## **History Department Finally Has a Home**

After years of borrowed conference rooms and hallway conversations, the History Department now has a space to call its own. The Peter H. Shattuck Green and Gold Room was formally dedicated on Monday, August 11th, creating what Mrs. Elisabeth Shattuck envisioned as "a place for students to gather."

The dedication ceremony in Library 65 brought together faculty, students, and university leadership to honor both Peter Shattuck's legacy and his widow's remarkable generosity. The formal program included opening remarks by Dr. Jeff Wilson, Chair of the Department of History, followed by a land acknowledgment from Dr. Mark Wheeler, Senior Advisor to the President.

Mr. Ajamu Lamumba, Advisor for the UNIQUE Program, delivered a dedication poem, while Dr. Antonio T. Bly, the Shattuck Endowed Chair in Colonial American History, offered the formal dedication, highlighting Peter H. Shattuck's work as a History Professor and mentor at Sac State. Amy Davey, Vice-President of the History Club and Shattuck Research Assistant, gave a student presentation before President Wood delivered closing remarks. Mrs. Shattuck and her son Art joined the ceremony, which concluded with a reception.

#### A Room That Reflects Its Namesake

The colonial-style meeting room pays tribute to Peter Shattuck's work. The furnishings and design echo the period he spent his career studying and teaching about. For faculty who remember Peter, the space feels like a natural extension of his scholarly presence.

History instruction was Peter's life work, and his impact on students extended far beyond graduation. The Shattuck family have supported the department for years through multiple scholarships, but this room represents something different. It addresses a practical need the department has faced for decades: a dedicated space for faculty meetings, student gatherings, study sessions, and small classes.

#### Years in the Making

Dr. Bly led the effort to make the room a reality, with assistance from Dr. Wilson and crucial support from the President's office. Dr. Wood's personal attention to the project helped navigate the complex logistics of creating new academic space on campus.

But the driving force was Mrs. Shattuck's vision of giving history students what other departments take for granted: a home base. Her funding made the entire project possible, from renovations to furnishings that match the room's early American theme.

#### **More Than Just Meeting Space**

The Peter H. Shattuck Room serves multiple functions. Faculty can hold department meetings without hunting for available conference rooms. Students have a dedicated place to meet for study groups or informal discussions about their coursework. The space also works as a small classroom for seminars and specialized courses.

Most importantly, it gives the History Department something it has long needed: a physical identity on campus. Students and faculty now have a place that belongs specifically to them, where the department's intellectual community can gather and grow.

The dedication ceremony captured the warmth Mrs. Shattuck hoped to create. As faculty and students mingled in the new space, it was clear the room had already begun serving its intended purpose: bringing people together around their shared love of history.

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## Faculty Spotlight - Where In the World Are the History Professors?

#### Dr. Nikolaos Lazaridis

From the ruins of Pompeii to the lecture halls of Rome, Dr. Nikolaos Lazaridis's summer blended hands-on teaching with international scholarship. He co-led a study abroad program to Italy with Professor Alba Boyer and Dr. Viola Ardeni from the Department of World Languages and Literatures, guiding students through iconic sites such as the Roman Forum and the museums of Rome, Naples, and Sorrento. The program was a resounding success, with plans already underway for next spring.

Immediately after, Dr. Lazaridis delivered a public lecture at La Sapienza University in Rome on his epigraphic fieldwork in Egypt's Western Desert. In June, he presented at the Women's Perspectives in the Nile Valley conference at the University of Warsaw, sharing his latest research on gender dynamics in ancient Egyptian storytelling.

#### Dr. Aaron Jackson

Who decides which veterans are "deserving" of government care? Why does the nation's largest fully subsidized healthcare network still leave gaps that thousands fall through? And how have shifting cultural and medical views redefined what it means to be "mad" in America? This summer, Sacramento State alumnus Dr. Aaron Jackson is chasing those answers as he advances his forthcoming book on the U.S. veterans' healthcare system. Between research sessions, he's teaching HIST 174B, The History of "Madness" in the United States, and gearing up for a fall semester that will take him from campus lecture halls to honors courses inside Folsom State Prison through the Transforming Outcomes Project at Sacramento State.

