#### **U-Nite celebrates 10th birthday** Founders honored with Community Service Award

-Nite, the College of Arts and Letters' collaboration with the Crocker Art Museum, brings the best of Sac State's art and education into the Sacramento community.

Founded 10 years ago by Dr. Elaine Gale, Communication Studies professor, U-Nite is a tremendous bridge between the university and the public. A showcase of faculty and student talent, it is a one-of-akind, interactive evening that involves hundreds of faculty, staff, students, and community members.

"I created U-Nite in 2011 from a dream," Gale said. "I'm happy U-Nite is still going strong, and I'm just delighted at all the new connections and the relationships that I've made through the event."

In fact, two of those relationships would help keep U-Nite going over the years. "I co-coordinated it with **Lorelei**

**Bayne** [Professor of Theater and Dance] from 2013-2015. Then **Michele Foss-Snowden** [Professor of Communication Studies] and Lorelei co-coordinated in 2016, and we moved it to the fall to be in line with the Art-Ober initiative at the time."

In honor of their ongoing service and collaboration, Gale, Bayne, and Foss-Snowden were awarded the Outstanding Community Service Award by the Sac State Faculty Senate. They will receive the award at a ceremony in early March.

"This project was always about love, about creating community, celebrating creativity, and about a deep love for the arts," Gale added. "My colleagues enjoy it. The community enjoys it. It touches my heart."

After two virtual years during the pandemic, the 2022 event brought almost 1,000 people to the Crocker, the first time U-Nite has been in person since 2019.

## Communication Studies senior nabs University's highest student honor

ommunication Studies senior Kenva Burton was awarded the 2022 Trustees' Award for Outstanding Achievement in the fall. The award-given to one student at each California State University campus each year-recognizes superior achievement in academic performance, community service, personal accomplishments, and future goals. The award also comes with a substantial scholarship. Burton is the Chancellor Emeritus Charles B and Catherine Reed Scholar, and received a \$12,000 scholarship to finish her education

"As a little girl, I always dreamed of going to college but growing up in poverty and in a singleparent home meant college was not a guarantee," Burton reflected. "Where I come from, it is a privilege that many do not get to experience. The Trustee award means I will be one of the first people in my family to go to college. I can concentrate fully on my studies and aspirations. It means that the little girl gets to graduate like she always dreamed and access opportunities we never thought we would have."

Burton is active in the Sac State community and in her hometown of Salinas, California. On campus, she is a member of Phi Theta Kappa and president of Alliance for Black Thought, which supports students of color. At home, she works in community service and activism, including on Monterey County's Domestic Violence Coordinating Council.

"Kenya was in my organizational communication

senior seminar last semester and blew me away with her contributions to the class." said associate professor Shawna Malvini Redden. "She showed up ready to dig into the material, which asks students to bring a critical lens to understanding organizing. Every class period, she not only critiqued problematic organizational processes-and encouraged her classmates to do the same-she pushed us to develop practical communication solutions that were empathetic and focused on cultivating equity and well-being."

"And besides regularly demonstrating brilliance, Kenya was a kind, conscientious, and humble member of class. In fact, I had a good chuckle when she apologized for missing class midsemester to attend 'an awards thing' in Southern California," Malvini Redden added. "And then I read in one of the President's messages that the 'awards thing' was actually the highest student honor in our university system!"

In a feature story about Burton, Sac State President **Robert S. Nelsen** said, "Kenya truly embodies the Hornet spirit, and I am proud she is part of the Hornet Family. I can't wait to see what else she will accomplish."

In addition to exemplary academics, Burton is an artist and poet, and was actually named as Salinas Youth Poet Laureate. After graduating, she plans to pursue a master's degree in Organizational Communication in support of her goal to continue nonprofit work in Monterey County.

