students must declare their major by the time they complete 60 units.

Electives (optional)

Additional courses (units) needed to meet the total units to graduate. This may include a second major, minor, or courses of interest.

Minor (optional)

A pattern of courses similar to the major, but less comprehensive. Most minors require 18-24 units.

Unit Requirements

Transferable College Units

Students can transfer a maximum of 70 units from a community college. There is no limit on transferable units from four-year institutions.


Course Numbering

Lower Division Units

Sac State courses numbered 1-99.

Upper Division Units

A minimum of 39 upper division units is required to graduate. Sacramento State upper division courses are numbered 100-199.





Majors become impacted when the number of students interested in a major exceeds the number of spaces available. Business Administration, Criminal Justice, Graphic Design, Nursing, and Psychology are impacted majors. Students not admitted into the major are considered "Expressed Interest". Students must complete all specified pre-requisites, GPA requirements and submit an impaction application to the major department. For details, speak with an advisor.

General Education & Graduation Requirements Effective Fall 2021*

Sac State students are required to complete 48 units of General Education courses from six Areas. Students complete these requirements by taking courses at Sac State, transferring credit from other colleges/universities, or by successfully completing Advanced Placement (AP) or International Baccalaureate (IB) exams. Listed below are the GE Areas and examples of courses offered.

Area A: Basic Subjects (9 Units)

- A1: Oral Communication (Introduction to Public Speaking)
- A2: Written Communication (Accelerated Academic Literacies, Academic Literacies I and II)
- A3: Critical Thinking (Argumentation, Critical Thinking)

Area B: The Physical Universe and Its Life Forms (12 Units)

- **B1: Physical Science** (Introduction to Astronomy, General Chemistry, Earth Science, Physical Geography, Physics)
- B2: Life Forms (Physical Anthropology, General Biology, Environmental Science)
- B3: Lab (one lab course from either Area B1 or Area B2)
- B4: Quantitative Reasoning (Statistics, Calculus, Logic)
- B5: Further Studies (Oceanography, Brain/Gender-Related Differences, Ancient Science)

Area C: The Arts and Humanities (12 Units)

- C1: Arts (Introduction to Theatre, Music Appreciation, and Traditional Asian Art, Dance Cultures of America, History of Rock Music, Multicultural Puppetry, Women in Art, Masterpieces of Cinema, 20th Century American Drama)
- **C2: Humanities** (French Civilization, Archaeology of Mexico, Ancient Greece, History of Philosophy, Introduction to British Literature, Ethics, Exploring World Religions, Classical Mythology, Elementary Italian)

Graduation Requirements

1. College Composition II

English 20 (or approved transferable course)

2. Writing Placement for Juniors (WPJ)

Portfolio submission of essays for review. Occurs after 60 units are completed. This is the pre-requisite to completing the Writing Intensive course.

3. Writing Intensive

(Minimum 5,000-word writing assignment required) Example: The Nature of Culture, Business Ethics & Society, Existentialism, Perspectives on Leisure.

4. Race & Ethnicity in American Society

(Comparing two or more ethnic groups in the US) Example: Multicultural America, Ethnic America, Multicultural Perspectives on American Theater, African-Caribbean Dance. Will not be fulfilled by General Education Area F: Ethnic Studies.

5. Foreign Language

(Completion of a second semester course) Example: American Sign Language, Chinese, French, German, Italian, Japanese, Korean, Spanish.

Area D: The Individual and Society (9 Units)

Minimum of two disciplines (e.g. ANTH, ECON, ETHN, GOVT, HIST, RPTA, etc.) must be taken in Area D. US History or US Constitution/CA Government can be used, but not both.

- Area D Courses (Introduction to Archaeology, Cultural Geography, Principles of Sociology, The Modern Middle East, Genocide and Holocaust Studies, Women of Color, The Fall of Communism, Bioethics)
- US History (U.S. History: 1607-1877, History of American Women, Social History of the U.S, American West)
- US Constitution and CA Government (Essentials of Government, American Political Thought, American Governments)

Area E: Understanding Personal Development (3 Units)

First Year Seminar, Human Development, Nutrition and Wellness, Human Sexuality

Area F: Ethnic Studies (3 units)

Students complete a 3-unit course in Ethnic Studies as part of their baccalaureate degree. These courses can encompass one or more of the four traditional ethnic studies groups of Native Americans, African Americans, Asian Americans and Latino and Latina Americans.