#### Dr. Michael Vann

Six weeks in Central Java. One mandi. No English. This summer, the very tall Dr. Michael Vann represented Sacramento State on a prestigious Fulbright-Hays award for advanced Bahasa Indonesia language training at Universitas Kristen Satya Wacana in Salatiga. The program included living with a three-generation family who spoke only Indonesian and shared a single bucket-style toilet and shower.

"It was the most challenging thing I have done since grad school 30 years ago," Dr. Vann said. As the oldest participant in a group made up mostly of undergraduates and master's students, he brought decades of historical expertise to the experience while strengthening the department's commitment to international engagement and language learning. The result was better Indonesian, unforgettable cultural insights, and another step forward in expanding the department's global connections for students and faculty alike.

## History, Law, and Social Justice Concentration Now Open

How did the Fourteenth Amendment's original meaning shape today's immigration debates? Why do labor organizing strategies from the 1930s still influence modern workplace advocacy? The department's new History, Law, and Social Justice concentration teaches students to trace these connections between past and present.

#### **What's Different**

This is not just another pre-law track. The concentration treats history as a tool for understanding how legal systems actually work in practice. Students examine founding documents alongside civil rights cases, study labor movements next to immigration patterns, trace how past advocacy strategies shape current policy debates.

Core courses include:

- Founding Documents and Their Legacy
- Civil Rights Movement: Strategy and Impact
- American Legal History
- Labor History and Workers' Rights

Electives include African-American History, Mexican-American History, and comparative social movements. Students pick courses that match where they're headed, whether that's law school, policy work, or advocacy organizations.

#### Real Skills, Real Opportunities

The program emphasizes the skills that actually matter in legal and policy careers: research that holds up under scrutiny, writing that persuades skeptical audiences, analysis

that cuts through political rhetoric. Students get one-on-one advising to map internships and connect with practicing professionals.

#### Launch Event: Echoes of Justice

The concentration launches with a panel that shows exactly what we mean by applied historical thinking: Echoes of Justice: How History Shapes Today's Legal Struggles.

## Preserving the Past, Inspiring the Future: Keeley O'Farrell's Remarkable Year

Keeley O'Farrell's first year as a Sacramento State alumna has been anything but quiet. In just a matter of months, she graduated in fall 2024 with a History degree, received the Dean's Award, presented her research at the Phi Alpha Theta conference in April 2025, and returned to campus that spring to deliver a commencement address. It was a full-circle moment that reflected both her achievements and her deep commitment to the field she loves.

O'Farrell describes herself as a "total archive nerd," and those who have worked with her would agree. Tenacious, goal-driven, and unafraid of challenges, she made her mark as an officer in the History Club, approaching every project with focus and initiative. Along the way, she discovered a passion for archival work, the kind of careful, behind-the-scenes preservation that she says will always guide her career.

For O'Farrell, success is something she shares with others. "None of this would have been possible without my grandfather," she explained, speaking about the man whose influence shaped her life and whose recent passing made her accomplishments especially meaningful. She also credits Sacramento State faculty for helping her see possibilities she had not imagined when she first arrived on campus.

Now pursuing her master's in Library and Information Science at San Jose State University, O'Farrell continues to work toward the same goal she set on her first day at Sac State: to preserve the past so others can learn from it

Public History grad student Allison Isham talks about her work with a mix of excitement and purpose. It is clear she has thought deeply about why history matters and where she wants it to take her. A Sacramento State alum, Allison earned her BA in History in spring 2024. Not one to sit on the sidelines, she stepped into graduate school ready to lead, serving as president of the History Club in her first year.