"I want to make a difference in any way I can," Burton said. "Currently, I help local nonprofits find their voices through communications and share their work with those in need. My goal is to one day work with my family to open a nonprofit organization to help families escaping domestic violence find resources and transitional housing. As a survivor. I want to help children in the same situation I was once in. Hopefully, I open a door for another little girl and show her that anything is possible!"

■ Dr. Cheng Hong, assistant professor, recently published to first-authored articles: the "Spiral of silence or social loafing? A parallel mechanism to explain why people defend their stances on controversial sociopolitical issues" in the International Journal of Communication, and "When transparent leadership communication motivates employee advocacy: Testing the mediator roles of employee attributions in CEO activism," in Public Relations Review.

In addition, she co-authored with Dr. Jiangmeng Liu from Seattle University and Dr. Bora Yook from Fairfield University, and published the article "CEO as 'Chief Crisis Officer' under COVID-19: A content analysis of CEO open letters using structural topic modeling," in the International Journal of Strategic Communication. She also co-authored with Dr. Grace Ji from Boston University and published the article, "Engaging Employees in CEO Activism: The Role of Transparent Leadership Communication in Making a Social Impact" in the Journal of Mass Communication and Society. University Strategic Investment Grant in the amount of \$5,000 as the Principal Investigator in 2022. The grant allowed Dr. Hong to start an internship program to connect students with female founders to learn about brand communication.

■ Dr. Shawna Malvini Redden, associate professor, planned the Organizational Communication Division program for the National Communication Association convention in New Orleans, LA, in her role as vice chair of the division. During the conference, in which she co-facilitated a preconference and coled the division business meeting, she assumed the role of division chair. ■ Dr. Fred Molitor, lecturer, published the article "Unemployment, SNAP enrollment, and food insecurity before and after California's COVID-19 shutdown" with colleagues Dr. Celeste Doerr, chief of the Adolescent Program Evaluation and Data Unit at the California Department of Public Health and Sarah Kehl, MPH, California Department of Social Services, in the Journal of Nutrition Education and Behavior. He also published "COVID-19 Benefits and Dietary Behaviors among Mothers from Low-Income, Food Insecure Households" in the same journal.

■ Dr. Kiko Omori, associate professor, published an article in the Journal of Comparative and International Higher Education titled, "Acculturation and social media: How do international students engage with Facebook while abroad?" The study was coauthored with Michael Schwartz, director of the Intensive English Center and associate professor at St. Cloud University. It followed 15 international students' Facebook walls during their first and second semester in the U.S. to investigate how they use social media while in the U.S.

Dr. Omori also published "When age and race/ ethnicity salience meet: Group salience and its association with communicative behavior, and intergenerational communication satisfaction among Japanese Americans" in the Journal of Intercultural Communication Research. Her coauthors were **Rachel Keiko Stark**, health sciences librarian at Sac State, and Dr. **Hiroshi Ota**, professor and chair of the Global Culture and Communication department at Aichi Shukutoku University. Using Communication

Accommodation Theory as a theoretical framework, this study investigated the role of group salience when young and middle-aged Japanese Americans communicate with older Japanese Americans.

In May, Dr. Omori teamed up with Dr. **Carmen Stitt**, professor, to present research at the International Communication Association conference in Paris, France. Their paper, "COVID-19 and the Anti-Asian racism in the U. S. through the lens of the scapegoat and social attribution theory" investigated the use of China-related names for COVID-19 and relationships with COVID-19 information sources. Omori and Stitt analyzed endorsements of China/Asian-related conspiracy theories using scapegoat and social attribution theories as theoretical frameworks.

Dr. Nate Woo, assistant professor, published "Preferred Communication Strategies Used by Physical Therapists in Chronic Pain Rehabilitation: A Qualitative Systematic Review and Meta-Synthesis" in the Physical Therapy and Rehabilitation Journal. With co-authors Chelsea R. Chapman, doctoral student at San Diego State University and University of California, San Diego, and Dr. Katrina Maluf, professor of physical therapy at San Diego State University, Woo proposed an evidence-based conceptual framework for preferred communication behaviors for pain management clinicians.