GE Exceptions for Engineering Majors

- A3 met by major
- B1, B3, B4 and B5 met by major**
- Area C English 20 or equivalent
- Any Area D 3 upper-division units met by major**
- Exempt from Foreign Language requirement
- Any Area E met by major

GE Exceptions for Computer Science Majors

- B1, B2, and B4 met by major
- Any Area D 3 units met by major (PHIL 103)
- Exempt from Foreign Language requirement

*B2 met by major - Computer Engineering and Construction Management (ENVS 10) **Construction Management majors consult with your orientation leader regarding Area D.

6. American Institutions

Requires a US History course as well as a US Constitution and California Government course.

7. Residence Units

Students must complete at least 30 units at Sac State, with a minimum of 24 of these units being upper division. At least nine of these units must be from General Education courses.

*The General Education pattern is determined by a students catalog rights. All First-Year students will have Fall 2023 catalog rights. Students who are transferring from another institution may have a different General Education pattern dependent on catalog rights.

Major Department/Student Success Center – Each major department has faculty and/or advisors to assist students with program expectations and course sequencing. In addition, each College has a Student Success Center dedicated to advising.

Undeclared Advising – The Career Center provides individual career counseling and support, workshops, and online resources to engage students in exploring skills, interests and values, identifying career options and challenges to accomplishing their goals. Students must declare a major before they complete 60 units.

First-Year Advising

All first-year students are required to meet with an advisor during their first two semesters as advising is critical to academic success and persistence. Academic advisors and peer mentors meet with first-year students each semester to discuss course selection, study tips, resources for students, and academic planning.

Mathematics Tutoring Lab (The Math Lab)

The Math Lab is a tutoring center that assists students enrolled in lower division mathematics and statistics courses. Students may use this facility on a drop-in basis at no cost. Tutors provide assistance with course related problems encountered in homework assignments and in preparation for examinations.

Peer and Academic Resource Center (PARC)

PARC is a centralized location of support for student success through peer-led services. PARC provides academic support services including one unit supplemental instruction courses for challenging General Education classes (such as Biology, Chemistry, Economics, History, Criminal Justice, Psychology, Computer Science, and Political Science). In addition, Peer Mentors provide academic review and test preparation sessions, advising and individual and group drop-in tutoring sessions.

Reading and Writing Center (RWC) Calaveras Hall, 128 (916) 278-6356

The RWC is a place for all students to get help with reading and writing for any course or project. Trained undergraduate and graduate student tutors emphasize nonjudgmental and encouraging feedback, including helping writers generate ideas, identify a focus for a paper, refine organization, cite sources, clarify language, and improve proofreading and editing strategies. The RWC also provides help for students who are preparing to take the Writing Placement for Juniors (WPJ).

HANDSHAKE

Handshake is a free job-search portal for Sac State students and is a terrific resource for on-campus jobs. Most campus departments advertise student positions (including work study) via Handshake. Access to Handshake can be found through your student portal under "Student Related Links".

UNIVERSITY ENTERPRISES, INC.

University Enterprises, Inc. (UEI) is a Sac State non-profit auxiliary organization that promotes student employment position on campus (The University Union, The WELL, Campus Dining). ASSOCIATED STUDENTS, INC.

Associated Students, Inc. (ASI) is a \$7 million nonprofit corporation and serves as the student government at Sac State. ASI operates a variety of programs, many of which hire students. Grade Point Average (GPA)

Term GPA: Based on the grades earned in a specific semester.

Sac State GPA: Based on all college courses taken at Sac State.

Overall GPA: Based on all college level courses taken, including previous colleges/universities attended.

Dean's Honor List: Compiled each semester and requires 12 units of graded coursework and a minimum 3.0 GPA for freshmen and 3.25 GPA for all other undergraduates.

Graduating with Honors: Honors at graduation are awarded based only on Sacramento State coursework grade point average. Cum Laude: 3.50-3.74; Magna Cum Laude: 3.75–3.89; Summa Cum Laude: 3.90-4.00.

Academic Status

Good Standing: Students with Sac State and cumulative grade point averages (GPA) of 2.00 or above are considered in good academic standing.

Academic Probation: Students are placed on Academic Probation of their Sac State GPA or Cumulative GPA is below a 2.0.

Grading Policies

"W" grade: Issued when a student officially drops a class after the fourth week or withdraws from all courses. It does not affect the GPA. Students are permitted up to 18 units of W grades.

"WU" grade: Issued when a student stops attending a class without properly dropping the course. "WU" computes in the GPA as 0 points, like an "F" grade.

"I" grade: May be arranged at the end of the semester if a student has coursework remaining to complete a class. Students must work with instructor to arrange completing remaining work. The "I" grade will convert to an "F" if not completed within one year of the terms of the contract.

