The **Sacramento Saturday Club** was organized on December 9, 1893. It is the oldest musical organization in Sacramento – and one of the oldest west of the Rockies.

When established in 1893, the Sacramento Saturday Club's fundamental mission was to promote and sustain the Sacramento area's need and love for the greatest of the arts — music. It does this by providing monthly concert performances in member's homes and supporting developing young musicians.

The Sacramento Saturday Club raises and awards scholarship money to the area's talented music students, both instrumental and vocal, with the goal of furthering their musical careers. It also provides ample opportunities for its members to meet fellow lovers of music, listeners and performers alike, on a social level.

Annual scholarships for promising young musicians are given by the club to students of California State University, Sacramento as well as other area schools. Tonight's recital features the most recent winners of those scholarships.

Dr. John Cozza is in demand throughout California as teacher, coach/accompanist, chamber musician, adjudicator and clinician. He has been the Staff Accompanist at Sacramento State since 2004, and took over as Music Director and Pianist/Organist at St. Michael's Episcopal Church in Carmichael in January of 2018.

Dr. Cozza was named Director of Accompanying at Baylor University in 1994 to design and implement the Masters of Music degree program in Piano Accompanying. Graduates of the program he administrated from 1994-2001 hold teaching and accompanying positions regionally, nationally and internationally. He taught Accompanying and Secondary Piano in the Conservatory of Music at the University of the Pacific in Stockton, California from 2004-2018.

Collaborating with singers and instrumentalists throughout the United States, Dr. Cozza's international engagements have included performances as soloist, accompanist and chamber musician in such European cities as Vienna, Bologna, Milan, Cologne, and Budapest.

Dr. Cozza holds a DM degree in Piano Performance, Vocal Accompanying and Chamber Music from Northwestern University. He earned his Bachelor's and Master's degrees at USC, where he was named Valedictorian of the School of Music. His principal teachers have been Daniel Pollack in Los Angeles, Dr. David Kaiserman in Chicago, and Professors Hans Graf (solo piano performance) and Georg Ebert (chamber music) in Vienna. He originally attended Vienna's prestigious Hochschule für Musik as a Rotary Foundation Scholar in 1986-87, then returned for further study from 1988-1991 when he received the coveted Diplom in both Piano Performance and Chamber Music.

Dr. Cozza is the current President of the Sacramento Saturday Club.

Marlon Blair is a percussionist and a music major at Cosumnes River College. He's studied percussion since his freshman year of high school at Cosumnes Oaks High School, then pursued his dream of doing DCI in his junior year of with the Sacramento Mandarins Drum and Bugle Corps. Music has been an important role in his life, both therapeutically and for entertainment. He strives to push himself to become a better musician and a person to the people around him, and plans to be a percussion teacher and spread the art of music to younger and growing musicians.

Mira Huang, soprano, is a fourth-year double major in music and psychology with a minor in English at the University of California, Davis. She is a seasoned chorister with twelve years of choral singing and experience as both section leader and assistant music director. She is also fortunate to have had ten years of voice lessons and five years of flute instruction. With her perfect pitch and her love for the atypical, Mira hopes to pursue a Master's degree in vocal performance, specializing in early and contemporary music. He has performed frequently with the San Francisco Symphony and the San Francisco Opera.

Born and raised in Vietnam, **Hanh Nguyen** began piano lessons at a young age. Motivated by her growing passion, she pursued a career in music as a piano performance major at Sacramento State under the guidance of Steinway artist Richard Cionco and Professor Kirsten Smith. Aside from being a soloist, she is also active in collaborative playing and accompanying. She has performed in various master classes and chamber concerts, including at the Orfeo Music Festival in Vipiteno, Italy. She is also passionate about pedagogy and the holistic approach of playing the piano. Her other mentors include Jennifer Reason and Professor Nina Scolnik at UC Irvine.