Woo also published an entry in the International Encyclopedia of Health Communication titled "Psychophysiological Measurement" with Professor **Kory Floyd** from Arizona State University.

# Author alum launches inaugural award for undergraduate research

hen she's not volunteering, writing, or authoring children's books, Veronica Perry Wilson (BA '16 Communication Studies) dreams about research specifically, how to use research to make the world a healthier, more resilient place. And there's nothing Wilson would like more than to instill that research excitement in others.

"I am so passionate about communication research, especially with regard to mental health and positive youth development," Wilson said.

At Sac State, Wilson studied interpersonal communication and participated in debate, learning how to craft arguments as well as develop healthy relationships with others.

After graduating from Sac State, she completed her Master's degree at University of Southern California in Communication Management. While at USC, she earned the Finnie Endowment for mental health research and was awarded the Order of Arête, the highest honor for graduate students, in 2020.

"After I left Sac State, I noticed that there is no formal award for independent research for Communication Studies students," Wilson said. "And I

really wanted to change that and give back."

Wilson approached the Communication Studies department about creating a research award that was aimed at undergraduates, to recognize and honor exemplary undergraduate research in the field of Communication Studies. And Wilson was adament that the award come with cash. The winner of the Wilson

Communication Research Award will receive \$500.

In Fall 2022, Wilson started a doctoral program in the Department of Communication at University of California Santa Barbara, where she is studying wellbeing and mental health.

### **TOPSS students on top academically**

Normality of the project at Sacramento State (TOPSS) is showing strong success. TOPSS is Sac State's BA program inside Folsom and Mule Creek state prisons. Participation is growing, jumping from 11 students in 2021 to 36 in 2022. In Spring 2022, nearly 93% of TOPSS students made the Dean's List.

TOPSS is the largest and most complex prison BA in California, and has been an early site of the Second Chance Pell experiment. TOPSS students were the first in the state prison system to use laptop computers, to utilize Canvas for classes, and to access a corrections-friendly EBSCO portal.

In November, TOPSS Director and Communication Studies professor **Dave Zuckerman** and Criminal Justice faculty member **Christine Morse Fitch** invited colleagues from Project Rebound— Sac State's program to support formerly incarcerated students as well as representatives from Folsom State Prison, to participate in a panel at the National Conference on Higher Education in Prison, the largest conference on prison education.

The TOPSS program is also getting regional and national recognition. In fall Zuckerman was interviewed by Open Campus, the Chronicle of Higher Education, and the California Attorney General's office. Zuckerman said, "TOPSS will continue to lead nationwide as our two prisons—now included in our university's WASC accreditation as Sac State sites—will increase in size from the current enrollment of 36 to approximately 120 students in Fall 2023."

# Rising Star uses communication know-how to propel law career and win alumni award



Class of 2013, received the Rising Star Award at the 2022 Distinguished Alumni Awards. The Rising Star Award is given to a graduate who received their first Sacramento State degree within the last 10 years and has made outstanding contributions professionally, to the community, or to Sacramento State.

In the nearly 10 years since she graduated from Sacramento State, Amadi has made important strides as an attorney and champion for women's empowerment. She graduated magna cum laude from Thomas Jefferson School of Law in San Diego in 2017. During law school, she served as the first Black female Editor-in-Chief for the Law Review and on the first Law Review managing board in California comprised of Black women.

In 2019, while working as a corporate lawyer, she founded Tryb, a networking community for Black women entrepreneurs and professionals focused on wealth and wellness. In 2021, she founded Anasa Law Firm, which focuses on helping small business owners understand the value of law to help them make informed business decisions. She also teaches legal essentials for business owners online, and speaks about motherhood and entrepreneurship.

