This course is taken by Doctor of Audiology students who have: 1) passed the progress examination at the end of the first year of the program, 2) completed IRB training, and 3) received approval from their committee and advisor for the introduction and methodology. Students will learn how to plan, perform, and disseminate research in audiology. Students must be enrolled in five consecutive semesters of Audiology Doctoral Project (CSAD 501, 502, 503, 504, 505) after passing the first-year comprehensive examination and meeting advisory and proposal requirements for the doctoral project.
