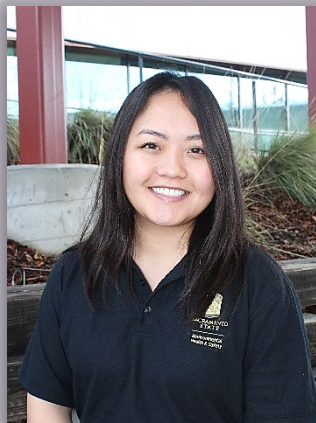
## What's Happening Around Campus:

Thank you, Meysee, for 7 years of dedication, teamwork, and helping keep Sacramento State safe—one inspection, training, and hazard-free day at a time!

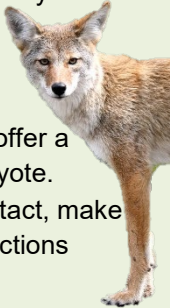


## Wild Animals Safety Tips

Coyotes occasionally come onto campus because it is adjacent to their natural habitat along the American River. It is important to emphasize that coyotes are wild animals.

As such, please heed the following should you see coyotes on campus:

- Do not approach a coyote.
- Do not try to take selfies with a coyote.
- Do not try to "befriend" coyotes with food, offer a coyote food by hand, or throw food at a coyote.
- If a coyote approaches you, make eye contact, make loud noises, and wave your arms. These actions should make the coyote retreat.
- Do not run from a coyote, back away slowly.
- Do not chase a coyote.
- If you have a small dog and you see a coyote nearby, pick up your dog and retreat slowly towards an area where there are groups of people.



Observations of a coyote on campus can be reported to the Sacramento State Safety hotline at 916-278-2020. These calls will be used for tracking purposes only.

In the very rare occurrence, if anyone or a service animal is attacked or injured by a coyote on campus, immediately call campus police at 916-278-6000.