Repeating Courses: Students may not repeat courses in which a grade of "C" or higher was previously earned. If a course is repeated, the original grade will not be calculated in the GPA, but both attempts will remain on the transcript. Courses can be repeated no more than two times. A maximum of 16 units can be repeated for grade forgiveness.

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 (FERPA)

FERPA is a federal law regarding the privacy of student records and the obligations of the institution, primarily in the areas of release of the records and the access provided to these records. Education records include academic, financial, health and student conduct records.

This information is protected under FERPA, and parents may not have access unless the student has provided written authorization that specifically identifies what information may be released to the parent(s).

A student's education records may be released to parents or guardians only if they have been given a written release by the student, in compliance with a subpoena, or by having the parent submit a completed "Certification of Financial Dependency" form along with supporting documentation.

In addition to taking courses during the fall and spring semesters, students can enroll during other academic periods. Sac State's College of Continuing Education oversees the Summer and Winter Sessions.

SUMMER SESSION

Sacramento State offers classes over the summer. Students can choose courses offered during two, 6-week sessions or for one 12-week session. Registration takes place in April.

WINTER INTERSESSION

During the month of January, Sac State offers a 3-week winter intersession. Courses typically start right after the New Year holiday. Registration takes place in November.

- U When your student completes 85 units, they can submit their graduation application.
- Students can access their graduation application by logging into their Student Center via the KEYS to Degree Toolbox menu and click on the Application for Graduation icon.
- □ Graduation applications have deadlines: Students completing their degree in Fall submit their application by February 1. Students completing their degree in Spring/Summer submit their application by October 1.

- Grad Fest takes place in the spring. This is a good time for students to purchase their cap and gown, join the Alumni Association, and order graduation announcements.
- □ All students must RSVP for their Commencement ceremony.
- Students must order tickets for guests who want to attend Commencement. Seating is limited.
- □ Commencement takes place in May.

POST GRADUATION

- □ Check the Student Center for any outstanding holds or fees (ex: parking tickets, late library books... etc.). All holds and fees must be cleared before their diploma is ordered.
- Your student will receive a Sac State email notification that their degree has been confirmed.
- □ When the degree is confirmed, a diploma will be ordered and mailed to your student. Diplomas are NOT forwarded so it is important that your student has an accurate mailing address on their Student Center.

The CSU makes every effort to keep student costs to a minimum. Fees listed may need to be increased when public funding is inadequate. Therefore, CSU

must reserve the right, even after initial fee payments are made, to increase any listed fees, without notice, until the date when instruction for a particular semester has begun.

DUE DATE: Due dates are based on the student's registration period.

- New Fall 2023 students attending Orientation in June: Tuition due mid-July.
- New Fall 2023 students attending Orientation in July and August: Tuition due mid-August.
- New Spring 2024 students registering in January: Tuition due mid-January.
- Students will see due dates and amounts on their account the day after registering. From the Student Center, under the Finances section, select Account Inquiry.
- If payment is not made by the due date, student may incur late fees (up to \$25) or be dropped from their classes. If courses are dropped after instruction has begun, students will be responsible for pro-rated fees.

FINANCIAL AID APPLICANTS: You may be eligible for a deferment – official permission to pay at a later date.



With 1.4 million volumes, 300 computers, 200 databases and over 40,000 journals accessible 24/7 online, students will find the OneSearch system provides more scholarly search results than you'll find in Google. The Library has a place for your student, whether they prefer the 4th floor Quiet Study or the Group Study areas. The Ask Find Use Desk has course reserve materials and free laptop check-out.

Health Services

Sac State is an award-winning healthy campus and hosts a state-ofthe-art expanded facility which provides integrated counseling, medical, and wellness services to students located inside The WELL. Student Health and Counseling Services (SHCS) includes a walk-in urgent care clinic, primary care medical clinic, X-ray services, nutrition counseling, athletic training, and a pharmacy for prescription, homeopathic and over-the-counter medications. Medication disposal is available at the pharmacy. SHCS staff includes licensed and board-certified providers and mental health clinicians who work collaboratively across disciplines to provide top-quality holistic care.

The Sacramento State Police Department is the primary respondent for campus emergencies and reports of criminal activity on campus. Our police officers are fully certified. They are responsible for a wide range of activities, including public safety, documenting crime and accidents, criminal investigation/prosecution, traffic enforcement, opening locked vehicles, providing jumper cables, free bicycle registration, crime prevention information, fire/medical aid, special event security, and many other services.

Notification of Criminal Activity

The Sacramento State Police Department maintains a daily media log that is available for review by the general public. The Department also uses e-mail, voice mail, and distribution of materials when potentially hazardous situations exist that impact the University community.

