CSAD 199. Independent Study

1 Unit

Prerequisite(s): CSAD 130; Instructor approval; Undergraduate senior in Communication Sciences and Disorders Independent study.

Place of Course in Program

This independent study is designed for students interested in audiology. Students will learn about rehabilitation for people with hearing loss, and they will develop a digital (online) resource for a project idea.

Course Requirements/Components:

Projects:

- o Communication strategies: Create scenarios based on communication difficulties and recommended strategies. Include scripts for effective repair strategy use.
- o Auditory training: Develop a list of auditory training programs. Include information about the program, including features, interface, cost, etc.
- o Lipreading: Make a visual guide of different visemes as seen on the lips/mouth/face.
- o Clear speech: Write sentences for developing skills and practicing clear speech.
- O Smartphone/tablet applications: Demonstrate and summarize helpful apps for people with hearing loss. Include availability, cost, ease of use, etc.

Class Participation:

Students are expected to actively participate in discussions and are required to have read the assigned material prior to class meetings. Expectations for Zoom netiquette are outlined below.

Class Attendance:

Attendance at meetings is necessary for this course because the course meets to review progress and discuss. No more than one unexcused absence is allowed. More than one unexcused absence will result in a deduction of 15 points from the course total for each absence. Students are expected to join the call on time. During weeks with no scheduled class, students may meet individually with the instructor, or they may continue work on their project.

Course Grades:

Course grades are based on completion of progress meeting documents, article summaries, project idea design, draft of the project, showcase presentation, and a reflection paper.