One former professor is not at all surprised by Amadi's legal success. John Gilgun, instructor for her 2009 freshman argumentation class, remembers an assertive, exceptional student. "Liku would do whatever was necessary to achieve the best grade possible," Gilgun said, describing how she considered and incorporated feedback to nail her first debate. "As a bonus, she accomplished this high achievement with uncommon poise and professionalism. As a freshman."

"Liku has not only been an unequivocal professional success, she's also contributed significantly to my beliefs that patience and understanding are critical to all my students' successes," Gilgun added. "She inspires me now as she did over a decade ago."

## COMS faculty member finishes squishy California International Marathon

hile many Comm Studies faculty were focusing on the end of fall semester, **Chris Maben** was lacing up his sneakers to join 10,000 other runners for the 39th California International Marathon (CIM).

"On December 4, I ran/jogged/walked and completed my first—and almost certainly last marathon," Maben joked. "Sometime around noon, as I was passing in front of the J street entrance to Sac State, the thunder roared and rain started pouring down. Clearly it was a sign, though of what I am not sure."

During the weekend, Sacramento saw almost 2 inches of rain—including a deluge during the latter hours of the marathon.

"I am so grateful to my friends and family," Maben said, conspicuously not mentioning the sister who roped him into the marathon. "For the sake of this newsletter, let me mention a few friends/colleagues who offered their support along the way: To Dr. **Shawna Malvini Redden** and Professor **Pam Sanger**, thank you. Neither of you mocked me when I first told you I was going to undertake this 26.2 mile journey, though clearly it was a ridiculous idea."

According to race organizers, runners from all 50 states and 37 countries participated in the 2022 CIM, which was the fifth largest marathon in the nation, after New York, Chicago, Boston, and Los

He also takes the stairs to Mendocino's fifth floor more often than not.



"And thank you Professor Sanger (and your husband Tom) for providing a place to stay in Folsom the night before the race and a 5 a.m. ride to the starting line," Maben

continued. The marathon started at 7 a.m. near Folsom Dam and continued 26.2 miles, past Sac State and to the State Capitol.

"To Dr. Jacqueline Irwin, who came out in the rain and cheered me on as I slowly meandered my way down Fair Oaks and again as I entered downtown," Maben added. "I was so exhausted by mile 24, that I broke down in tears when I saw Dr. J, and gave her a very sweaty hug."

Maben routinely runs in Sac State-sponsored events, including the annual Thanksgiving Run to the Feed The Hungry and the Sac State 5k Fun Run each spring.

### Modular virtual reality film wins awards

r. Diego Bonilla, professor, directed and programmed a modular virtual reality project titled Uku Pacha that has completed a year of film festival participation. Uku Pacha won three awards for Best Virtual Reality Film, received two honorable mentions, and became an official selection in 16 more festivals in different countries. Dr. Bonilla's modular filmmaking involves creating a computer program that generates multiple versions of a film, in this case a virtual reality film, based on the story and the preferences of the viewer.

Dr. Bonilla describes the synopsis: "In an old van crossing the Andes, three unknown passengers share a secret. A person has committed suicide, the victim of false news spread on social media, and someone blames them for it. You are the fourth passenger and witness of their journey through the Uku Pacha seeking to return to the natural order, the order of the Andean worldview. Each trip is a different story, a recurring dream where events never happen in the same way or in the same order: an opportunity for salvation or condemnation."

Uku Pacha was produced by the Universidad de Cuenca and shot in the Jubones desert, Ecuador, in July 2019. The production team involved faculty, artists and students from Ecuador, Mexico, Spain and the United States collaborating online.

To watch the VR film on a personal device, use headphones and open https://www.youtube.com/ embed/PHw6R2rYOMI on the YouTube app. Move the phone around as you watch the story, you will experience a 360 environment as if you were there, shooting the film. To watch an 8K immersive film on a virtual reality headset, use the same link on the headset's YouTube app or look for Uku Pacha on Oculus TV.