Night Shuttle/Escort Service

The Night Shuttle Service operates on campus Monday through Thursday, from dusk to 11 p.m. The Night Shuttle can be reached by dialing (916) 278-7260.

In the event of other unsafe situations outside of those hours, University Police are available by dialing 8-6000 from any campus phone or (916) 278-6000.

Hate Crimes and Hate Incidents

A hate crime is any criminal act or attempted criminal act including physical intimidation, physical harassment, physical force or physical violence directed against a person(s), public agency or private institution based on the victim's actual or perceived race, nationality, religious or political beliefs, sexual orientation, disability or gender. The University and the Sacramento State Police Department will not tolerate hate violence and is dedicated to ensuring all persons are protected.

Emergency Phones

There are 266 blue emergency phones located across campus. When a phone is picked up, users will be immediately connected to a dispatcher at the Sacramento State Police Department.

University Alcohol and Drug Policy

On-campus use of alcohol is limited to certain approved events and locations covered by the guidelines of California State University, Sacramento.

The University recognizes alcohol/drug dependency as an illness and a major health problem. Information, assessment, and referral services for alcohol or drug-related problems are available on campus. Services for students are available at the Student Health and Counseling Services.

ASI Safe Rides

Safe Rides's goal is to help reduce DUI incidents and encourage safe transportation by providing students financial reimbursement for rideshare trips. Now that you have a student at Sacramento State, you will likely have questions about campus programs, opportunities and how you can support them as they pursue their degree. Here are a few common questions and answers.

PAYING FOR COLLEGE & FINANCIAL WELLNESS Q: Do students need to fill out the FAFSA every year?

A: Yes, students must fill out a FAFSA and apply for financial aid every year. The FAFSA filing period begins each year on October 1st and ends March 2nd. There are many important deadlines related to financial aid, so it is important that students check My Sac State on a regular basis for any messages from Sac State.

ACADEMICS

Q: How can I find out my student's grades?

A: Sac State does not mail or email student grades. Students check their grades via MySacState. Parents should be aware that federal law (the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974) limits the student information that the University can share—that means we cannot tell you your student's grades. Parents and family members are encouraged to talk with students about academic performance, progress and coursework on an ongoing basis.

Q: How can my student get help choosing a major?

A: The Career Center is a great place for students to begin the process of exploring careers and choosing a major. They are also encouraged to speak with professors and staff members who are professionals in their field of interest. Another way for students to explore majors is to read the Sac State Catalog and look at the majors requirements and courses. That may spark some interest.

Q: Where can my student to go get advice related to career opportunities in their major?

A: There are a variety of career related services and events sponsored by the Career Center. Career counselors can assist with interview techniques, writing cover letters and resumes, and job search strategies. Regional and national companies participate in seminars, career fairs and on-campus interviews to recruit students for internships and full-time positions after graduation. In addition, students should check with their major department regarding internship and research opportunities.

CAMPUS JOBS

Q: My student wants to work on campus while attending Sac State. Where should they look?

A: Most campus jobs (including Federal Work Study positions) are listed on Handshake, which can be found on your student's MySacState. Your student will need to create an account and then they will have access to search the campus jobs.

There are additional campus departments that post student positions on their websites. These departments include: Associated Students, Inc., University Enterprises, Inc., and The Hornet Bookstore.

GETTING INVOLVED

- Q: Where can my student get involved and make friends? Where should they start?
- A: With over 200 clubs on campus, there are plenty of opportunities for students to meet other students and get involved. Student Organizations & Leadership (SO&L) in the University Union is an excellent place to get a list of clubs and organizations. In addition to SO&L, there are always many activities happening on campus including performance groups, cultural organizations, community service, the student newspaper, and much more.

HEALTH AND EMOTIONAL WELL BEING

Q: My child already has health insurance. Do they still need to pay a health service fee?

A: Yes. Student Health & Counseling Services (SHCS) fee is a mandatory fee that provides services to all enrolled students. SHCS offers convenient, affordable, accessible care without copays or deductibles. SHCS embraces a holistic and collaborative approach to healthcare offering urgent care, primary care, preventive services, wellness education, violence support services mental health and counseling services and is accredited through the Accreditation Association for Ambulatory Health Care Inc. (AAAHC).

Q: Does Sac State offer counseling for students to talk about personal issues?

A: Students can talk with a counselor at no additional cost at the Student Health & Counseling Center (SHCS) through Counseling and Psychological Services (CAPS), located in The WELL. Staff can assist or provide referrals for students struggling with stress or other personal problems.
